

Situated in the Mid North of South Australia at the base of the spectacular Flinders Ranges, our community of 600 residents is a historic service centre town that retains much of its 1880s charm. It is situated approximately three hour's drive north of Adelaide and one hour to the east of Port Augusta. It is ideally located at the intersection of two major road transport routes from the eastern states, the Northern Territory and Western Australia.

Prior to non-Indigenous settlement, Orroroo was the home of the Ngadjuri Aboriginal people whose domain was the area to the east of the Flinders Ranges. The first settlers, John and James Chambers arrived in 1844, when they took up the 'Pekina Run' pastoral property that covered 320 square miles. The name 'Orroroo' was first used by an early pioneer, Charlie Easther who conducted a nearby coaching house which served travellers on the Burra-Blinman track. The true meaning of the word is uncertain with a variety of interpretations possible. This name was officially given in 1875 by the famous South Australian surveyorgeneral, George Goyder in 1875 when the town was first surveyed.

The first land sales occurred in 1876. The town was granted its own local council, the District

Council of Orroroo, in 1887. The town was connected by the Peterborough–Quorn railway line to Peterborough and Quorn in 1881 and rail services continued to 1987. An early irrigation scheme was formed after damming the Pekina Creek and creating the Pekina reservoir. Water from here was supplied to more than 50 dairy farms. Orroroo had its own flour mill, several bakeries, carriage manufacturer and a butter factory.

Today Orroroo is a strong and well serviced regional centre for a predominantly farming community whose main focus are grains, sheep and cattle. The community is also evolving into a significant tourism centre with its location central to many heritage, cultural and environmental attractions.

Orroroo is situated near 'Goyder's Line', a line drawn up in 1865 by Surveyor General Goyder which he believed indicated the edge of the area suitable for agriculture. Drought is a common experience for the Orroroo farming area, and with increased climate uncertainty, the community of Orroroo is strongly committed to creating a resilient and sustainable future through innovation, adaption and local leadership.

We are a proud community, and our vibrancy makes us resilient.

Our residents, businesses and visitors prosper from our beautiful landscape, healthy environment and well serviced regional centre.

- To ensure our community organisations are stable, proactive and viable.

Our Challenges

Like many small inland rural communities, our community faces and needs to respond creatively to a series of demographic, social, economic and environmental challenges, compounded by extensive periods of drought. These issues include –

- Increased climate volatility prolonged periods of drought.
- Static population and small rate base.
- Loss of young families.
- Limited visitor infrastructure and attraction Visitor Information Centre not opened on weekends.
- No signature annual event.
- Dependence on agriculture.
- Limited local employment opportunities.
- Retaining and attracting younger people.
- Limited cultural and recreational options.
- Limited tourism attractions.
- Lack of WOW in the mainstreet, including a number of empty buildings with no visible attempt at activation.
- No local resident progress association.
- No local leadership strategy.
- Skilled staff shortage.
- Limited public transport.
- Ageing volunteer base.
- Limited childcare and day care options.
- · Limited housing availability.
- · Lack of visitor accommodation options.
- Loss of banks.
- Limited after-hour and weekend tourism related services.
- Limited recreational options for children and young people.
- Airstrip limitations.
- · Growing mental health challenges.
- Low online presence by many businesses.
- Lack of free camping close to town centre.

Mainstreet Rejuvenation

ACTIONS

1. Form a Mainstreet Task Team to oversee the rejuvenation of the Mainstreet

Timeframe: Immediate

2. Develop a 'Masterplan' for the rejuvenation of Orroroo's mainstreet including recommendations regarding

- Priority physical improvements- paving improvement and extension, underground power, seating
- Heritage building colour plan
- Garden and tree plantings
- Entrance and directional signage
- Traffic slowing initiatives
- Art installations
- 'Heritage in the Street' initiatives artefacts, street sculptures and interpretation panels
- New tourism attractions
- Calendar of street events
- Business development, collaboration and cross promotion
- Possible 'enclosed' child's play area

Timeframe: Immediate

3. Identify and support strategic tasks to be undertaken by the Rural Aid Volunteer team in terms of Main Street beautification and enhancement, including

- · Beautifying of and adding to town gardens and tree plantings
- Installing more street seating
- Landscaping of the Black Rock Woolpress display facility
- External repair of shop verandahs and painting of shops

Timeframe: Immediate to short-term

4. Improve physical infrastructure that enhances local and visitor appeal, including

- Creating interesting window displays/heritage photographic murals in empty shops
- Extending the paving on key street corners and installing safety rails to create more drinking street spaces
- Developing garden beds with colourful drought resistant plants
- Planting of trees to increase shade areas
- Generating new art installations
- Establishing a 'enclosed' child's play area
- Creating street 'Selfie Spots'
- Installing more street sculptures
- Developing a nearby free camping area

Timeframe: Immediate to medium term

ACTIONS

5. Foster more 'streetlife feel' through

- Urging more business activity on pavements.
- Introducing more main street community events.
- Lobbying for traffic slowing treatments and introduction of entry radar speed awareness signs at West Terrace and Sixth Street intersections.
- Installing more street seating and picnic areas.
- Fostering more alfresco dining.
- Promoting active and inviting store frontages and windows.
- Relocation of interesting heritage artefacts into public spaces and businesses.



 - Meining's book- 'On the Margins of the Good Earth' and its links to ruins, ghost towns and the Goyder's Line
 - Butter Factory and Gibbs Garage
 - Stone housing architecture
 - Machinery manufacturing
 - Revision of John Mannion and John O'Dea CD
 - Railway history

 - Partner with Council in development

Timeframe: Immediate and ongoing

- 5. With the active involvement of the Orroroo Swimming Club, form an Aquatic Centre Task Team to undertake and implement an assessment of the current state and future desired options for the town's swimming pool. Such an assessment exercise needs to include
 - Input from professional expertise
 - Lessons from other relevant small rural and remote communities e.g, Southern Cross (WA)
 - Viability of options related to current site vs moving to Recreational Grounds
 - Cost and feasibility in creating appropriate competition spaces, water park features, child's pool, hydrotherapy pool and public recreation spaces and facilities
 - Creation of all-year-round facility
 - Option of heating
 - Use of Aquatic Centre for town events
 - Use of energy saving and sustainable practices
 - A phased development plan

Timeframe: Immediate to long term

6. With the active support of the Colours of Orroroo Art Group (COAG), form a Community Arts Task Team to explore and implement a Community Arts Hub that would strengthen the role of arts and culture in the social and economic life of Orroroo

Timeframe: Immediate and ongoing

7. Continue to upgrade facilities and infrastructure at Lions Park as a popular family and visitor recreational activity space.

Timeframe: Ongoing

8. Implement the development of an all-weather airstrip including sealing, exclusion fencing and lighting.

 - 'Dream Seeds' (Youthrive)
