ORROROO COMMUNITY GYM

Just before the beginning of the Pandemic the Orroroo Community Gym invested in five new items of equipment including,

- ♦ Schwinn AD8 Airdyne Bike
- Matrix S Drive Performance Trainer
- ♦ FDF Predator Ergometer
- ♦ Vision S60 Elliptical Suspension Trainer
- Synergy Power Tower.

All equipment was installed and ready to go just as the first lockdown happened and the Gym was closed for several months.

The new equipment we purchased was aimed to benefit the number of different groups of age and abilities that our Community Gym caters for. We normally run two senior's groups with the physio and a Pilates group, all of whom use some of the gym equipment, and independent gym users who use most of the equipment targeting fitness, strength, endurance and rehab from injury or surgery.

Because all equipment still needs to be socially distanced for its users, we are taking up all of the gym and the group exercise (supper room) area.

The Gym Committee, and the participants in the group exercise classes are extremely grateful to the Orroroo Carrieton District Council for allowing the group leaders to conduct their classes in the Town Hall, again giving good social distancing arrangements for participants.

While gym members and casual participants have continued to use the gym in increasing numbers, we wonder if there does need to be an opportunity for an introductory sessions made available to get the best value out of some of the new equipment? Contact a committee member if you would like some instruction with any of the new equipment.

The Committee will continue to research new gym equipment as the need arises, (equipment becomes redundant, unusable, or out of date), but at present, with social distancing and the fact that much of the new equipment is still quite "new" we are unable to purchase and install new items into our facility at this point.

A request for extended Opening Hours until 10:30pm has been investigated, and from March a trial period of 6am to 10:30pm opening times will be conducted.

Looking back at the 1960s

Back in 1967 a couple of Highways Department (HD) workers were doing a material search ("Test holes") for the planned road construction of the Orroroo-Wilmington, and the Minvalara-Black Rock roads. There was no camp as such, they camped in the Orroroo Caravan Park. This series of photographs from Malcolm Davis from Jamestown, shows the Michigan Dozer dozing for material to be tested prior to road use in the Black Rock area; the two caravans at the Orroroo park; and the dozer parked outside the Orroroo park.







The Advertiser, Tuesday 14 February 1911

A NEW RAILWAY SIDING

BLACK ROCK, February 10. Minvalara, a new railway-siding on the north line about eight miles from Petersburg, and six miles from Black Rock, has been opened for traffic. This will prove a great boon to the residents of Morgan Centre and the surrounding district, as they have been severely handicapped in the past. Although it was hardly completed for the wheat season just drawing to a close, considerably over 20,000 bags have been brought into the new siding. The shortage of trucks necessitates the buyers stacking part of the wheat for a

time. It is expected that more buyers will open at Minvalara for the next season. This will affect Black Rock a little, as most of the wheat from that district came here. After a two-years' agitation the residents of Morgan Centre have satisfied the Railways Commissioner that the new siding will pay, and Minvalara is expected to be a busy siding as soon as the caretaker is in charge and a platform built. Postal facilities are not yet supplied, as the authorities offered such a ridiculously low stipend for looking after the mails that no one has accepted the position.

The Times and Northern Advertiser, (Peterborough), Friday 24 June 1921 MEETING AT ORROROO

Mr Enos Copley (Chairman Orroroo District Council) proposed "that in the opinion of this meeting it is essential that facilities for handling stock and additional accommodation for protection of merchandise should be provided at various sidings on the Great Northern system, where such facilities are inadequate, or where none are provided at present." The mover referred to a siding as an example; Black Rock possessed a tiny, unhealthy little box for an office for the caretaker, where he carried out his duties in addition to post and telegraph office. This siding passed out 50 or 60,000 bags of wheat per year, which would give an idea of the quantity of supers dumped by the railways. There was absolutely no provision made for the accommodation or protection of merchandise, and the man in the north was getting very sick of this sort of consideration. The motion was supported and finally carried.

The Chronicle, Saturday 15 December 1923

MORE FIRES NEAR ORROROO HUNDREDS OF WORKERS

Orroroo. — Further fires broke out close to the railway line to the south of Orroroo on Wednesday. Dense clouds of smoke were the signals for car loads of fire fighters to leave for the scene. A train in the Orroroo station carried a large contingent of beaters. The fire assumed alarming proportions and covered a frontage of over six miles. Mr P Smith, of Black Rock, lost over 80 acres of crop and hundreds of acres of grass land, classed as excellent feed. His fencing losses are also a big item. Over 300 firefighters

were engaged, and the railway gangs from Black Rock, Orroroo, and Minvalara rendered assistance. A resident tied his pony in a sulky to the fence and endeavored to fight the flames, but they spread rapidly, and before he could get back to his vehicle it was enveloped in flames. Mr H Brown with difficulty let the pony go but the animal will probably have to be destroyed. The vehicle was badly blistered

The Times and Northern Advertiser, (Peterborough), Friday 15 January 1926 THE KELPIE

I wish to pay a tribute, To the greatest friend of man, The gallant little kelpie. Who seems to understand The language of his master. And the work he has to do. He's a prize to every sheepman, Faithful, game and true. I knew a little kelpie, Who went quite far away. And brought the sheep to water, On many a summer day. The Advertiser, Tuesday 11 February 1930

Storm at Black Rock

-Minvalara.

At Black Rock a bad dust storm started about 3.30pm and was followed by rain with thunder and lightning. The wind was terrific, and was stated to have torn down about two-thirds of the huge railway wheat shed, lifting a large portion of the roof off in one piece and carrying it for about 100 yards. An iron verandah at the rear of the residence of Mr A O'Gorman,

at the station, was blown off, and sheets of iron stacked in the railway yards were whisked into the air in all directions, and some were carried for a quarter of a mile. A number of sheds at farms and stations in the district were unroofed.

Residents stated that they thought the lightning probably struck the wheat shed. The storm was so bad that the proprietor of the hotel (Mr G Clarke) had to close up the place while the wind was at its fiercest. Later 33 points of rain fell in the township, while out to the east heavy falls were recorded, about 70 points coining down within a short period. All the flat country round about was reported to be under water, and last night more rain was apparently threatening.

The Register News-Pictorial (Adelaide), Monday 17 November 1930 Country People

A farewell social was given Miss N O'Gorman in the Black Rock Institute before her departure for Caltowie. Mr GN Clarke presided. Other speakers were Messrs. CT Kuerschner and JJ Lang. Mr Kuerschner, on behalf or the residents of Black Rock and district, presented the guest with a handbag and notes.

The Chronicle, Thursday 2 July 1931 BLACK ROCK

While working on the railway bridge Mr AJ Parkinson had his thumb badly crushed, when the jack he was using slipped. First aid was rendered by Mr. B. Pannell, and the sufferer was conveyed to the Peterborough hospital by Mr HJ Box. It was found necessary to amputate the thumb.— Splendid soaking rains have fallen throughout the month, 220 points being registered to date. The bridge gang has completed all bridges in this division, and replaced the narrow gauge girders with new broad gauge ones.

The Times and Northern Advertiser, (Peterborough), Friday 19 October 1934

VALEDICTORY

Mr Orlando Stewart leaving Minvalara. A farewell Social and dance was tendered to Mr Orlando Stewart on Friday October 12th at Mr O'Reilly's residence, Black Rock. Many friends were present to bid the guest farewell and to wish him luck in his new job as station manager. Music was supplied by the Minvalarians, who put up a real good job. Mr Ern Casey spoke

in reference to Mr Stewart's activities in the district during his residence of nine years, and presented him, on behalf of those present, with an Inkstand. Mr Allan Warnes spoke on behalf of the football club and mentioned the loss they would sustain by the departure of a good player and energetic secretary in the person of Mr Stewart. Mr and Mrs O'Reilly were thanked for the use of their home. The ladies present provided a very dainty supper.

The Advertiser, Friday 5 January 1923 OBITUARY

The death occurred last week near Peterborough of Mr George Willmott at the age of 82 years. He was born at Hindmarsh in 1840, and had been farming all his life. He was at Mintaro for 15 years, at Burra for 25 years, and at Black Rock, near Peterborough, for 20 years. He attended the old colonists' reunions at Glenelg on December 28 for many years. He leaves six sons—Messrs George, Alfred, Arthur, Charles, Sydney, and John Willmott—and two daughters—Mrs William Truam (Adelaide) and Mrs F Willmott (Peterborough).

WATER FROM BELOW TO THE EDITOR

Sir-As the Pekina Creek is likely to be dammed (or in other words riparian rights ignored) what are the graziers and dairymen going to do, for it has been the floodwaters of the creeks from the hills that irrigated the Walloway Plain. I do not think there is another place in South Australia where the water has been so evenly distributed naturally. It has been alleged that the floodwaters of Pekina Creek have run waste. Any person who knows the trend of the watercourses knows this is not a fact for it is only where the floodwaters go that there anything like feed grows, elsewhere there being little and often absolutely nothing. I think it will be safe to say that if these irrigation works benefit one class it will be to the injury of another, with the pretty sure prospect of bare paddocks in the future. It has occurred to me cannot something be done to supplement the scanty rainfall on the plains; dams or rather tanks (for the plain is too level to admit of damming) will be of no use when floodwaters are cut off, unless in

an extra wet season, and such seasons come about once in 10 years. The only resource will be to bore and tap the water below. I do not make any pretence of being a geologist, but will give a description of the plain from my point of view. It is about 35 miles long from north to south, or from Yatina to Johnburgh and from 4 to 10 miles in width, without any jutables or foothills stretching across its width. The Walloway Plain, the widest part, lies north-north-east from Orroroo, and I believe at one period of the world's history this part of the plain was a lake. The floodwaters of unknown ages and the drift brought with them have raised the surface to its present state. There is only one outlet, a narrow gorge at the north-east extremity of the plain, and only upon two occasions in about 20 years have floodwaters reached this gorge which is deeply water-worn. A great extent of country drains into this plain at rare intervals from Mount Lock North to Eurelia, from Canowie belt, and nearly all Yongala run, Belalie North, and hills east of Petersburg, also Black Rock hills. In the early days, when this country was being settled, it was quite commonto get bones of kangaroos 40 and 50ft. below the surface in sinking wells. A word about some of these wells. I have sunk three wells. The first cut water at 57ft, evidently on bank of old creek; fair stock water, no use for domestic purposes or irrigation. It was clay for first 20ft, then sand and gravel with bands of clay to bottom. The next well I sunk in hope of better water gave clay for 15ft, then 3ft. of clean sharp sand that would run, and clay to the bottom; same water as in first well, so filled it in again. Then went west about 50 chains from first well and sunk again. This well was clay from top to bottom; cut very fair rater at 40ft., but cannot irrigate wholly with it, being a little brackish. One curious feature I will mention about a well Mr. James Gibb sunk close in at the foot of the range north-east of Walloway railway-station, where the range rises almost precipitous by some 400 or 500ft. He sunk 160ft with windlass and buckets without striking water. Then he hand-bored 60ft through sand, gravel, and clay; then gave it up. In a day or two his son went down the well to send up the rods He took the plug from bore and found it full of water to within 1 inch of top. He had to abandon this well on account of rotten nature of ground

passed through, not having encountered rock on the way down. The well must have been close to a perpendicular wall. The above. I think, shows that the depth of drift is very great, and without a doubt abundance of artesian water can be got for the tapping. If there is coal in any part of South Australia it is likely to be under Walloway Plain. What a blessing it would be to have a jet of water spouting from a bore similar to that at Coward Springs. Such a stream could be conducted through the farms for miles, and if water was suitable most farmers could grow 10 or 20 acres of lucern, and so prevent such heavy losses of stock as have occurred these last few years. It the Government were to send up a trained geologist to make a thorough investigation I believe he would confirm much of whit I have written. They might then be induced to put down a bore or lend a machine to the to put down one in view of the present prospects. I think the settlers here are entitled to some consideration, and help to improve this dry plain. The soil is equal to anything; it just wants water. I am, & c,

JM CADZOW. Orroroo, February 8, 1898.

One hundred years ago, March 1922, the Quorn Mercury reported:

A thoroughly enjoyable evening was spent by the many who attended the kitchen evening tendered Miss Ina McDougall on Thursday evening by her many friends, on the occasion of her approaching marriage. Kitchen gifts loaded up a goodly-sized table on the stage, and with a forefront of floral decoration, the effect looked pleasing. The Rev Faulkner, on behalf of the gathering, presented the table of presents, and Miss McDougall responded neatly on her own behalf. Musical, vocal, and elocutionary items filled in the blanks between dances. while those who pleased became busy at cards. Supper was provided by the ladies and the table tastefully decorated and laden with good things came in for a good deal of attention.

On Wednesday the 22nd three cars journeyed to Tarcowie to give a concert in aid of the Church of England. Mr C Kotz presided. Items were rendered by the following: Overtures, Miss M Arthur; vocal numbers, Misses Martin Graham and Schulz, and Mrs Wake. Messrs JT Gray, A Wake, L Harslett, K Clarke and R Jones. Supper, and dancing followed,

which lasted until the early hours of Thursday morning. Miss Myers supplied the music.

A great deal of excitement was caused at Tarcowie the same evening when four or five boys started a car (that brought the performers from Orroroo, in charge of Mr W Wall of Parnell's Garage) and ran away and left it in motion with the throttle right open. It came straight along the road for about twenty-five yards, when it turned and collided with two other cars, one owned by Mr Tapscott, which was damaged at the back and a new Overland, which came in for heavy damage. The run-away car was stripped of both doors on one side, the hood broken, and several holes and dents in the body. About £50 worth of damage was the result.

On Tuesday last a very pretty wedding was celebrated in St Paul's Church when Miss Ina McDougall changed her name to Mrs Reg Kitto.

Mr and Mrs FJ Bills and family left for Adelaide last week on holidays.

Mr McNamara (Inspector-General for the State Bank) was in Orroroo last week examining buildings erected for the bank and expressed himself as well satisfied with the homes erected.

The Register (Adelaide), Wednesday 6 July 1904

MORCHARD, July 2. On Friday night a social in aid of the institute funds was fairly attended. A ping-pong match begun then was concluded on Saturday night. Mr XF Beck won the gentlemen's contest and Miss Scriven the ladies. A progressive euchre competition was won by Mr Charles Brown. Mr Michael Mannion, an old resident of Coomooroo, died on Wednesday. He was a large farmer and was highly respected. His losses in stock since 1895 had been heavy, and that, with failure of crops, had affected him severely. He had had a long illness, and for a long time had been unable to lie in bed owing to heart troubles.

The Register, 7 March 1901

CARRIETON, March 5. A narrow escape from drowning took place here this afternoon. A child aged one year and nine months, son of Mr George Anesbury, was walking on the roof of an old tank on the property of Mr D Davies, when, owing to the rotten and insecure nature of the

covering, he fell through into the water (5ft deep). A lady living near fortunately witnessed the accident and called for assistance. Mr WJ O'Grady appeared on the scene, and, with commendable promptitude, jumped into the tank and recovered the child, who was in a state of collapse. Restoratives were applied by Mr Parry, chemist, which, after a time, proved successful.

EURILPA, March 2 Mr MB Ryan, held a clearing sale in the district yesterday, and, considering the dryness of the season, it was a good one. Horses brought up to £11 5s, and reaping machines up to £14.

What was the Linkson family doing in what was to become the Orroroo area in 1893? Where was Brockman and Asher's business in Orroroo in the late 1880s?

Burra Record, Wednesday 13 December 1893. p3

Mr WH Linkson, who was re-elected councillor for North Ward for the second term, was born on July 9 1865, where the town of Orroroo now stands. A few years afterwards his parents shifted to Burra and have resided here ever since. He was educated at Mr FW Holder's and FA White's school. When a youth he entered the post and telegraph department and served five years, after which time be resigned and went to Western Australia, but did not remain there very long.

After his return to Smith Australia he worked eight months at Orroroo with Brockman and Asher, merchants. On the death of his father (some nine years ago) he left and joined his brother, taking over the business of their late father, which they still carry on. Since his return to the town to permanently reside he has always taken a deep interest in all matters to advance it. He is also an enthusiastic sportsman.

Interview with Emma Scharkie – President of the Mid North Suicide Prevention Network

1. Who are you and what are you about?

parkrun is a free, weekly, timed, community event. Organised by local volunteers, parkrun is held every Saturday morning at 8am. Our event is 5kms and held at the Jamestown Golf Course. Our course follows the picturesque fairways of holes $1\,$ – 7, and back. Our launch event was held on Saturday 5^{th} February 2022 and will be held weekly from now on.

The format of parkrun is simple: register once, print your barcode, then turn up and take part wherever you want, in whatever way you want. You can run, jog, walk, volunteer, or spectate with coffee in hand. Get some friends together and come out for a walk and chat or come by yourself and meet new people. Bring your dog along and give them some exercise (provided they stay on the lead). Can you even bring the kids! We do recommend the big wheels if you bring a pram. You can take part if you are a seasoned runner, or if you haven't exercised for years, and simply want to start walking again. No one will judge and you will be encouraged every step of the way!

After the event, it is very common to go for a coffee, a snack, and a good ol' gas-bag! We highly encourage you to support our local businesses in Ek-wi-tee, The Depot, and the Jamestown Bakery.

2. Are you part of a bigger organisation?

Yes, parkrun is a world wise organisation. Founded by Paul Sinton-Hewitt in the UK in 2004 with 13 runners, 3 volunteers, a stopwatch and a few bits and bobs, parkrun is now a worldwide event, with 2000 locations in 23 countries across 5 continents. Every week thousands of people around the world come out to take part in their local event. The first Australia parkrun was held in 2011 on the Gold Coast.

3. How did the Jamestown Golf Course parkrun come about?

In late 2020/early 2021 the idea of bringing parkrun to Jamestown was proposed to the Mid North Suicide Prevention Network (MNSPN) and we decided that this would be a wonderful way to promote well-being in our community. Our group has worked very hard to bring the event to Jamestown over the past year and we have been blown away by the amount of support we have had. We were incredibly lucky to have our start-up costs funded by Energy Australia through a generous donation and have had amazing support Gary Lloyd and the rest of Jamestown Golf Club in allowing us to use the course. A special thank you to Dave Denton for maintain the course over the summer ready for our launch!

4. What is the purpose/the goals of the group?

parkrun is for everyone! It is about inclusiveness and well-being. The purpose is for as many people as possible to feel a part of the community, as well as the global parkrun family.

parkrun is a positive, welcoming, and inclusive experience where there is no time limit, and no one finishes last. It doesn't matter how fast you go; it doesn't matter what you're wearing, and it doesn't matter what role you have. What matters is simply taking part.

5. Are there subcommittees as part of your group?

Our parkrun is managed by the committee members of the MNSPN. Rosie Thomas and I are acting as the parkrun Event Directors in Jamestown and have taken on most of the logistics. We connect with and supported by parkrun HQ. We always welcome volunteers on both the MNSPN and anyone who would like to help keep parkrun going each week.

6.Is there anything interesting you would like us to know about parkrun?

Once you register for parkrun, you can take part in any event all over the world. People travel all over to be able to say they have done every parkrun in the state/country. Both volunteer and participation milestones are acknowledged every week. You even get milestone T-shirts!

7. What are the benefits of being involved?

There are numerous benefits of being involved in parkrun, physically, psychologically, and socially! You can improve your health and well-being, learn new skills, meet new people, build new friendships, spend time in nature, improve your fitness, connect with our community and with the wider parkrun community. Plus, it is free!

8. How do people volunteer?

It takes between 5 – 7 volunteers each week for the event to go ahead. Volunteer roles include timekeeping, bar code scanning, handing out finish tokens, tail walking, and event briefing. Volunteers are on an email list and are contacted whenever we need to put a roster together. The more volunteers we have the less frequently you will need to be rostered on. You can come and enjoy the event no matter what. Just let us know if you would like to be a part of the volunteer roster. Simply register as a parkrun participant to become a volunteer and start getting volunteer credits.

TEMPORARY TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICE

NOTICE UNDER SECTION 17 (3) ROAD TRAFFIC ACT, 1961

I, Christopher Drew Holland, Senior Sergeant of Police, for and on behalf of the Commissioner of Police, exercise the authority delegated by the Minister for Transport under Section 11 Road Traffic Act, and make the following order under Section 17 (3) of the Act.

I declare that the 'Orroroo Markets' is a 'temporary purpose' to which this section applies.

I direct that a **25km/h** temporary speed restriction will apply to the following roads between 8.00am and 2.00pm on Sunday 13 March 2022, Sunday 31 July 2022 and Sunday 23 October 2022:

Within the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton area: -

- Second Street, Orroroo between Fourth Street and Fifth Street.
- Fourth Street, Orroroo between a point approximately 50 metres either side of Second Street
- Fifth Street, Orroroo between a point approximately 50 metres either side of Second Street
