ORROROO: A PROUD FINALIST OF THE 2021 AG TOWN OF THE YEAR AWARD

Orroroo has been named as one of five finalist towns for the South Australian Agricultural Town of the Year award. The award is an initiative of the State Government to recognise towns demonstrating excellence across primary industries.

As a finalist, the story of Orroroo will be shared by South Australia's independent news channel InDaily and across various digital channels. The five finalists will also be featured in SA Life magazine later this year.

Minister for Primary Industries and Regional Development David Basham has sent his congratulations to the Orroroo community and has thanked everyone that put in the effort to nominate their town. A total of 59 nominations were received, with this year's finalists showcasing the diversity of South Australia's regions and agricultural activities.

"Agriculture is the backbone of our regional communities and our Ag Town of the Year award recognises the key role of primary industries to our state, including field crops, horticulture, meat and livestock, dairy, grape and wine, forestry, plus fisheries and aquaculture," said Minister Basham.

"The award also celebrates the communities that support these industries and gives regional communities the opportunity to reflect on their

contributions to South Australia's economic and social fabric.

The winner of the Agricultural Town of the Year is to be decided by an independent judging panel and will be announced at the South Australian Regional Showcase on 19 November.

The five finalist towns are Booleroo Centre, Kapunda, Kimba, Mypolonga and Orroroo.

From the Council Desk

Ordinary meeting: Council held its ordinary meeting on Wednesday 22nd September 2021 in the Orroroo Council Chambers. Minutes are now available via www.orraroo.sa.gov.au. The next ordinary meeting is scheduled for 9am Wednesday 27th October 2021. Council papers will be available to the public as normal via Council's website.

Orroroo Heavy Vehicle Bypass: Council engaged OTM Civil Construction Group for construction of Stage 1 of the Orroroo Heavy Vehicle Bypass due for completion on 31st October 2021. Council was advised on 22nd September 2021 that OTM had commenced liquidation proceedings and would not return to our worksite. Fortunately, at this point, Council have been able to mitigate the risks that OTM's liquidation posed to the bypass project. Council expects to be able to deliver the project on time and on budget. Council understands that our business is one of many South Australian businesses impacted by OTM's liquidation, and empathises with those business owners and employees who have been directly affected by this unfortunate situation.

Active construction sites: There are currently a number of active construction sites in public areas which restrict public access in Orroroo. Weighbridge Road, and the Second Street Median Strip (Eastern-end) are ongoing work sites, frequented by heavy machinery and operational staff. Please respect and obey relevant closure signs or speed reductions (when they apply), they are for your safety after all.

Message from the Mayor



What an inspirational speaker is Peter Kenyon. I had heard him previously when he came to Orroroo but his visit to the Council and the workshop at the Blacksmith's Chatter were extremely motivational. He talked at length about a little town in the wheat belt of Western Australia called Kulin and all it had done to reinvent itself as a community. Whilst others around it had contracted in size and numbers, Kulin has over the past 15 years or so almost doubled its population from a tad over 300 people to 600. He told us all about the projects they instigated and the fallout from those projects and I was struck by how many great ideas they had put into practice.

It reminded me of the presentation given by the owner of the Home Grain Bakery in Aldinga at the Main Street Conference Dylan and I attended earlier this year. He had instigated the renewal of the CBD in Aldinga by buying the old general store and converting it to a bakery and he told us of all the different projects that developed over time by his endeavour to not only grow his business but make the community of Aldinga proud of its town and to enjoy themselves.

Later in the evening at the workshop, Peter had us put down on the 'famous' butchers paper (reinvented as our table cloths) how we saw Orroroo now, things we liked about it, things that had disappeared that we'd like back and things we'd simply like to change or add to our community. It made us all think and some interesting ideas came to mind. One of the main things that we had lost that we'd like to get back was a 24 hour service station. That certainly resonated with me as it was the first port of call for tea after netball practice on Thursday nights for many years.

All of our thoughts were put up on the big butcher's paper board by Jodie and at the end of the evening we were all given 10 sticky dots to put on the things we rated as the most important to us. Amongst the things which resonated with a reasonable number of people were child care and a boarding house attached to the school. I found these two in particular extremely interesting. I remember attending a meeting at the kindergarten with Ilian Wilson (our newly installed CEO) and quite a number of young mothers to discuss the use of the said kindy as a child care centre on the days it wasn't otherwise utilised. That was over 10 years ago and here we are still apparently needing it. Likewise with the boarding house. It has

been spoken about for many years and I remember speaking about it to the Premier when Community Cabinet was held in our area over 5 years ago.

It made me ponder as to why these projects haven't been actively pursued over the past few years and how important it is to have someone passionate enough about them to drive them forward. It's fine to have the passengers sitting in the bus but if nobody's driving the bus it stays in the same place. The bakery owner at Aldinga drove the bus. Different sectors of the Kulin community drove the bus. I read recently of the building of the hydrotherapy pool in Jamestown and well remember that was a project suggested by Robert Stacey and driven by a committee of passionate supporters. They fund-raised and fund-raised and fund-raised and eventually got the pool built. Such was their passion.

It's amazing what can be achieved if there's a passion for the project and someone to drive it. Look at what our tiny tourism committee get done.

Peter Kenyon's workshop came up with the ideas. It will be up to all of us how many of them we can invest in.

Hundreds of South Australian primary producers, industry representatives and regional community members have had their say about their priorities for building resilience to future droughts.

The South Australian Drought Resilience Adoption and Innovation Hub has completed a series of regional workshops across the State to identify each region's priorities to strengthen their drought preparedness and resilience.

The workshops at Wudinna, Port Augusta, Loxton, Orroroo, Roseworthy and Naracoorte were open to all regional community members – not just those who work in agriculture. More than 260 people participated in the in-person and online hybrid events.

SA Drought Hub Interim Director, University of Adelaide Professor Chris Preston, said the interactive workshops were an important exercise in identifying the practices, technologies and activities the SA Drought Hub should be delivering for the next three years to support regional communities.

"It was heartening to have so many people from such diverse sectors, backgrounds and interests willingly contributing their ideas about what they believe needs to be done to increase drought resilience," Professor Preston said.

"The workshops were extremely positive and have set a strong foundation for the SA Drought Hub's program of activities and undertakings going forward.

"There was robust discussion at each workshop about what has helped primary producers and their communities during past droughts and what is needed to better prepare for future droughts."

The SA Drought Hub leadership team will now review all ideas submitted through the workshops, describe each region's priorities and then go back to the regional communities to ensure they still agree with those priority activities.

The regional priorities will form the basis of the SA Drought Hub's activity plan, which will be submitted to the Australian Government in November.

Activities will be co-designed with regional input to facilitate adoption of drought resilience practices in farming systems through peer-to-peer learning, on-farm demonstrations and training workshops.

Professor Preston said peer-to-peer learning offered particular value in terms of sharing knowledge and experiences from previous droughts.

"There are producers in this State who have managed drought particularly well. They are a resource we can tap into to help other producers, particularly young farmers, in planning for future droughts."

The SA Drought Hub is one of eight hubs established across the nation through the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund.

Led by the University of Adelaide, the SA Drought Hub comprises the core hub at Roseworthy and five regional nodes at Minnipa on Eyre Peninsula, Port Augusta in the Far North, Orroroo in the Upper North, Loxton in the Riverland, and Struan in the South-East.

The SA Drought Hub comprises a comprehensive and dynamic network of 59 industry partners, including grower groups; the three South Australian-based universities; government agencies; indigenous partners; agribusinesses; research, development and extension partners; and various industry organisations.

The partners are injecting \$11.47 million of cash and in-kind support into the SA Drought Hub – in addition to the \$8 million of funding over four years from the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund.

Having recently appointed Tony Randall as its Roseworthy-based Knowledge Broker, the SA Drought Hub will soon appoint a permanent Director, node coordinators and a node team leader – further boosting SA regional employment and investment.

Shopfronts for each of the nodes will also be established over the coming months.

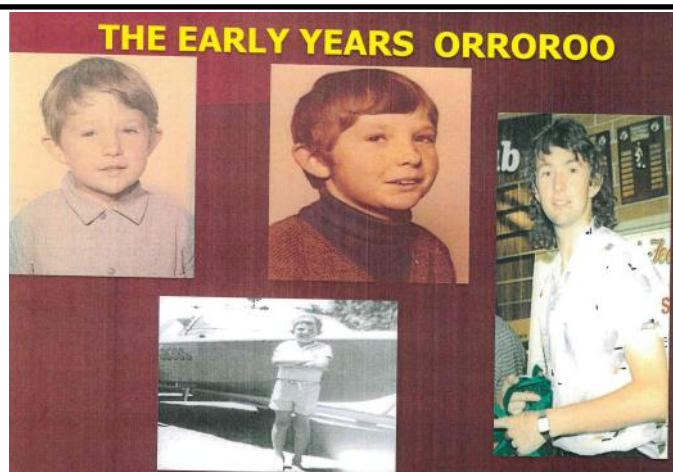



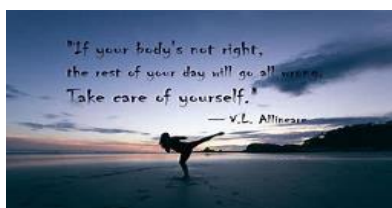

Prepare now for this Fire Danger Season

Local fire services are calling on the community to be prepared for bushfires this summer. Minister for Emergency Services, Corey Wingard said just because we haven't seen a large fire in South Australia for a few years, doesn't mean people should become complacent.

At the launch of the 2021/22 Be Bushfire Ready campaign, he said people need to think about their safety.

"By doing a 5 minute bushfire plan, people can think about whether, if faced with a dangerous bushfire, they will leave early or stay and defend their home," he said. "It's so important to talk to your family and friends about your plan, and know where you will go and how to get there."

CFS Chief Officer Mark Jones said "If you are going to stay and defend your property, you need to be well prepared, with gutters cleared, vegetation well maintained and a robust plan," Mr Jones said. "You also need to think about the emotional toll staying to defend your home will have on you. Everyone has a responsibility when it comes to bushfires, there will not be a fire truck at every house."

SA Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) Chief Officer Michael Morgan said people need to stay informed throughout summer so they know when a Total Fire Ban has been declared and have access to information when fires start. "It's important to check weather forecasts and know what you can and can't do on days of Total Fire Bans," Mr Morgan said. "It's also important, especially if you are travelling to a different area, that you stay informed by listening to your local ABC radio for warnings and updates."

CFS FACT SHEET

Preparing your home for bushfires



- Keep gutters clean and free of debris.
 - Mow, rake and weed to remove fine fuels within 20 metres of your home.
 - Prune shrubs so that their tops are well away from the lower branches of trees.
 - Prune lower branches of shrubs and trees to separate the foliage from the ground fuels underneath.
 - Reduce loose bark, dead twigs, leaves or branches from your yard.
 - Move firewood and flammable items (such as paper recycling, boxes and crates) further away from your home.
- Other steps to prepare**
- Have a Bushfire Survival Plan, no matter where you live, and practise it throughout the year.
 - Prepare an Emergency Kit.
 - Stay informed during the Fire Danger Season by monitoring multiple sources of information (TV, radio, CFS Website, social media, Bushfire Information Hotline).
 - Learn about bushfire behaviour and how to survive by visiting the CFS website (www.cfs.sa.gov.au).

If you and your home are not fully prepared for a bushfire, or if you have any doubts about your ability to defend your home, you should plan to leave early.

Snake bite information from SA Ambulance Service

Each year emergency ambulance crews attend several patients as a result of snake bites – with the weather warming up and a few snake sightings already it's a timely reminder to us all on what to do if bitten.

There are several steps in treating a patient who has been bitten and they are all designed to get the patient to definite care as soon as possible:

Step 1 – keep the patient as still as possible, do not allow the person to walk and try and keep them calm

Step 2 - place a conforming bandage on the limb affected – needs to be firm but not too tight that it cuts off their circulation – start at the bite site and then work down the limb and then back up to the top of the limb – leave fingers/toes exposed so the patients circulation can be checked on that limb “DO NOT WASH/CLEAN THE BITE SITE”.

Step 3 – call 000 so an Ambulance can attend – please don't be tempted to pop them in a car and drive them yourself – you may think that's quicker but the Ambulance crew can provide expert clinical care for the patient and if the patient does deteriorate they can also provide lifesaving treatment on the way to the hospital.

Snake venom travels through the lymphatic system and not the blood circulation – unlike your blood that gets pumped around your body the fluid in the lymphatic system only moves when **you** move. Therefore Step 1 and 2 in the treatment of these patients is **important** – this will limit the movement of the venom around your body 80% of all snake bites are “Dry Bites” – this means the snake will bite but not inject venom - the first bite is generally a warning and a protective reaction from the snake.

Remember snakes are generally more scared of us than we are of them and they will quickly move away – they generally only bite when cornered or in a threatening situation.

Please do not go trying to catch a snake after someone has been bitten – **all** hospitals carry a snake detection kit which can work out the type of snake that bit the patient.

Antivenin will only be given to those patients that are showing symptomatic signs of being envenomated – remember 80% of bites are “Dry Bites” and need no intervention at all.

If in any doubt feel free to call 000 and speak with the Ambulance Call takers who can provide first aid advice over the phone and advise the best course of action for the patient.

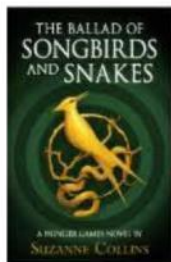

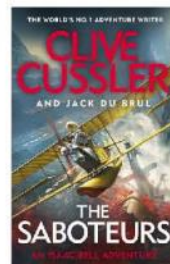

TRANS-AUSTRALIAN TRAINS

The trains leaving North terrace for Perth on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays are now timed to stop at Orroroo, Carrieton, and Hammond, on the Peterborough-Quorn section. This is an arrangement which is much appreciated by travellers to and from those important country center's.

A MOTORIST'S ESCAPE

Mr CE Woodward, garage proprietor of Orroroo, had a narrow escape on the Black Rock road. He was trying a new car, and when doing 45 to 50 miles per hour he failed to notice a deep narrow drain. The car struck the drain, and the strain seemed to be taken mainly by the near front wheel, which was smashed to splinters. The car was hurled 20 yards beyond the drain, where it ploughed into the soft earth, right side up. Following motorists assert that Mr Woodward's escape was wonderful. No further damage could be discovered, but portions of the wheel covered a space of many yards.

The surviving members of the family are Mesdames C Miller (Booleroo Centre), M McGrath (Booleroo Centre), M McGrath (Canowie Belt), Miss E Daly (Jamestown), Messrs P Daly (Minnipa), Michael and John Daly (Jamestown), Mortimer Daly (Chandada), and Joseph Daly.

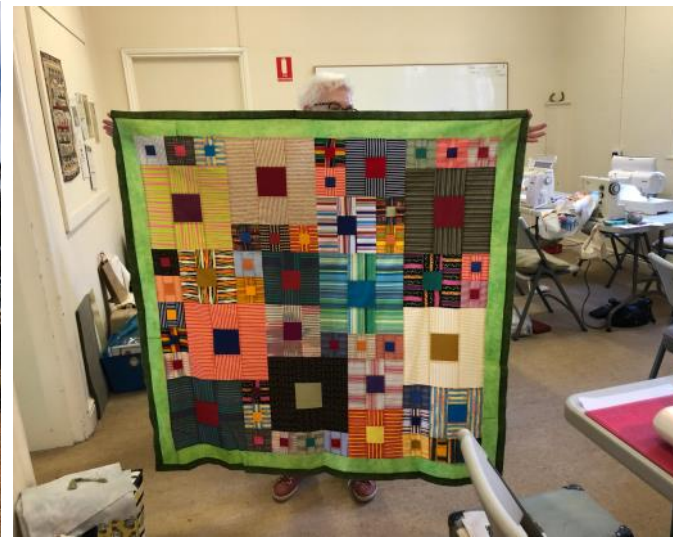

Probus Report

This month Peter and Susan Barrie gave us a great insight on how hard it is for a small Aussie Company to break into the world market of selling flour. Like many farmers a number of years ago when making a profit from growing wheat was a real challenge, a number of Northern farmers started looking at how they could value add to their wheat. Northern wheat had a reputation for its great flour quality because of its high protein and milling qualities.

Flinders Grain first attempt was to try and get flour into the Japanese market. They sent 5 eskies of flour dough to Toyko, but the shipment had to be destroyed because of one minor ingredient that didn't fit their strict quarantine guidelines.

So the company looked to the Subway market in India and after two years of testing were able to build up an order of four containers a month into India.

One of the big problems they faced was getting the containers there fast enough as sitting out in the hot sun created problems and running the risk of insects infecting the product and being destroyed.

So the Company then started to investigate the possibility of exporting a frozen product with Subway in New Zealand, interested in buying Flinders flour.

After having to deal with a broken contract that put a lot of pressure on the partners in the company a number of the partners withdrew leaving only two members actively involved in the Company.

Flinders Grain is now focussing on selling their flour in smaller paper bags which still has its challenges with any broken bags on the pallets getting rejected. They see their future in supplying small bakeries as the way to go. The interest in Sourdough products has increased greatly in recent times. It would be nice to have their own mill one day but are aware that this would be an expensive project. Peter did point out that there has not been a new flour mill built in South Australia in the last fifty years.



John Arthur on behalf of the Probus members moved a vote of thanks to Peter and Susan for giving us an insight on the challenges and heartaches of dealing with big companies who can be ruthless in forcing you out of the market at times.
