From the Council Desk

As the community is no doubt aware, Mayor Kathie Bowman has flagged an intention to resign from Council as Mayor due to an earlier than expected opportunity to retire from the farming life. As you would appreciate, sometimes opportunities come along unexpectedly that change the direction of our lives, and or expedite the change previously planned. I would start by acknowledging that the timing of this 'potential resignation' is at the total discretion of the Mayor.



I have had a few questions in relation to the process, so I thought it might be worthwhile to explain the process required by Council should a resignation be forthcoming. As a starting position:

- an elected member may resign by written notice to the CEO (section 54(1)(b) of the Local Government Act 1999 (the Act));
- once received by the CEO, the resignation cannot be withdrawn (section 54(3) of the Act); and
- a resignation is either 'effective immediately' or at a later date specified in the resignation, which date cannot be more than 14 days in advance (section 54(3) of the Act).

Section 6(1) of the Local Government (Elections) Act 1999 (the Elections Act) then provides if a casual vacancy occurs in the office of a Member of a council, a supplementary election will be held to fill the office that has become vacant.

A resignation from Council would necessitate the holding of a supplementary election. This process cannot be commenced earlier than receipt of the resignation, and as above the resignation is unable to be tendered more than 14 days in advance. The supplementary election outcome will take several months.

On resignation, a member is not 'absent' for the purposes of section 51(6) and (7), (being limited to circumstances when the Mayor is absent from being able to perform official functions and duties). There is a distinction between being 'absent' from office and a 'casual vacancy'.



When the Mayor is absent from office, the appointed Deputy Mayor acts in the role as Mayor, however the Mayor 'remains in office'. However in an instance of a Mayor resignation, even though the Council has appointed a Deputy Mayor that Member does not automatically act in the office of Mayor as it is 'vacant'. Noting the principal Member of Council is still to be chosen by the Members from amongst their own numbers, the appointment of a Mayor by resolution of the Council will be required. This will occur as soon as possible once the resignation has taken effect.

At the commencement of the meeting following a Mayor's resignation, the process to elect the (new) Mayor, requires that the CEO assumes the Chair and control the start of the meeting until the appointment (E.g. like the November meeting following elections). In summary, upon Mayor Bowmans resignation, Council will need to elect a 'new' Mayor and Council administration will need to coordinate the processes and hold a supplementary election later this year if Cr Bowman resigns her position as an elected member. I would like to take the opportunity to acknowledge the many years of service that Mayor Bowman has and continues to provide to our community as an Elected Member and Chairperson. This is a significant contribution and not to be undervalued in my book and should a resignation be forthcoming the knowledge and experience will be missed.

Guest speaker Janet Broadstock talked and showed slides about the years she and her husband Alan were called to the Mission Field in 1993. They were first sent to India, and then went on to Africa in 1997 and later to Kenya, working for Genesis as house parents to 50 children.



When they arrived they found the children living in appalling condition. They turned their hand to upgrading the facility, planting vegetables and giving the children love and attention. The highlight was seeing the children improve physically, emotionally and spiritually.



In 1998 they were sent to Uganda Masculita Childrensm, this home had 36 children. While there they helped the people build a Church. In 2000 they went once again on the move, this time to Sudan to start a new Mission and rebuild a school destroyed by the 7 Year War.

First of all the land had to be cleared of land mines a risky job! The highlight there was seeing the people regain hope for the future. Their last appointment was in South Africa helping to start a Church. Janet said that it wasn't easy but the rewards outweighed the hard times.

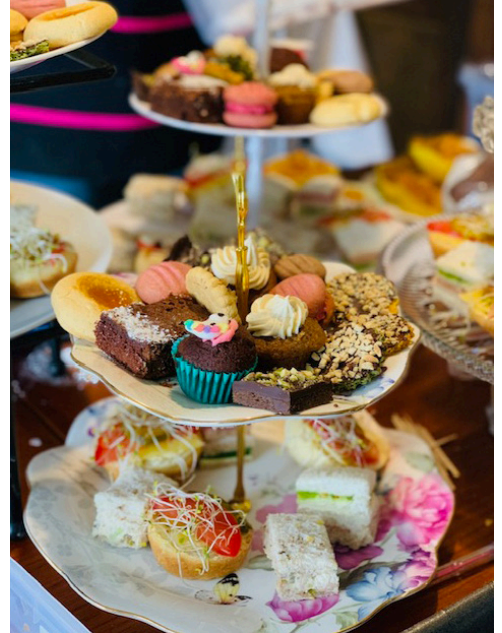

A dawn and day service for Anzac Day was held at Carrieton War memorial at 6.45am and 11.00am. Jess Watson led both services in the absence of Steve who was attending his own group gathering on Frazer Island. Following is some of the address Jess gave to an attentive and appreciative crowd.

COMMEMORATIVE ADDRESS

Ben's poem begins with the line "Mummy, what are they marching for". This small child asks an innocent, yet profound question. A question which 100 odd years, dozens of wars, innumerable academics, and veterans have struggled to provide an answer for. Today, we should keep this thought forefront in our mind: every war is a human tragedy. Those who die in war are not only victims of their enemy, but victims of a failure in international or domestic politics. War represents a failing of peace, pragmatism and negotiation. War is violent. We do not glorify war.

We are here today to reflect on the service of all those who have worn Australia's uniform and been deployed in the name of the Australian people. I believe Anzac Day should also be a day to ask ourselves some very deep questions, and be truthful in our understanding of history. It is easy to mythologise the Anzacs, to put them and other veterans on a pedestal. But to do so does a great disservice to them and to ourselves. As Norman Mailer wrote; "Myths are tonic to a nation's heart. Once abused, however, they are poisonous"

In preparing for this address, I've drawn heavily on the writings of a number of historians, and particularly those authors who have an ability to respectfully separate myth from reality. And as time pushes us further away from the Anzac Story which began in 1915, it is ever more important to recognise that although much of Australia's national identity and many of our values were born in Gallipoli, we have grown as a nation. Today should be a day where we examine the past, present and future in equal measure.

re the soldier was solely used as a political pawn. Surely the most bitter disappointment for the original Anzacs was that their war was not, in fact, the war to end all wars. The best way we can honour their memory is to focus our thoughts on how we might reduce the risk that future Australians will have to endure what they endured.

With that in mind, and having considered the past and present contribution of our veterans, let us now turn our minds to the future. We see today that the relationships between the great powers of our region are becoming more competitive. Russia's actions in Ukraine have destabilised the tense peace that Europe has enjoyed since 1945. Some have described today's tensions as significant as those in the years leading to World War two.

Worryingly, in February and March this year, the ABC and the Sydney Morning Herald ran some disturbing articles. SMH's headline ran Australia faces the threat of war with China within three years – and we're not ready. And the ABC ran a two-part series asking the question What would war with China look like for Australia. These articles followed leaked memos from

United States four-star general saying that the US would be at war with China in 2025, with the flash point being the invasion of Taiwan. And although this assertion was widely criticised as irresponsible, it reflects the significant tensions which are ratcheting up in our region. And should the worst occur, there is no doubt that Australians would be called upon to contribute.

Today should be a day to reflect not only on the ultimate sacrifices which Australian's have paid in our past and contemporary wars, but to consider what sacrifices we might ask them to make in the future.

As James Brown wrote; "If Anzac Day - our most special day - is dedicated to remembering wars past, and guarding against their tragic repetition, then we must focus our efforts on studying the future of conflict. War is not inevitable, nor necessary. We must understand it, if we are to defeat it."

Harry Williams at the invitation of his aunty Sherylee to visit London and attend the Anzac service at Villiers-Bretonneux, France recently travelled with his grandparents Karon and Terry Williams and his cousin Will McCarthy. Tourist highlights of the trip were the Winston Churchill war rooms, Tower of London and Disney land in Paris.



To attend the Anzac service in his cadet uniform Harry received permission from the cadet National headquarters in Canberra. Amongst a crowd of 3-4 thousand people the Australian army band played and present were military personnel from America, South Africa, France and New Zealand, and a group of students from Pulteney Grammar Adelaide. French police were also prominent amongst the crowd.



A memorable occasion for Harry and a big thankyou to Sherylee and his grandparents for organising such an amazing opportunity for Harry and Will.

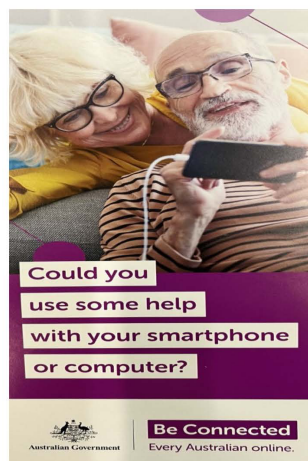


Premier's Reading Challenge

Certification of documents

You must have the original documents in order to have copies certified.

Due to recent changes in Justice of the Peace Services' regulations, all witnessing of documents, with the exception of certifying true copies, require presentation of photo ID.

SA Ambulance Service



Will you answer the call? Join the Booleroo Centre or Orroroo Volunteer Ambulance Teams today.

SA Ambulance Service has launched its recruitment campaign *Answer the Call* and is looking for more volunteers in your region.

More than 1200 volunteers provide ambulance services in 80 locations across the state, including at Booleroo Centre and Orroroo.

The Booleroo Centre and Orroroo volunteer teams respond to the community for chest pain, breathing problems or pre-existing medical conditions, and on occasion, trauma cases.

Acting Mid North Yorke Operations Manager Hayley Rogers said volunteers trained together regularly so they were always ready to answer the call.

“Our volunteers nominate when they are on shift at a time when it suits them,” Hayley said.

“We’ve got a great group at Booleroo Centre and Orroroo, and we’re looking forward to meeting any new recruits who want to give it a go,” she said.

Volunteers gain experience and nationally-recognised qualifications in pre-hospital care, meet new people and support their communities.

New recruits do a combination of online and face-to-face training, and are always paired with a qualified officer while on a call.

“SAAS provides training, uniform and reimburses out of pocket costs such as travel and childcare,” Hayley said.




“Some of our people have gone onto careers in health, in a variety of positions, after receiving an insight into the sector through volunteering for SAAS,” she said.

A fully qualified volunteer Ambulance Officer is awarded a Certificate IV in Healthcare once their training is complete.

Volunteers and their families also receive free Ambulance Cover whilst volunteering for their communities with SAAS.

THE COUNTRY.

DEATH OF AN OLD RESIDENT.

HAMLEY BRIDGE. April 7th. Mr John Casaretto, a respected resident of Hamley Bridge for 50 years, died on Saturday, April 3rd. He was born in Italy in 1838. His father, a sailor, was in command of a sailing vessel trading in many parts of the world, but principally to England. The captain lost his wife, and his only son, John Casaretto, nine years of age, he took with him to sea. He sailed with his father until the latter's death, and continued a seafaring life until 1857, when his vessel entered Port Adelaide. Owing to the harsh treatment of his captain, he deserted, and making his way inland, arrived at Virginia. Here he was arrested by the police and lodged in gaol for one night. In the meantime the vessel had sailed.

On his release Mr Casaretto took up land near Hamley Bridge, and had resided there until about a year before his death. When he first came to this district the land was covered with mallee scrub, of which very little remains. His first work was to clear scrub for farming pastures. His end was hastened by the death of his wife, which occurred less than a week before his own. He married Miss Schultze, a daughter of the late Mr Schultze, who was appointed Field naturalist to Goyder's Expedition to the Northern Territory. Mrs Casaretto was exceedingly expert in the art of stuffing birds, and had many beautiful and well-preserved specimens. Mr Casaretto leaves one daughter (Mrs Mary Carmody, of Hamley Bridge) and three sons (Charles, of Mount Bryan; John, of Gawler; and Daniel, of Hamley Bridge).

The Chronicle, Saturday 28 March 1903

LOCAL COURT— PETERSBURG

(Before Messrs J P Stow, S M, F Hodley, and J Noonan)
P Schultze v Rodeghiero. — Messrs Rudall and Homburg, junior appeared for plaintiff and Mr Halcomb for defendant. Plaintiff, as administrator in the estate of the late F Schultze sued the defendant for £109 money lent by the deceased. Defendant admitted the claim, but counter-claimed £312 for board and lodging for deceased for six years. August Rodeghiero (defendant), store keeper of Black Rock and son-in-law of deceased, gave evidence to the effect that he was one of the bondsmen in deceased's estate.

He had lived with him about 10 years. There had been an arrangement for deceased to spend half the time with his daughter, Mrs Casaretto and half the time with witness' wife. This arrangement was, however, not carried out, and he lived about a year only with Mrs Casaretto. He was laid up for two years before he died, and none of the beneficiaries ever offered to keep deceased. In return for his board deceased was agreeable that defendant should take the interest on his

money, which he kept. He claimed maintenance for the last six years at £1 per week. No bargain was ever made that if Mrs Casaretto and witness' wife kept deceased they were to be left £100 each. Verdict for plaintiff for £109, confessed, and for defendant for £109 on the counter-claim, each party to pay his own costs.

DEATH OF MR A RODEGHIERO

Widespread was the sympathy extended to the widow and family of the late Mr Augustine Rodeghiero when it became known that he had died at his residence, Jamestown, on Wednesday, 29th ult. The deceased, who was 58 years of age was a native of Asiago Italy. At an early age he went to Germany where he acquired a knowledge of the language. After spending three years there he returned to his native land and then sailed for Australia, arriving here in 1871.

As a stone-cutter he worked at his trade for several years and at the age of 29 was married before the Rev Father Resheur, SJ, to Miss Frederica Schultze, youngest daughter of Mr F Schultze of Gulnare—who at the advanced age of 94 years became a member of the Catholic Church. After his marriage the deceased resided a short time at Petersburg and then established a storekeeping business at Black Rock, which he carried on successfully. Mr Rodeghiero was also well known in pastoral circles; some time ago he purchased a large sheep run near Cradock.

About five years ago, on account of failing health, he handed over the management of his business to some of his children, and purchased a property near Jamestown, where he resided with his wife and the rest of his family till death did them part. A model husband and father, a devout member of the Catholic Church, always active in responding to every call for the church and school in the district, a splendid type of citizen, upright and fearless, he was widely known and beloved by all, He died fortified by the rites of Holy Church, administered by the Rev Father O'Rourke.

On Friday, 30th ult. his remains were removed to St James' Church, where Father O'Rourke read the last prayers, and also officiated at the grave in the presence of a very large assemblage of sorrowing relatives and friends, which showed the esteem in which the deceased gentleman had been held. Mr Rodeghiero leaves a wife, three sons and three daughters to mourn their sad loss. Numerous letters and telegrams were received by the bereaved family, also many floral tributes.

NEW FOOD SAFETY STANDARD 3.2.2A

Standard 3.2.2A Food Safety Management Tools will be coming into effect in December 2023.

This Standard introduces new requirements for all food service, catering, and retail businesses that handle unpackaged, ready-to-eat, potentially hazardous foods. Businesses must implement either two or three new food safety management tools, depending on their category (as defined in Standard 3.2.2A), which is based on the risk of the food handling activities of the business. The three tools are:

- Food handler training
- Implementation of a certified food safety supervisor
- Substantiation of key food handling activities
