

Orroroo Airstrip Funding for Improvements

The Orroroo Airstrip was among 60 nationally to receive a share of \$41.2 million Federal Government funding through the Regional Airports Program.

The District Council of Orroroo Carrieton has been awarded \$55,055 for fencing and lighting upgrades.

District Council of Orroroo Carrieton CEO, Dylan Strong, welcomed the funding news, with council to match 'dollar-for-dollar' the grant amount.

"We've had a fairly serious problem with kangaroos and emus on our airstrip, so much so that at times the RFDS (Royal Flying Doctor Service) have not been able to land," he said.

"Generally council can get out and clear the animals off the strip, but other times when we're unable to clear it and make it safe to land-on planes have had to divert to Peterborough or even Port Pirie which adds significant response time to an emergency situation."

"Council received strong support from our regional partners in health and emergency services, which was essential in this successful application."

Mr Strong said Council would continue to preference local contractors in delivery of the upgrades.

"Council's procurement policy recognises the need to support local businesses," he said.

"The quotes used in our funding submission came from local businesses and it is our intention to use local contractors where the opportunity exists."

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development Michael McCormack said the Regional Airports Program would assist the owners of regional airports to undertake essential works, promoting aviation safety and access for regional Australians.

Council awaiting assistance for flood damaged roads

In early 2020 a significant rain event wreaked havoc on Council's unsealed road network right across the district. Exacerbated by drought, the flood water damaged an estimated 80% of the road network through sheet-wash, overflowing creeks and debris in the first week of February. Council staff undertook emergency work to ensure most roads are traversable. The damage has been independently assessed and an assistance claim for \$1.8 million lodged with local government disaster recovery fund. Council cannot begin to reconstruct roads, floodways or culverts until the claim has been assessed for approval.

Council appreciates the inconvenience and asks for your continued patience while the claim is assessed. Council staff are working hard to ensure the claim progresses as quickly as possible.

Adoption of Valuations

To adopt, for rating purposes, the most recent valuations of the Valuer-General available to Council of the Capital Value of land within the Council's area totalling \$267,422,060 of which \$259,980,260 is the total Capital Value of rateable land.

General Rates

That pursuant to Sections 153 and 156 of the Local Government Act 1999, determines that the following rates for the year ending 30th June 2021, be declared on rateable land within its area, based on the capital value of the land.

- .2900 cents in the dollar for Primary Production land located within the Council area
- .3822 cents in the dollar for Residential land located within the Council area
- .3822 cents in the dollar for Vacant land located within the Council area
- .3822 cents in the dollar for Commercial/Industrial land located within the Council area
- .3822 cents in the dollar for other land located within the Council Area

Fixed Charge

To declare a fixed charge of \$300.00 on all rateable land within the Council area.

Annual Service Charge – Waste Management Collection

To declare an annual service charge – waste management collection of \$386.00 to be applied to all properties to which the service is provided or is made available, with a charge of \$88.00 for each additional bin.

Separate Rate – Regional Landscape Levy (formerly Natural Resources Management Levy)

To declare a separate rate of 0.016780 cents in the dollar on all rateable land within the Council area to recover the amount payable to the Landscape Administration Fund.

The Planning and Design Code (the Code) is the cornerstone of South Australia's new planning and development system and will offer a single set of planning policies for assessing applications across the state.

To ensure that all South Australians are confident and familiar with the new planning system, access to the online Code is now available for communities in Phase One (Outback Areas) and Phase Two (Rural Areas) via the new ePlanning platform.

The Code is scheduled to go live across rural South Australia on 31 July 2020.

A series of community webinars to support the public familiarisation stage for the online Code (Outback and Rural Areas) will be held in July.

These sessions will explore how to access South Australia's online Planning and Design Code, how to navigate the Code and understand how the Code applies to rural South Australia.

Boxthorn Removal in Fogden's Creek

Removal of African Boxthorn in Fogden's Creek, south of Carrieton is underway. Following community concern, contractors were engaged to mechanically remove the large plants from the waterway. The infestation of boxthorns in the creek line was providing a large seed stock for further spread downstream. Follow up control will be required but the initial works have significantly reduced numbers of the declared species.

Adjoining and neighbouring landholders along Fogden's Creek can expect to receive letters, encouraging them to undertake boxthorn control on their properties. By managing the issue with a landscape scale approach, the long-term benefits and success of control are far greater. It is the responsibility of landholders to control declared weeds, such as African Boxthorn on their properties. PAVING THE WAY FOR SEALING THE STRZELECKI TRACK

Regional Development Australia Far North (RDA Far North) and the Outback Communities Authority welcomes the announcement from Minister Knoll and Minister van Holst Pellekaan today that the State Government will commence sealing the first 50km of the Strzelecki Track.

RDA Far North, the Outback Communities Authority (OCA) and The Flinders Ranges Council (FRC) have long been advocating for the sealing of the track and in 2018 released the Economic and Community Benefits for Sealing the Strzelecki Track report which looked to provide a solid evidence base to identify and articulate the community and economic benefits of sealing the entire length of the Strzelecki Track.

The economic benefits focussed on various sectors including resources, beef cattle, road freight and tourism and the results showed that implications of these wider benefits have the potential to deliver a 'value add' to the economy in the order of \$87 million in year 10 after the project completion.

Mr Mark Sutton, RDA Far North Chair said "This announcement is great news for the outback and South Australia. The Strzelecki Track is a vital supply link for major oil and gas facilities in the Cooper Basin and is an essential transport corridor for tourism and livestock movements in and out of Queensland."

Mr Bill McIntosh AM, Presiding Member of the OCA added, "a clear vision and strong local advocacy has been driving this nation building project over many years. Once fully sealed, the Strzelecki Track would provide a vital piece of enabling infrastructure to support the growth and development of community and economic activity in regional South Australia and beyond."

The Strzelecki Track is a 472-kilometre length of road which links Lyndhurst to Innamincka and apart from six sealed overtaking lanes totalling 45km at strategic locations, the road is unsealed and often quite rough – it can take up to 14.2 hours for heavy vehicles and 8.8 hours for light vehicles to make the journey from Lyndhurst to the QLD border. In March the State Government committed to seal the 26 kms of the Adventure Way (Strzelecki Track) between Innamincka and the QLD border.

Six Communities In Grey Awarded Saluting Their Service Grants

Federal Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey said he is very pleased six community groups across Grey will be better equipped to remember the service and sacrifice of our current and former Australian Defence Force personnel thanks to the Australian Government's *Saluting Their Service* Commemorative Grants Program.

In Grey successful groups include the Carrieton Progress Association \$10,000, Flinders Ranges Council \$8,421, Peterborough RSL \$2,155, Riverton RSL \$1,164, Robertstown RSL \$5,500 and Spalding RSL \$9354.

"I congratulate these groups who will receive funding for projects commemorating our wartime history, especially as the 75th anniversary of the end of the Second World War on 15 August approaches," Mr Ramsey said.

"They will join communities across Australia in benefiting from a funding boost to help commemorate the role that Australian service men and women have played in shaping the nation.

"These projects and activities will ensure that the service history is captured and preserved in our local community.

"I thank all the community organisations who work tirelessly to ensure that our service personnel get the recognition that they deserve and thank you to all Australian service personnel for your service and sacrifice."

More than \$2.2 million in funding was provided through this round of the *Saluting Their Service* commemorative grants program. The Federal Government's election commitment saw an increase in the Community Grants cap from \$4,000 to \$10,000 and this batch of successful applicants will be the first to benefit from this.

The Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) recognises the potential impact COVID-19 may have on recipients completing their projects, with social distancing and other public health measures in place across the country. DVA is committed to working with recipients who are affected on options to continue their projects. - **Robertstown RSL** \$5,500 to install two memorial seats at the Robertstown war memorial.
- **Spalding RSL** \$9354 to enable stage two of the Spalding war memorial gun shelter which houses a Second World War 25 pound field gun, hardware and memorabilia, comprised of the placement of viewing windows.

Honored By The Queen FEDERAL HONOURS

CANBERRA, June 4.

Honored By The Queen Commander Order Of The British Empire (CBE) Lt-Col (Honorary Colonel) Harry Tancred Harslett, of Gladstone SA. Served in France World War I, appointed Administrative Area Commander, Mt Isa in September, 1942. On the reintroduction of the CMF [Citizens Military Forces] in 1948 was appointed commanding officer of the 27th Infantry Battalion, which unit is raised in the northern and southern agricultural districts of SA Retired June, 1951.

Note: HT Harslett originated from Orroroo and is Ian 'Chook' Harslett's grandfather.

Chronicle, Saturday 7 December 1912

CARRIETON November 26. — A social was held in the Carrieton Institute on Monday to bid farewell to near Mr and Mrs Dollard and family on the eve of their departure for their new home at Braefoot [Estate] near Mount Bryan. The Very Rev Father Kirby presided, and addressing the gathering said the loss the Catholic Church sustained through the departure of a devoted family from the district would be much felt. He presented Mr Dollard with a purse of sovereigns. Mr JF Fisher spoke of the kindly disposition of Mr and Mrs Dollard during their 34 years residence at Carrieton. Mr Armiston also spoke. Musical selections were rendered by Mr Wake, Misses McEmery, Ryan, and JB King. Supper was provided and a dance followed.

HAMMOND November 20. — Painters have been here for some time painting all Government buildings.— Coonatto Station has again changed hands Mr Lock, from the Meadows, near Parachilna is the new owner. Several other large holdings have changed hands. The splendid rains of the last month will ensure summer feed.

Mildura Telegraph and Darling and Lower Murray Advocate (Vic.) Friday 13 February 1914 pg 4

Sprinkling and Flooding.

The former secretary of the White Cliffs Working Man's Club, Mr MW Forrester, is now an irrigationist on the Pekina Creek irrigation scheme, near Orroroo, SA In a letter published in the 'Opal Miner' he says, 'Sprinkling is universally adopted for irrigation. On the Government experimental blocks, and on a few other blocks, flooding has been tried, but results proved that sprinkling was more economical from every point of view, water used, labor required, and fodder grown. Of course the objection to the sprinkling is the first heavy outlay. There is probably no other scheme in the world where sprinkling is done to such an extent. Being one of the original applicants for these blocks, and I think the first to lay, pipes on the scheme, I commenced experimenting early with sprinklers, with satisfactory results. I now supply the whole scheme with sprinklers and last October placed them on the Adelaide market, and I think the profits will keep me in tobacco and matches anyway, with perhaps something for a pint now and again.'

EAST-WEST RAILWAY.

In connection with the working of the East-West railway the Railways Commissioner is inviting tenders for the lease of the refreshment rooms at Eurelia for a term of one or three years (alternative offers) from November 10. Under the suggested timetable break-fast will be served at Eurelia on the up journey, and passengers will dine there on the down journey.

Special Dinner At Eurelia

EURELIA, March 20.

Special preparations were made at the railway refreshment room here for the reception of the Australian Test team tonight, when they stopped for dinner on their way to Western Australia. A special dais, built up of bats, stumps and pads, was erected for Woodfull and a large enamel ash bin decorated with cartoons of members of the team, was suspended over the table. The menu included "Browned potatoes" and vegetables grown in the "Oldfield by the Wall." A surprise "cheerio" was given during dinner from a wireless set concealed in the dining-room. The room was decorated with the team's colors gold and green.

How he got started - "Dick White - so many horses, one photograph, a twinkle in his eye and a hat full of jokes". (Paul Marshall, Channel 7 Sunrise).

The world of Rodeo and Harness Racing was shocked recently to learn of the sudden death of renowned horseman Dick White in a house fire at his Globe Derby Park, SA home on May 12th.

Richard 'Dick' White was born in 1935 and grew up on a farm near Kapunda - his father James was a recreational carriage driver and as a lad Dick had an affinity with horses - he loved anything to do with them, including spending time in the blacksmith shop, and he loathed school. To satisfy the sisters at the local Catholic school and his passion for horses, young Dick often rode a horse to school, sometimes taking a couple of extras along too, which he used for trick riding - and he often involved some class mates in the tricks too - the sisters were not amused. Dick supposedly started competing at rough riding competitions when he was 13, but he had been doing it for a few years without his father knowing - his father was not happy at all in him doing it and forbade him. So, he decided to change his name from Dick White to Grey (he figured a white horse went grey, so that would do - he was going to be Johnny Grey from Queensland).

It was around the time when Dick began his rodeo career that a new policeman arrived in Kapunda. One of his first jobs was some police business at Berri, where he heard that a young bloke had been injured

at the local rodeo. 'Johnny Grey' was badly hurt and carted off to the local hospital where they asked him his name. The policeman happened to be standing nearby and heard him and replied, "I don't know about Johnny Grey from Queensland, but you look very much like young Dick White from Kapunda."

After a few days he was patched up and returned home where his father was waiting for him. "If you are so bloody stupid you'd better do what you want to do". And so he did, for many years he continued riding in rodeos and later he started his wonderful trick riding.

One of Dick's early rodeos was at Spalding and to get there he had to ride his horse to Roseworthy and meet up with Dudley Kemp who gave him and his horse a ride on the back of a truck, about a three hour drive back in 1948. Dick did another trip on the back of a truck to a Hawker Rodeo, about a six hour trip this time, and he was wondering if they were ever going to get there - he was pleased when they rounded the last bend and he could see the lights of Hawker.

The 'rodeo road' took Dick all over Australia and during his time he won nine state titles including the Carrieton Buck Jump Championships in 1960 and the ARRA Australian Steer Wrestling title in the same year. It was back in those halcyon days that Dick got locked up in a jail cell. Ken Lloyd tells the story about how he and Dick and a few other blokes were droving 600-odd bullocks from John Huey's father's Qld property to Winton. With the cattle delivered, the drovers

including Dick, Tom Lloyd, Neville Shields and John Huey headed off in a motor car, leaving Ken behind with the horse truck to bring up the rear guard. Arriving in Kynuna late one afternoon to spell and water the horses, Ken learnt from the publican that the boys travelling ahead hadn't long left town; they'd been on the beer for most of the day and previous evening. Anyway they'd arranged with the local copper to camp in the cells overnight. Apparently Dick slept in the next morning and couldn't get out of the slammer - the boys had arranged to have him 'restrained' while they imbibed themselves at the pub again. Now Dick was not known to be a drinker and all the cowboys thought it was a hell of a joke to have Dick locked away while they continued their session. Needless to say Dick was hungry and far from happy when he was released around dinner time and soon had them all moving down the road again. It was at the 1959 Carrieton Rodeo that Dick drew the notorious bucking horse, 'Cloudbuster'. As the young cowboy was settling down in the saddle, 'old Mr Luckraft', a local who was assisting on the chutes, said "righto little Whitey, this horse is going to buck you half way back to Kapunda." Dick responded "Well so he may, but I'm going to have a damned good try at stopping him." The rest as they say is history. At the seven second mark (rides were ten seconds back then) of Dick's ride the judge cracked his whip and Dick was awarded a re-ride - unfortunately the horse came down and broke a front leg. Dick's ride was captured on film by Hoofs and Horns editor and photographer, the late Keith Stevens, and the iconic shot is acknowledged world wide as one of the most spectacular rodeo photographs ever taken anywhere. Dick's resulting re-ride horse, 'Delta' carried him to second place behind winner Norm Woods on 'Jim'.

In the mid 1960s Dick based himself at Morphettville, not far from the race course, where he started breaking-in and pre-training race horses for a number of noted horse trainers, including Bart Cummings.

Some of these included Melbourne Cup winners 'Rain Lover' and 'Light Fingers'. During his time at Morphettville Dick worked with about 200 thoroughbred horses. On August 16th 1977 (the day that Elvis died) Dick, wife Janet and daughters Mary-Ann, Anita and Kate moved into their new home on Port Wakefield Rd at Globe Derby Park - Dick had started a new career, training and driving square-gaiters or trotters. Dick retired from rodeoing in 1979 when he was 45. He went on to name his small property 'Accolade Lodge' after a horse that he had top-level success with. During his trotting career Dick trained some top horses, including 'Duall McCall', 'El Juras', 'Caroldon's Lover' and 'Maori Skipper' which were some of the 300 winners he had. Dick was one of the founders of Globe Derby Park, established as the headquarters of harness racing in SA and was made a life member in 2003. He had the heats of the prestigious Gramel Trotting Season named after him too. Dick continued his association with all equine activities he was involved in and donated trophies to the Peterborough Rodeo 2nd Division Saddle Bronc, which was named after him, and the Dick White Open Saddle Bronc trophy at the Carrieton Rodeo. Of course Dick had a strong involvement with the Marrabel Rodeo too. In 2014 Channel 7 Weekend Sunrise featured a story on Dick and Janet, filmed at the Kapunda Rodeo and at their Globe Derby Park home. It was here that Dick came across some memorabilia and trophies he had won, and decided to create his own award recognising the unsung volunteers of rodeo - the Dick White Service to Rodeo in SA award. Dick presented the first of these in December 2014. Since then five more volunteers have received this prestigious award. During his horse-related career Dick was well known and highly regarded Australia wide and will be sadly missed by his immediate family and friends. Happy trails old cowboy.
