Time to Explore the Orroroo Settler's Trail

The Orroroo Settler's Trail project was launched in 2023 to tell many of the stories, promote the culture and vibrancy, and celebrate the characters associated with the district's history.

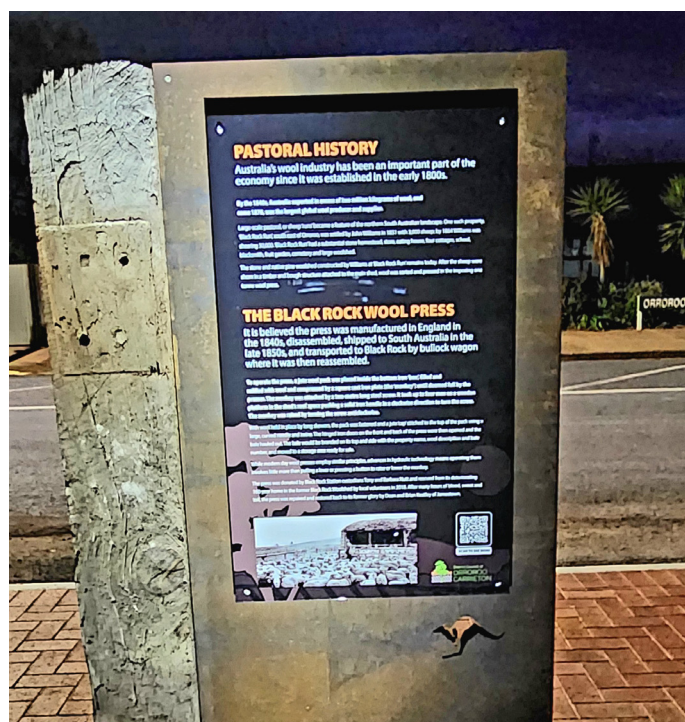
The trail meanders along the main street of Orroroo and centres around The Woolshed, which houses the Black Rock Station Woolpress display.

Along the trail are five stories that combine interpretive signage and digital components. Each story focusses on a theme that has been integral to the history of European settlement in the district. We invite you to explore each of the stories featured on the trail:

- Agricultural Evolution
- Community Resilience
- Irrigation Tribute
- Manufacturing Hub
- Pastoral History

The trail development would not have been possible without the generous contribution of time and knowledge from members of our community.

As a taste of what information awaits you, here is an extract from both Council's website & the interpretive signage along the main street median strip.



A period of severe drought and failed cereal cropping in the 1880s led to extensive lobbying for an irrigation development at Orroroo to support a dairy industry, provide economic opportunity to the local community and attract new settlers to the area.

In 1907, South Australian Parliament finally approved funding for a dam on Pekina Creek near Orroroo, and the development of an irrigation scheme nearby. The project was experimental, and the first of its kind in South Australia.

With fifteen horse and bullock teams, horse drawn drays, wheelbarrows and hands-on labour, excavation and construction of the site began.

Governor Sir Day Hort Bosanquet officially opened the Pekina Irrigation Scheme on 10th February 1910, to a large crowd of local residents.

The capital cost of the scheme was £51,481, and the capacity of the reservoir was 1,540 megalitres. The irrigation technology was revolutionary, using sprinklers to apply water to the land.

Forty blocks of ten or five acres each to grow Lucerne for cattle were offered for rental in 1908, in anticipation of the opening of the scheme. Every block was allotted, with applications primarily received from farmers and local business people.

Due to dry seasons, water supply from the reservoir was inadequate and by 1912 only six rental blocks were still operating.

A request was made to the Government to enlarge the reservoir, and the dam wall was raised by ten feet. The extra water supply attracted more dairy "blockers" and several families worked the dairies for many years supplying the Orroroo Butter Factory with cream. At its height, the scheme supported a thriving dairying industry, with up to 1000 milking cows.

From the Council Desk

Welcome to June and hopefully some nice soaking rains.

This last month has been extremely busy from a Council administration perspective as we finalise our Annual Business Plan and Budget for the upcoming financial year. Exciting I know! We held two consultation evenings in Carrieton and Pekina for the plans, which were very well attended. Next financial year's business plan and budget has been centred on 'back to basics' with expenditure focused on Asset Renewal; this was the clear desire of the Elected Member body and well received by the community at the consultation evenings. The discussion was fruitful and it was great to get some two way feedback from the community.



It was great to see some projects 'pop out' during the consultation period and Council's Elected Body has reacted and made a monetary provision in the 2023/24 Budget for two small playground projects that weren't originally included in the business plan and budget. These two \$10,000 projects are in our communities outside of Orroroo, in Carrieton and Morchard. I am really excited to see some opportunity for community associations to work with Council on creating some play spaces for our younger generations within the district.

The last Council meeting in May endorsed our Long Term Financial Plan and also an endorsement of our review of the Asset Management Plan, whilst being pretty dry reading these documents do provide direction for Council with a long term focus.

I have also held a 'business forum' in Orroroo in the last month to engage with businesses and see where that engagement leads. I specifically didn't facilitate the event with a defined direction in mind, as I thought it best for the businesses as a collective to provide direction for future processes. Pleasingly the evening had 25 total attendees (not including Council staff) and a total of 18 different businesses represented. There will be further advice shortly about the next meeting and a summary of the feedback received from the survey handed out during the event. From my perspective it was a valuable opportunity to open the door to some collaboration between business and Council, with some excellent discussion arising.

Council will soon be embarking on its strategic and community planning processes. This is legislated in the Local Government Act and must occur within the first twelve months of a new Council. Apart from being a legislated requirement, updating the Strategic Plan provides a great opportunity to reset and reaffirm key policies, projects and service priorities.

This process will require lots of consultation and there will be ample opportunity for the community to connect with the process and provide the Elected Body with the information it needs to create the strategic direction of Council.



This last month has marked my 1 year anniversary at the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton. From my perspective it has been great to deliver some outcomes, and get to live in an awesome community as a bonus. My little family has settled in really nicely, our 3 year old daughter is creating friendships whilst attending the Remote Crèche at the Orroroo School, which is facilitated by the 'Remote and Isolated Children's Exercise', otherwise known as RICE. We are so lucky to have this service in Orroroo, in what would otherwise be a childcare desert, they (RICE,) provide such a great service for our community; and the staff who look after our kids are just awesome.

Whilst we are on childcare and the lack thereof, Council and the working party still haven't given up on our childcare advocacy and we have an important visit scheduled in the next few weeks. This will be attended by the Shadow Minister for Early Childhood Education, The Honorable Angie Bell accompanied by Rowan Ramsey MP, our local Federal Member for Grey. We look forward to the opportunity to discuss the issues with the current childcare system that continues to 'leave our community behind'. Some of our working party and local parents will be attending to provide real life examples of the deficiencies in current policy, legislation and funding as we demand better access to childcare and learning outcomes for our children within our community.

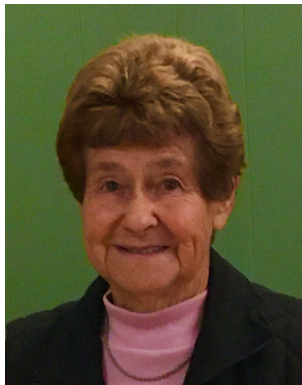

A reminder too that using another members entry fob is illegal. Becoming a member is the best way to access your own entry fob.

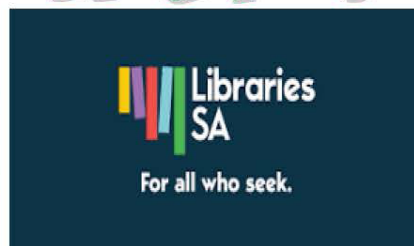

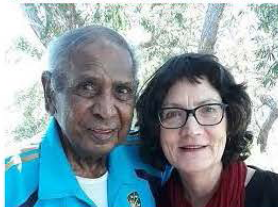
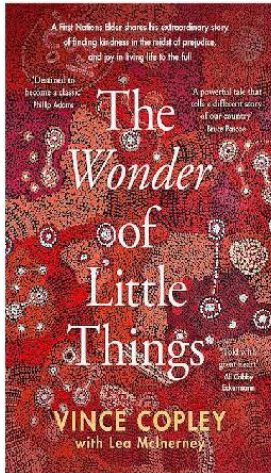

BOOK RECOMMENDATION



Vince Copley and
Lea McInerney

'Welcome to my story. It's a simple story of a simple person, who's lived a long life now with some struggles along the way. I didn't learn a lot in school, not in the classroom, anyway. But I learned a lot from life.'

Vince Copley was born on a government mission into poverty in 1936. By the time he was fifteen, five of his family had died. But at a home for Aboriginal boys, he befriended future leaders Charles Perkins, John Moriarty and Gordon Briscoe. They were friendships that would last a lifetime.

'Always remember you're as good as anybody else,' his mother, Kate, often told him. And he was, becoming a champion footballer and premiers-hip-winning coach. But change was in the air, and Vince knew he had more to contribute. So he teamed up with Charlie Perkins, his 'brother' from the boys' home, to help make life better for his people. At every step, with his beloved wife, Brenda, Vince found light in the darkness, the friendly face in the crowd, the small moments and little things that make the world go round.

In *The Wonder of Little Things*, Vince tells his story with humor, humility and wisdom. Written with his friend Lea McInerney over many cups of tea, it is an Australian classic in the making, a plain-speaking account of hardship, courage and optimism told without self-pity or big-noting.

Vince's love of life will make you smile, his heartache will make you cry, and his determination to enjoy life in the face of adversity will inspire you to find the wonder in little things every day.

MEMORY LANE

The Advertiser, Wednesday 30 January 1952, Out Among The People, By VOX

On Monday I was at Cradock's Australia Day Sports with the Minister of Agriculture (Sir George Jenkins) and the President of the Senate (Senator Mattner). We fortunately struck congenial weather in the Upper North. As we motored up that picturesque valley between Caltowie and Pekina and saw bales in paddocks, Sir George said that more meadow hay had been baled this season than ever before. "They did a lot round Balaklava, too, unusual for there," said the Senator.

Potato Land

All the small farm dams caught rain last week, and shallow sheets of water were seen in every hollow. It reminded me of the fine lakes on Senator Mattner's model farm at Balhannah by the side of the railway line. He told me they held from five to seven million gallons each. 'We put four bores down on the place but they were not satisfactory; then we tried dams,' he said. 'Irrigation has changed the whole outlook of the Adelaide hills, in potato production alone. We are the main source of Adelaide's supply at present. 'A remarkable number of bores have been sunk in the hills and there is a string of dams from Hahndorf to Meadows on what was dense, hungry scrub.'

New Hotel Host

We reached the Imperial Hotel, Orroroo, in time for Sunday tea and were welcomed by the new host and his wife, Mr and Mrs Jim Basheer, who took over from Mrs Rasheed two months ago. Jim Basheer has been in Port Adelaide for 5½ years. Before that he was well known in the Kingoonya district for 20 years. He started hawking there in a van and when the Depression came, and there was not much money about, he bought four camels to draw it and, so he says in his quiet, droll way, that is how he learnt the Australian language!

On way to Cradock we left Orroroo for Cradock in the crisp, morning air and Sir George Jenkins arranged for us to call on Mrs Mick Daly and her daughter Mrs Ross Rasheed for morning tea at their Eurelia home, where we saw evidence of industry and care. New fencing is being erected and Ross, assisted by Merv Fogden, was busy crutching sheep at the fine stone woolshed. Mr and Mrs Rasheed have two small daughters and a bright infant son, observant and smiling at 4 1/2 months. Mrs Daly and her daughter are taking them to her Glenelg flat soon so that they can play on the sands.

Turf Men Meet

We reflected how fortunate we were to be out in that undulating country when cool temperatures had succeeded a humid heat wave. Curious how the rain figures varied. We met Alan Voigt at Cradock Hotel and he told us they had had only 18 points at Bruce. Across the lunch table he said he had brought his thorough bred Copyist home and added him to the list. He is most likely sending Lady Vasey, Deck High and Our Rose to Jamestown races today. 'We generally buy a two year-old a year,' he said. 'First of all we got Deck High, by Detector. Then Ab Macdonald saw the little filly Our Rose, by Dasford out of Lady Rosemary, and he said he would not be too proud to train that for anybody. We decided to buy her. 'The other day when I was in Adelaide Ab was praising the Dasfords.' Alan had a pleasant surprise when I told him that Senator Mattner owned Dasford. And so they were able to discuss matters of mutual interest.

Gums On Creek

Near Cradock we came to the old sports ground on a gum-lined creek, lent by Mr E Turner. As we entered the gate, Sir George Jenkins recalled that one year he went there a flood had washed the fence away. Jack Hilder (president), Lindsay Clarke (secretary), and committeemen gave us a hearty welcome typical of the bush folk.

Medical Students Run

Whom should we see appear to run in their bare feet in the Allcomers' 100 yards handicap but two medical students from Sydney University hitch-hiking round Australia, in the vacation. They were Jim Purchas and Geoff Gibson, who left Sydney on December 3. They worked at Yass for three weeks and then at Murtoa (V) for the Grain Elevators Board. They reached Port Augusta on Saturday, stayed at Quorn on Sunday night and arrived at Cradock on Monday. A kind friend took them on to Hawker that night. They told me they are heading for Darwin and back through Mt Isa and Julia Creek and down the Queensland coast to Sydney by March 17. Constable Hartley Payne from Carrieton ran in the same race to help make a field, but he did not strike the form he showed when he won the cup at Urrbrae Agricultural High School sports in 1935.

MEMORY LANE

Moockra Schoolteacher

Miss Eileen Wallace was appointed to the Moockra school in late August 1929. It was her first teaching appointment and she had just turned 19. She remained there until appointed in April 1935, to the Hd Cavenagh school, which was northeast of Dawson. Her next appointment was in March 1937 to the Condowie South school, which was east of Snowtown, where she remained until her resignation from teaching at the end of 1939, due to her planned marriage in March 1940, to Vin Daly a farmer from Wilmington.

These were all one teacher schools, mostly with low student numbers, sometimes spread across most primary school grade levels. There would also be only a few families involved due to the number of family members attending at the one time. Her teaching days were also through a very difficult period for everyone, due to the Great Depression which started in 1929 and lasted for more than a decade. Drought conditions during some of those years also added to the problems. The serious surge in outbreaks of polio in 1937-38 was also a concern for most schools.

She formed great friendships with the families and the communities that she became involved with. When some of her former students enlisted for duty during WW2, she was saddened to learn of those that didn't come home, like the twin boys from the Hd Cavenagh school who both became airman and both lost their lives. Whilst at Moockra Eileen lived in one of the railway cottages, with her widowed mother and other family members spending time with her. At the other schools she lived with families that had children going to the schools. Some interesting statistics for Moockra from the Education Gazette. The 1929 average attendance was 8.2, and Miss Wallace's starting salary was 150 pounds per year.

Eileen grew up in an era that was challenging for most families. She was born on the Wallace property that was situated west of the Horseshoe, with the house close to the Bellaratta Creek. The creek, starting in the Horseshoe, ran through the property. John Wallace, her father was a blacksmith who had learnt his trade at Wilmington, Hammond and Willowie. When he married Ellen Kean, he opened his own blacksmith business at Brinkworth in 1902. His wife Ellen, was born at Sevenhill but grew up at Willowie where her parents had bought a farm. She learnt dressmaking whilst at Willowie, later working in Adelaide as a dressmaker, tailoress and milliner, later working at Tuckwell's of Wilmington. By 1910 the Wallace's had moved to the Hammond area, buying land in the Hd Coonatto which they called Bellaratta. John also continued with his blacksmith work in Hammond. By 1914 both the farm and the blacksmith business were struggling due to drought, forcing them

to move to Yongala where they leased land.

John became ill at Yongala. A hot coal that had lodged in his eye some years before had turned cancerous. Yongala is also where Eileen started her school days.

Whilst John received treatment at the Royal Adelaide Hospital, Ellen and some of their five children stayed with Ellen's parents who were living in Glenelg. Some of the children, including Eileen continued their schooling at a convent school in Glenelg. The treatment for John was not successful, and after lingering for some time he died in 1917, aged 48 years.

By 1920 Ellen and the family had moved back to Hammond. Ellen sold the farm to John's brother Albert Wallace and Ellen purchased a house in Hammond. Eileen finished her school days at Hammond in 1923.

Missing out on secondary schooling, it's believed Eileen, to pass the Adelaide Teachers College entrance exam, received tutoring from an auntie, her mother's sister, who had devoted her life to teaching. The principal of the Hammond school may have also helped, as this was the pathway that her younger brother Frank followed to enable him to achieve his ambition to also be a teacher. Eileen spent two years at the Adelaide Teachers College, at the then new Hartley Building, Kintore Avenue, Adelaide.

Eileen and Vin established themselves on the farm at Wilmington raising five children. Eileen become involved in the community and she was able to return to her teaching role in the early 1960's, helping out at the Wilmington Primary School.
