PEKINA TOWER BLACKSPOT PROGRAM

The District Council of Orroroo Carrieton welcomes the announcement of the \$868,200 funding allocated through the Coalition Government's Regional Connectivity program to Pekina tower, for the mobile blackspot program. Orroroo Carrieton Mayor Kathie Bowman said 'This much needed telecommunication tower will deliver clear benefits to the local Pekina and surrounding areas, some of our rural communities have lacked the basic connectivity and data access required today. The project will also add significant road safety benefits to local road users including our many visitors'. Mayor Bowman continued further and added that 'The Phone tower will also enhance the overall safety and efficiency for farming enterprise businesses and logistics companies'.

Orroroo Carrieton CEO Paul Simpson said 'The Pekina mobile blackspot project has been announced on the back of strong consistent advocacy by our Mayor Kathie Bowman and the Elected Members of the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton on behalf of the community they represent. This is another great example of the significant outcomes this small rural Council is delivering for its community'. Council has made provision for an important co-contribution to this Pekina phone tower in the Draft 2022/23 Business Plan and Budget, consultation processes continue, further information can be found on Council's website or in office.

Council Elections

From the Council Desk

CEO Chatter- Paul Simpson: Well, the first month has passed and I am thoroughly enjoying working for the Orroroo Carrieton Council and living in the township of Orroroo.



I been fortunate enough to have attended the Community Consultation evenings in Pekina and Carrieton for the 22/23 business plan and budget and was once again uplifted by the optimism and positiveness within the community. Throughout these consultation evenings I have met many people from the communities around Pekina and Carrieton, many which relate to Primary

production activities, having conversations and gaining perspective was very enlightening. I certainly intend to spend more time understanding the community and welcome the opportunity for further conversations to understand the role that Council can play in economic development.

The 2022/23 Business Plan and Budget has been endorsed by Council on 01 June 2022 and despite the significant financial pressures (created via inflation) within not only Australia but the markets worldwide, Council have made the decision to keep rates increase below the Australian inflation rate by 1.6% percentage points. Council have endorsed the lesser 3.5% overall rate increase as considered during consultation, it was a hard and well deliberated decision.

It is clear to me that this Council, Mayor Kathie Bowman and Elected Members are laser focused on the best **Community and Businesses outcomes** and were willing to absorb part of the inflation increase into the Council budget for this financial year. This decision was primarily based on the financial uncertainty

TREE REPLACEMENT ORROROO MEDIAN STRIP PLANTATION

Council at the May Meeting endorsed the removal and replacement of several of the poor condition Kurrajong trees (*Brachychiton populneus*) in the business section of Second Street. In conjunction with the Settler's Trail project, the failed trees will be removed to improve the overall look and feel of the main street whilst retaining the current leafy and unmistakable existing character.



Note: Healthy trees are not being removed. Nine (9) trees are selected for removal; prioritisation has been based on the current health, location, suitability for replacement and the services currently located

in the area. Of the trees removed, six (6) replacement trees will be planted in place of those removed. Mature plantings (approximately 2 metres high) will occur of *Brachychiton* hybrid 'Jerilderie Red'

around inflation levels and the particularly late 'possible break' in the season for the many local primary producers that underpin the local economy within our district.

Even though the rain seems to have been avoiding the Council area, hopefully by the time this Goyder's Line Gazette has gone to print the rain has arrived as promised/forecast and the much needed 'season break' has occurred. The districts farmers eagerly await the germination of pasture and the dry sown crops to support the many lambs that have successfully hit the ground. With commodity prices high at the moment it would be a shame to not benefit with good seasonal conditions. My fingers are certainly crossed at this point.

The last month has also seen a change in Government at the Federal level and Council will be actively working to build relationships with the incoming Federal Government to continue to leverage support for uniquely Regional Communities such as Orroroo and surrounds. We may be a small community in Orroroo but it is clear to me that the community is significant in our primary production and overall resilience in the Mid-North of SA.

I thought I might indulge and continue a theme of providing a quote that relate to my small discussion articles and this one seems appropriate for our community and the current challenges with the Australian economy.

"The farmer is the only man in our economy who buys everything at retail, sells everything at wholesale, and pays the freight both ways."

(*Brachychiton populneus* x *acerifolius* 'Jerilderie Red') - they are a hybrid version of the same genus as the Kurrajong trees. They produce a flower similar to the Illawara Flame trees (*Brachychiton acerifolia*) however have much less allergic reaction that can be associated with the *acerifolia* variety. The 'Jerilderie Red' does not produce the seed pods associated with the Kurrajong variety. Message from the Mayor

As I write this, I'm sitting in our office with the little heater going for the first time since last winter. It's finally cold! & continues to rain lightly outside. I hope you all had some worthwhile numbers in the gauge this morning. We managed right on 25mm so will get on with our seeding program now as we have only done a small amount of dry seeding. Hopefully the weather scribes are right & a wet winter (& spring if possible) will prevail.

Last Friday afternoon I was most privileged to spend a couple of hours with David Goyder & his wife, daughter & son-in-law. David is a direct descendant of George Goyder of Goyders Line & our get together had been arranged by son-in-law Leigh Whicker a couple of months ago as part of their holiday up north. We visited the Goyder Monument & Tank Hill & it was delightful to be able to share some of Orroroo's history with them. There was also the usual comment about the cleanliness of our toilets, I hope our reputation in that area never dies.



Earlier this month (May) was the 25th anniversary of the Orroroo Carrieton Council & it was interesting to read the extracts from the Goyders Gazette from those days. I still have a strong recollection of the process we went through at the Orroroo Council & the many things that were discussed at the time. I can still hear Chairman Des Fromm saying that we were about to vote on the most momentous motion in the history of the Orroroo Council when we finally amalgamated with Carrieton. Something which seems these days forgotten which occurred at the same time is the formation of the Federation of North Eastern Councils where we joined with Peterborough for administration purposes & shared all our senior staff. This federation lasted for six years & I've personally always been disappointed that it wasn't as successful as it could have been. It was the Councils' fault in my opinion. We didn't resource it sufficiently.

However the Carrieton amalgamation went ahead & to my mind its been most successful. Over the years we've had council representatives from both areas & done some exciting projects for all. In 1997 the continuation of the sealing of RN 3000 (Carrieton to Hawker road) by the combined staff of Council was responsible for around \$1 million coming into our coffers & has remained our "rainy day" nest egg for all that time. I've very proud to have been associated with the Orroroo Carrieton Council for all those 25 years. Its a council that continues to punch well above its weight.

Parking on Footpaths

Council has noticed numerous vehicles and trailers that have been parked blocking the footpaths in Orroroo.

Council would like to take this opportunity to advise that vehicles (including trailers) must not be parked with any part of the vehicle on the footpath or footway. Footpaths are not intended to bear the weight of vehicles as damage may be caused to the surface or services located underneath.

A footpath includes footway, lane or other place made or construct for the use of pedestrians and not for use of vehicles. Leaving vehicles and trailers parked on the footpath also creates an obstacle for post/parcel deliveries and pedestrians.

Council requests that vehicles (including trailers) be removed from footpaths and stored in an alternative location. Failure to remove may result in an expiation fee of \$106 per offence pursuant to the SA Australian Road Rules Section 197(1).

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COUNCIL ADOPTS 2022/23 BUSINESS PLAN & BUDGET

After taking into account feedback from community groups and various requests

throughout the past year along with Council's Long-Term Financial Plan and Asset Management Plans, Council has adopted the Annual Business Plan & Budget for 2022/2023. The Plan aims to maintain efficient services for the community and continue progress towards the longer-term objectives of the Council, without imposing an unrealistic rate burden on ratepayers.

The provision of services by Council is a reflection of both meeting Council's obligations under legislation and making policy choices on behalf of the community to achieve Council's longer-term goals.

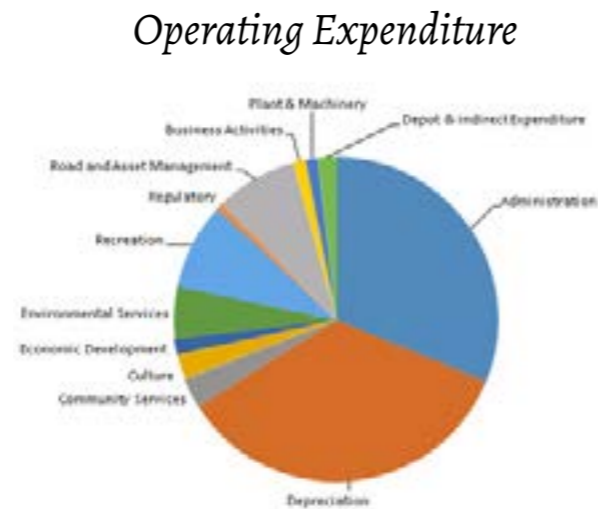
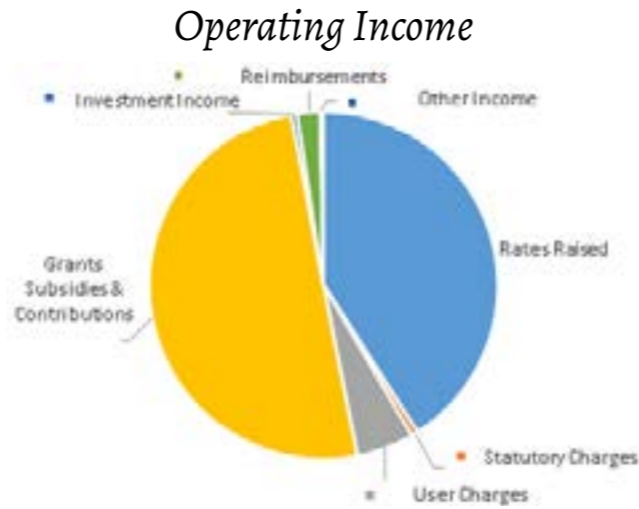
Council has undergone a number of recent changes, including a change in senior leadership. In a time of local adaptation and continuing pandemic conditions, Council has endeavoured to ensure it is well advanced in the essential planning and due diligence for the coming financial year.

In the past two years rate increases have been limited to inflation, meaning the real increase for these years was nil. This year's rate increase is 3.5%. Of course, we continue to work very hard on our efficiency in all areas to ensure Council can continue to keep rate increases to a minimum.

Name the new Council

A recent joint meeting of the Orroroo and Carrieton Councils to consider matters relating to the amalgamation of the Councils in March of 1997 identified the selection of a new name as not only one of the most critical but probably also the hardest to make. Several suggestions were discussed with names such as Carrieton/Orroroo, Goyder, Frome, Orroroo/Carrieton, Oladdie, Price Maurice (after the original holder of the lease of much of both areas) and Southern Flinders. Opinions varied on if the names of the current Districts hold be used or if the amalgamation represented an opportunity to create a name which incorporate a feature other areas of the state can identify as being in the Orroroo and Carrieton areas. The selection of the new name is I believe critical as it will represent an opportunity to have a name with which our area can market itself to the state at large. Comments on any of the possible names mentioned above should be directed to Councillors or staff and of course alternative suggestions and the reasons behind the suggestion would be welcomed. Any suggestions or comments should be expressed prior to Council's Meeting on August 20th.

MERGER OF THE ORROROO AND CARRIETON DISTRICT COUNCILS

As reported in the July issue of the Goyder's Line Gazette, the Orroroo and Carrieton District Councils have received the endorsement to merge into one new Local Government Authority in early 1997.

Councils considered issues important to the future management of the "Council" and necessary to be determined, prior to the lodging of a proposal to the Local Government Reform Board, following which formal approval from the State Government is expected. The Councils have thus reached agreement on the following:-

1. The new Council will be made up of 9 elected members (currently Orroroo has 8 and Carrieton 6).
2. A no-ward system of electing members to Council will be adopted. With this method Councillors do not represent a specific area of the District but are elected to office by the electors to represent the whole area. Thus current Carrieton residents will have the ability to support candidates who reside in the current Orroroo area and vice versa.
3. A Proportional representation voting method will be adopted for elections, which are to be held on the first Saturday in May 1997. While further publicity will be provided on how this method works closer to the actual date basically it means that if, for example, 11 people nominate for the 9 available positions each voter must detail their preferences for the full 11 candidates. Not completing every preference means that the votes which have been cast will not be counted. A Chairman will be selected by the 9 Councillors from themselves as has occurred in the past. No support was received for having a Mayor elected by the popular vote. Every attempt will be made to formalise the appointment of the new Overseer and District Clerk prior to Christmas. Both the Carrieton and Orroroo Works Depots will remain open indefinitely as the Council can see no reason to attempt to merge the Works Gangs into one unit. In making this decision the Orroroo Councillors have indicated their willingness to provide a Proclamation, a legally binding document for up to five years on the future Council, to the residents of Carrieton if they require a guarantee.

Exceptionally High Vote Return

617 postal votes for the amalgamated District Council of Orroroo/Carrieton were returned when counting took place on Friday 2nd May 1997. This represents a 72.5% turnout.

This demonstrates the degree of interest which not only the amalgamation has created but also the involvement of the Orroroo and Carrieton community in civic affairs.

11 votes were deemed to be informal as they were not completed correctly. Of the formal 606 votes, the first preferences were dispersed as follows: Mary James (15), Warren Luckraft (62), Des Fromm (229), Simon Barrie (15), James Clarke (23), Aileen Jones (44), Faye Case (10), Malcolm Byerlee (82), Brenton Luckraft (30), John Smith (25) and Kathy Bowman (71).

The quota required for a candidate to be elected was calculated to be 61. Thus, Des Fromm, Malcolm Byerlee, Kathy Bowman and Warren Luckraft were declared elected at the end of the first count.

The preferences of these members were then dispersed to the next available candidate not yet elected. Following this dispersal, Aileen Jones was elected and then Jolin Smith.

The dispersal of preference votes was, however, not at a full number, but rather each ballot paper was worth the number of votes received above the quote, divided by the total votes the elected candidate received.

Thus for Des Fromm, his preferences were dispersed at a value equal to 229 (votes received) - 61, (quota= 168 divided by 229 = .733624). The number of ballot papers each continuing candidate received was multiplied by .733624, with fractions disregarded and only whole votes counted.

Following the dispersal of Aileen Jones and John Smith's next available preferences to continuing candidates, the result was that 4 candidates had still not achieved the quota of 61, so the person with the lowest votes (Mary James with 25), was excluded and her preferences dispersed at the value she received them. This resulted in Simon Barrie now having 51 votes, James Clarke 52 and Faye Case 52.

The only option available now was for the candidate with the lowest number of votes, Simon Barrie, to be excluded, resulting in James Clarke and Faye Case being automatically declared elected to the two remaining positions (at count number 24 and after 5 hours of counting).

My congratulations to all of the elected members, particularly James Clarke who is serving for the first time. This community is indeed fortunate to have such exceptional people willing to devote time for the community's benefit.

This first 3 year term on the amalgamated council will be crucial, but I believe the decisions which will need to be made are in good hands.

I extend my thanks to Simon Barrie who has served for 2 years and has brought an important facet to the decision making process of the District Council of Orroroo prior to the amalgamation. His incisive comments and business skills will be sorely missed.

I also wish to sincerely thank Mary James for her nomination and interest in becoming an elected member. Mary felt that she could perform a function for this community by being an elected member and I feel confident that she will nominate again in three years.

MEMORY LANE

This is a collection of random memories of John Stanford, born in 1901 at Farina, South Australia and destined to live and work in the pastoral regions of South Australia for the greater part of his life-time.

The story is not outstanding, in that it does not exceed the accomplishments of so many people with similar backgrounds, but it ranks him with an outstanding class of people - those who have offered their lives to the development of the outback.

These days, when I haven't much to do, seems a good time to write down things that have happened to me and to others I have known during a life time in the bush - in fact, as I tell stories of these happenings, quite a lot of my friends have said "Why don't you write these things down?" They are very interesting but to me they are just incidents of a life time.

I was born at Farina, South Australia; in 1901, one of 5 girls and 7 boys and in those days money was scarce and for lads looking for work on leaving school there was always the stations and not much else; consequently that is where we all went and had to learn to do things the hard way.

My first job was opening the gates on the mail coach between Murnpeowie and Box Flat on the Innaminka track. They were all four and five horse mails then. The chaps that took this contract were brothers named Pope. They had previously been cattle drovers and they had about 50 horses but not many had ever been in harness but all were broken to saddle and pack work. So, the result was the driver got up on the seat, the gate opener (me) and any passengers would all take their seats, the horses were brought round fully harnessed and the reins passed up

to the driver and the traces hooked on and then the call "Let 'em go" and did they got However not being corn fed these bush horses didn't last long and had to be pushed a lot for the rest of the journey but if we had to pass through a gate the driver would turn circles till I opened the gate and then turn circles while the gate was closed. The only way I could get up on the coach was to climb of the back of the coach. This would have been somewhere round 1915 and it was quite a common thing to meet men coming along on horseback with the inevitable pack horse and being asked where they were going and the answer was that they were going down to enlist in the Light Horse. Many of these chaps, and I knew most of them, were not able to join the Light Horse, would still go but in the Infantry. I might add in passing many of the Australian Light Horse eventually went into the first Air Force.

At this time the East-West line construction was in full swing and I eventually found my way there. My elder brother was up on the line and sent for me. He also like many others eventually went away to the war and was killed at Armentiers in France in 1917. One of my jobs on the line was offside on the camel teams. These teams were used carting water and other supplies to the leading gangs, that is the scoop gangs, clearing gangs, etc. There were hundreds of camels and also hundreds of horses up there. The horses were used mainly as scoops forming the built up sections of the line. What a difference now with all the latest earth moving equipment. We would have 12, 14 or 16 camels in a team and we mainly carted water. Those scoop horses needed a lot of water. Those were happy days and I think I was still only between 14 and 15 years old and from what I remember the head of the line would not have been much further than Wirraminna. Another thing that impressed me

was the huge sums of money held in the hands of the two-up players after pay day in the big camps along the line. I can also recall being in Tarcoola and calling to someone to come and see the first train smoke. It was the plate layer some miles away and gradually getting closer. Tarcoola township in those days was some distance away from where the line passed but I understand it was shifted over to where it is today, on to the line. In those days it was quite a township and mining center, boasting 2 hotels. The main centre of employment was the Tarcoola mine and of course a centre for the surrounding pastoral country.

I did not go any further than Tarcoola with the railway but returned to the home town of Farina to take a job as messenger boy in the Post Office. This was only a temporary position but I was supposed to sit for an exam. in competition with others for the permanent job. Well, I would have had the job sewn up as far as the exam. was concerned but one had to be turned 16 years of age before being allowed to sit and believe it or not I was 3 weeks too young. So much for red tape. Again it was bush for me. I drove a team of donkeys for a dam sinker. We would have about 20 in the team harnessed in pairs. No reins on these but a pair of good leaders, as is also the case with a camel team, and the driver would "call" the leaders to or from one and of course the team followed. They would be harnessed to at yard or \ yard scoop on wheels and a scoop holder behind with a pair of long handles; with these he would tilt the mouth of the scoop to fill and to empty it would be turned right over between the wheels. I do not know what a contractor would be paid for dam sinking at that time but I would say around 9d. to 1/0d. per cubic yard. I know I was paid about 15/0d. per week and I think the men would be paid 25/0d. per week.

MEMORY LANE

When that job cut out I would do various boys' jobs around the town and finally went to Parachilna with my old friend Will Darmody, whose widow and daughter live quite close to me today in Pt. Augusta. They were happy days around Parachilna with many trips to Blinman for various functions. I remember 3 of us riding from Parachilna to Blinman one afternoon for a dance in the same evening and then saddling up and riding back to Para. Nothing much in that, I suppose, except that the distance was 25 miles up and 25 back. But if one wanted to get about in those times that was the only way and although I did not know it then I was to take many such rides in the next few years. The only motor vehicles that we had known prior to that was, first the overland trip of Dutton and Angus in 1908. I was quite a small boy when they went through Farina. I remember my father hopping on their running board to show them over the sandy creek bed on their way out of the town. Consequently, it was very interesting to me to read a couple of days ago that at the sale of old vehicles and furniture at Anlaby Station they had decided to keep that old car.

That would be just 60 years ago. The next motor vehicle I remember was a Motor Buggy. The late Scotty Napier, who was a northern business man, had a couple of these and from memory I think they were driven by a chain or belt to the back axle. They had solid wheels, or at least the same wheels as an ordinary buggy. I don't think they were a success as noone else had them then or after. About the same time the famous road train came to Farina. This was a traction engine pulling a number of solid wheel trucks. It was brought up to cart the copper from the Yudamutna mines to the rail siding at Lyndhurst, but I don't think any copper was ever carted either because the mines closed down round that time, or

the train was not suitable. Or both. I remember we school children being taken for a ride and it became stuck on the Farina race course but I do know it never carted any ore and years after I saw the remains of the engine part itself laying outside a garage belonging to Mr. Napier, and it could still be there. The next motor vehicle we saw was a T Model Ford and would have been the earliest model. Mr. Fred Budge, a local storekeeper, had this. Again the school children were treated to rides and it was a bit more of a success than the old motor buggies.

While on the subject of motor vehicles it was about this time that as the shearers were going on trips to the various sheds on their push bikes one or two of the "guns", that is, the fastest shearers, would invariably make more money than the others and decided to buy motor bikes. One in particular that I can recall was George Denman. think they met with a fair amount of success with these early machines on the then very rough outback roads. It was only a few years after that that they started coming round in cars with usually one or two of the more enterprising ones getting trucks. Those trucks would carry quite a few of the others - for a fee - and I should think this would have been a paying proposition. The next to get motor bikes were three of the local railway fettlers and they were Len McDonald, Jim O'Loughlin and Hugo Kadow. As near as I can remember they had quite a bit of success with their machines.



South Gap Station (State Library of South Australia)

After my eldest brother was killed at the war in 1917 our family left the north - that is, what was left of it, as most of the elder members of the family had gradually drifted away and only used to come back occasionally. That terminated a long association, especially for my mother who went there as a girl with her parents in about the year 1867. There was only one house in Farina when my mother went there and it was situated across the creek from where the main town was built eventually. She told me that her father cut and carted the pegs for the surveyors to peg the town out, but there is very little left of the old town today.

My grandfather was gored by a bullock in Farina and is buried there in the old cemetery over on the hill past the township dam. My grandmother died some years after and is also buried there. My father did not come to the North until after the rails of the north line had reached there.

My next venture was in what is known as the North West of South Australia. I went to work at South Gap Station and it was shortly after I went there that World War I finished. I arrived there at shearing time and was put on to ride and lead a pack horse with mail once a week. In the meantime a bit of mustering, etc. After a while I had 2 horses in a buggy and then 4, and above me, stuck on the wall, is a photo taken so long ago of myself with mail coach and 4 mules

CARRIETON & THE MOLLOY FAMILY

Did you know:

During 1881 Carrieton became a part of the horse racing scene by forming the Carrieton Jockey Club. After the club was formed Mr PA Molloy offered part of his property to build a race course. From then on the meetings, until 1917, were held in Molloy's paddock, now owned by Reg Williams.

Carrieton also had large company known as the Carrieton Implement and Foundry Co. which was formed in 1890 and which employed a number on men and boys. Originally it was established by Messrs P Molloy, King, Fuller and Brock.

The shop on the south corner of Fifth and Third Streets was once Molloy's butcher shop, later a successful mixed business was conducted there by GL Ford and after him Ron and Dorothy Mold, then J and R Smith. While Mold had the shop, a freak dust storm blew the roof off and also took the roof off their home across the road. An 85 miles per hour wind caused a complete blackout. Local people went to their aid and removed as much of the stock as possible to the ahll and vocered the rest with tarpaulins, as some rain followed the storm. Their house was so badly damaged that it had to be demolished.

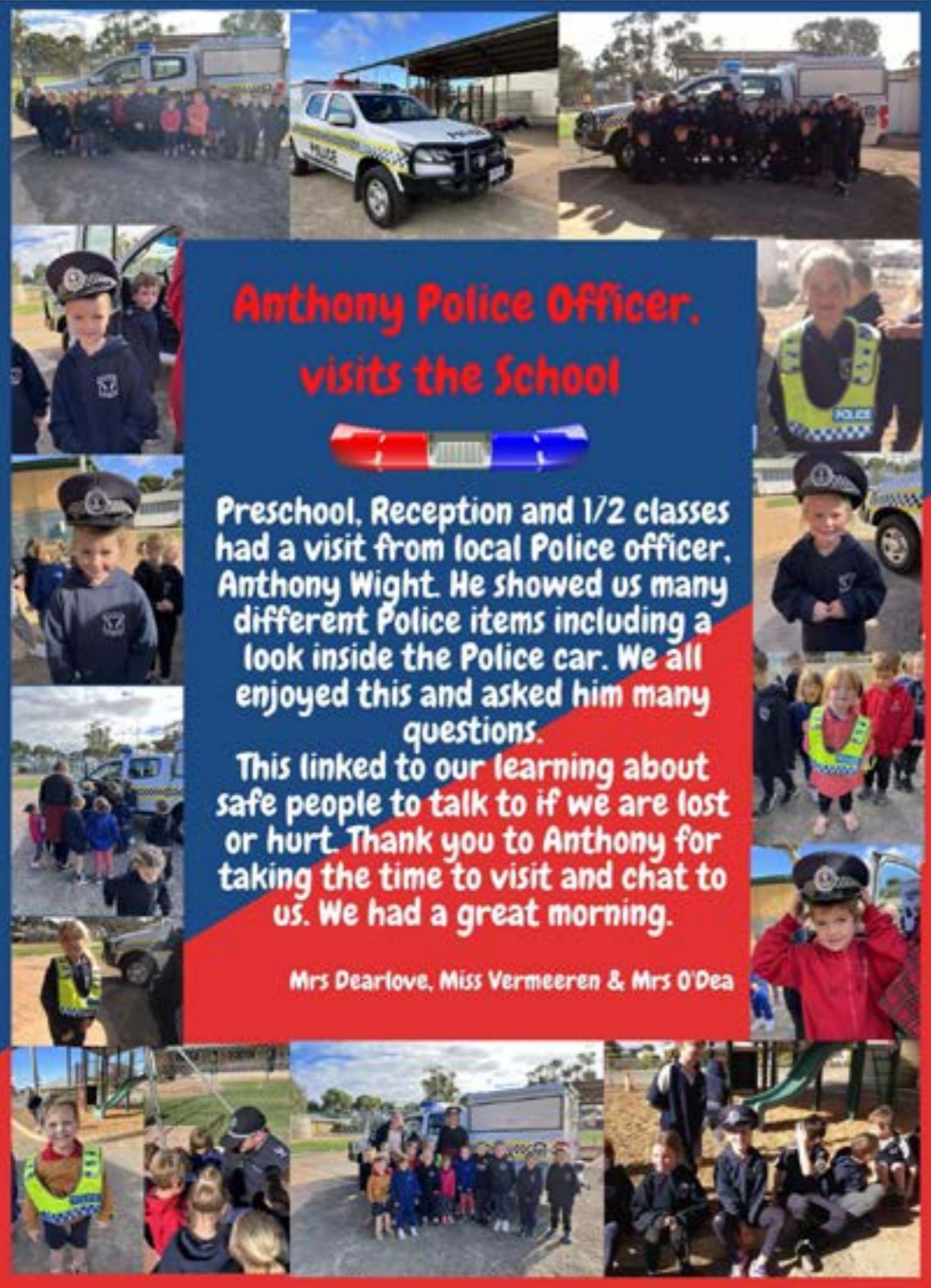
On weekends I can be found digging in my garden, playing ukulele outside to my 2 border collies, cooking or crafting something (I really love sewing, pyrography and of course painting).
