

NEW MAYOR & DEPUTY MAYOR APPOINTED FOR ORROROO CARRIETON

Last week's Council meeting was an important one for the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton, following the receipt of the resignation of Cr Kathie Bowman as Mayor. Cr Kathie Bowman had served in the capacity of the Principal Member of Council for many years.

As is required under the Local Government Act, an election occurred from within the elected member body at a Special Council Meeting held on Wednesday 26th July 2023. Cr Grant Chapman has been elected as the Mayor and Cr Ralph Goehring was elected as the Deputy Mayor filling the vacancy subsequently created



by Cr Chapman (previous Deputy Mayor). Mayor Grant Chapman & Deputy Mayor Ralph Goehring

Mayor Chapman was elected in 2010 as an Area Councillor and has served as the Deputy Mayor since 2014. Born and bred in the Orroroo Carrieton district, Mayor Chapman is passionate about the Council area and its people and is committed to long term sustainability of the Council. He was nominated and elected to the role of Mayor unopposed. Mayor Chapman has many ties to the community and is a local landowner with a primary production business in the Council area.

Cr Goehring was elected in 2014 and has served on Council since this time, Cr Goehring was also born in Orroroo, and is committed to the town prospering and growing. We sincerely thank Cr Bowman for her previous terms as Mayor, having served as Mayor over a period of 16 years. Commencing with the District Council of Orroroo in 1995, Cr Bowman has been involved with many projects including \$2 million Drought Communities Funding from the Federal Government, the Heavy Vehicle Bypass and the connection of Orroroo to the Murray River pipeline and SA Water supply. These are



just a few of the many milestones achieved over this period of time.

Cr Bowman was recognised for her commitment to Local Government winning the Joy Baluch Award in 2019. The Award recognises the substantial contribution of women currently serving with South Australian Councils. Cr Bowman was the first 'regional' councillor to receive the award since its inception. Cr Bowman will continue as a Councillor for the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton.

Pursuant to section 249 of the Local Government Act 1999, notice is hereby given that at its meeting on 28th June 2023, the Council endorsed the proposed By-laws listed herein for public consultation. Details regarding the nature and effect of the proposed By-laws are as follows:

- By-law No. 1 Permits and Penalties 2023: A By-law to create a permit system for Council By-laws, to fix maximum and continuing penalties for offences, and for the construction of Council By-laws.
- By-law No. 2 Moveable Signs 2023: A By-law to set standards for moveable signs on roads and to provide conditions for the placement of such signs for the purpose of protecting visual amenity and public safety.
- 3. By-law No. 3 Local Government Land 2023: A By-law to manage and regulate the access to and use of Local Government land (other than roads) and certain public places.
- 4. By-law No. 4 Roads By-law 2023: A By-law to manage, control and regulate certain activities on roads in the Council's area.
- By-law No. 5 Dogs 2023: A By-law to limit the number of dogs kept on premises and is for the management and control of dogs in the Council's area.
- By-law No. 6 Cats 2023: A By-law to limit the number of cats kept on premises and is for the management and control of cats in the Council's area.
- By-law No. 7 Waste Management 2023: A By-law to regulate the removal of domestic waste and recyclables from premises in the Council's area.

Each one was different and brought varying expertise to the job, but I appreciated them all and in the main we achieved a lot of good works over their individual tenures.

There have been many highlights over the years, too numerous to mention in any detail but I will say that two projects that stand out for me are our section of the Orroroo Laura bitumen & the Black Rock Wool Shed, one which has proven to be a huge benefit to everyone in the region & the other a superbly beautiful addition to our main street.

I wish Grant and Ralph all the very best for the remainder of this term & to all of you my gratitude for sixteen so special years.

From the Council Desk

August has arrived with some pretty warm weather, fortunately the start to the season has been good for early growth in most primary production circles; however the time has come for a bit more precipitation as the month of July has been a bit light on. Fingers are crossed for everyone who needs the rain.



The month of July was an important one for our Council with a 'changing of the guard', in relation to the Mayor role, as you are all no doubt aware Cr Bowman has resigned from the position of Mayor and Cr Grant Chapman has taken on the role as Mayor. I would personally like to thank and acknowledge Cr Bowman for her many years of service to the role and the community. Cr Kathie Bowman has given me a great deal of support since my arrival at Orroroo. This is largely unseen to others however it has delivered a profound impact on my work life, and allowed me the space to settle into the role of CEO.

We have commenced work in earnest in many of the capital works commitments contained within the Annual Business Plan, you will note lots of marking out of road works as we begin the earthworks. The township sealed road upgrade works are being done with our well experienced internal workforce. The road base preparation works and drainage will be done over the next few months with the sealing to occur in October.

The roads being upgraded to a sealed road surface are: 450m of Minburra Road, Seventh Street (between Government and RM Williams) and part of Fifteenth Street in Orroroo.

Dog and cat renewal notices have been delivered to our pet owners by their preferred method of contact - email, post or SMS.

Please note when logging onto Dogs & Cats Online (DACO) there is now an additional security feature of multifactor authentication that is required at each log in.



We have a large program of sealed road freesealing works' that is



programmed to be completed in October. There is quite a lot of patching that needs to occur ahead of the bulk resealing works. This patching works basically involves cutting and digging out the significant failed patches, repairing the base and then putting a temporary seal over the top (to protect the patch). This will then be 'resealed' as part of the full width road being resealed in October.

The roads being patched and resealed as part of our renewal program will include approximately 3km of Price Maurice Rd (from Pekina Township back towards Orroroo), Second St and part of Fourth St in Carrieton, Thirteenth St Orroroo (from Seventh St to Ninth St) and Fourth St Orroroo from the hospital back down the hill to the hotel intersection.

There will be some changed traffic conditions and occasional delays and disruption, please be mindful that our staff and contractors are working in or nearby and obey any traffic restrictions in place. Everyone deserves to go home safely. If there are any concerns please come into the Council Office and provide feedback.

- The Gym will be closed to casual users when a group activity with a leader is operating. This includes "Strength For Life" & "Movers and Groovers", both groups needing access to all the gym equipment for the time that a session is running.
- We continue to find coffee stains on the carpet and gym equipment. Please remember that bottled water is the only drink allowed in the gym.
- Please replace any equipment that you use for individual exercise, like dumbells and weights after use.

CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE USING THE GYM.

It has been reported to the Management Committee that several young children have been using the gym without signing in or out, and not under the supervision of an adult. They have gained entry with their parents or a family tag. This is illegal and that membership can be terminated.

A GYM IS A DANGEROUS PLACE FOR KIDS.

A REMINDER ON THE RULES FOR STUDENTS AND YOUNG PEOPLE IN THE GYM:

Children under the age of 10 years:

- May only use the gym under supervised instruction and should also be accompanied by a parent or guardian.
 THEY MUST NOT USE ANY OF THE CARDIO EXERCISE OR WEIGHTS & RESISTANCE EQUIP-
- MENT IN THE GYM.

Children between 10 and 15 years:

- May use the gym for supervised rehab or group instruction, led by a qualified fitness leader or physiotherapist.
- Under supervision they may use cardio equipment, (treadmills, cross trainer, bike rowers and steppers).
- THEY MUST NOT USE ANY OF THE WEIGHTS OR RESISTANCE APPARATUS.

Young people between 15 to 18 years:

• May use the gym only while accompanied by a responsible Gym member over the age of 18 years, or a supervising group leader or instructor.

The Orroroo Community Gym Membership application and renewal forms contain a section on the back of both forms to be signed by the parents or guardians if they wish their children to take part in any supervised group or rehab activities at the gym. This does need to be signed before a child or young person commences a program.

MURRAY WILLIAM SHACKLEFORD

How Bout it Blue?

Words spoken by Murray William Shackleford when either greeting a stranger in the street or happy to see his nearest and dearest. Everyone was either: Blue, Blondie, Susy or whatever came next. Known for his riddles, rhymes, and phrases, that he weaved throughout his everyday dialogue. Dad was born in the Orroroo Hospital on the 30th of April 1935. His parents being Edward and Katherine, his sister Coral two years senior, with Dad completing the family. Being younger, some Aunties would say he was the spoilt one! Nevertheless, if it was true, he had to work very hard from an early age, as did any child of a pioneering family.


A three-room building on Cox's Corner was Dad's 1^{st} home, then at the age of three they moved to Addison's, just two kilometres down the road from here, as the crow flies (point), Bartlett's today. This is where his father leased the land for five years. Dad corrected us only days ago in the RAH that he was exactly 8 and a half years old when his parents purchased the Block on Minnburra Road.

They lived in an old farmhouse that was there before demolishing it and rebuilding. The new house was completed in 1952, which Dad played a vital role as labourer. He enjoyed learning these new skills. The family home is where Glyn resides today.

When the house was completed, dancing took place in the lounge room with the neighbours, Brice's, Francis's and Reid's. Becoming a regular occurrence, they took turns hosting these wholesome nights.

Dad loved all the old-time dances, The Queen's Waltz was his favourite. But singing was his absolute delight. Waking up the household while making breakfast, singing away as he cooked. He was even singing leading up to his final hours. He loved most country artists: Slim Dusty, Charlie Pride, Patsy Cline, Tammy Wynette - the list goes on. When questioned: "Did you like school Dad?" His reply was "NO. On my 1st day I was in a fight" that he proudly declared he won. Debatable.

Like many of that era, Dad and Coral had to milk cows before riding off to school. Although not liking school, Dad was indeed a scholar, finding it quite easy, yet one difficulty he faced was the art of legible handwriting. His doctor's scribble is known amongst you here that ever-received a written note or a cheque, always hard to decipher. Maybe this is why when public speaking, he never had any notes, maybe even he couldn't understand his own writing at times. However, on that subject, he didn't need notes as he retained and recalled brilliantly. Dad's mind, right to the end, remained ever so sharp, always quick with a reply. His education finished in year nine, itching to leave and begin his life's journey.



Mostly working on his parent's farm, roustabouting around the district, which he hated so he soon began shearing with a hand piece under the tutelage of Ted Bright, a local landowner just down the road, as his father could only shear with blades.

Growing up with Dad was a exciting experience – there was always variety in our lives. Love of the land was instilled in both Glyn and I, and our cousins Haydn and Lindsey who joined us every school holidays.

Treasured family evenings were also had watching westerns, mainly starring John Wayne and musicals featuring Gene Kelly, Doris Day, Julie Andrews, these had us all singing along, loving the classics.

Dad was always up for an adventure or trying something new, like the day he and Glyn took their horses into the front bar of the Commercial Hotel. Patrons of the day thought it was a hoot! Dad on Crystal and Glyn on Cindy. It was the talk of the pub for a long time.

It was always a pleasure having Dad visit us on the farm over at Kimba.

Who would have ever of thought that Murray Shackleford would become a teapot collector?! He spent many an hour fossicking through op shops, getting a thrill out of wearing down the shop keeper to get the bargain he thought he deserved. He started the collection after realising that he had an origional teapot belonging to his grandmother, Edith Dawson. This original teapot had been in the family, travelling from North Shields, in around 1912, by wagon to Dawson.

He was appreciative of those who helped his collection grow by donating teapots they found. Even he surprised himself when they started pouring in and began to take over the shed. Hosting morning or afternoon tea gatherings in the shed enabled him to proudly showcase the teapots. This little hobby became his passion. Dad stated in the RAH that there were 553 teapots, last count.

Dad played some cricket with Orroroo Colts team and likened himself as a leg spinner. He often organised charity scratch matches, Shacks Shearers v another team. He had never opened the bowling, until one such Sunday, captaining his team, he positioned Roley Kuerschner in the gully and bowled the opening batsman out with his first delivery, Roley took the catch with ease. A couple of times he also organised Shacks Shearers v other teams in football games on a Sunday.

Dad captained the school football team. Played some B grade for Orroroo. In the 70's he goal umpired the B grade for a few years before stepping up to the A grade for a few more years.

He was a passionate Crows supporter, and really enjoyed watching Tex kick is 10 goals against West Coast Eagles.

He was a member of the West Torrens Football Club for many years after the late Jack Redden encouraged him to join up. His favourite footballer was Lindsay Head and sometimes attended their games at Thebarton Oval with his mates. Dad was reputed to be the best neck shearer in the district and the late Jim Dorward, a contractor he worked for in the northern shed's, said he was the best Sandy Sheep Shearer he had ever had in his team. He did some Show Shearing around the district and always seemed to bring home trophies. His highest tally was 188 at Yalpara, he had 107 out by lunch time but a cut out after lunch going on to sheep matted with Bathurst Burr robbed him of the chance to get 200. Dad described how he could hold the whole fleece up straight with the amount of burr in it.

He started shearing contracting in the early 70's and built up a run going from the north of the state down to the southeast, and sometimes into NSW.

Over the years he started a lot of local lads off into their

shearing careers, helping the employment situation in the district over several years.

Dad became involved in the racehorse industry after a short sojourn in the harness racing industry. In 1975, he was instrumental in establishing the Orroroo Gymkhana, acting as president, and calling the races.

His gift of the gab saw him in high demand all over the state for Picnic race and rodeo calling. Adding to this, his proficient no-nonsense Chute Boss attitude and his years of service to the industry saw him honoured with the prestigious inaugural 'Dick White Service to Rodeo in SA' award at the Carrieton Rodeo in 2014.

In amongst this action, he became a well-respected registered horse trainer. His big success stories came from races in Roxby, Port Lincoln, Gawler, Port Augusta, Hawker and one of his most memorable races at Morphettville winning with Elegido.

Dad and Colleen were brought together by a horse named Russell Tops that they both had a share in which went on to win the Orroroo Cup. They were married in Port Augusta on the 9th of September 1993. This began their happy life together, travelling all over, taking their horses to all these fun race meets, always chasing down that next win.

Dad was founding member of the Orroroo Gymkhana club, both holding positions, Dad being president and Colleen Treasurer.

He was also a support to Colleen for the many years as she owned the Orroroo Medicine Shop. It was delightful to see the companionship of Dad and Colleen, sharing joy and common interests over the last 30 years.

In his retirement he was a founding member of the coffee club held on a Saturday morning. With two other friends, being Rex Ackland and Ros Rasheed. Soon the club grew as these men seemed to be having too much fun.

The stories of Murray are endless.

Let's never stop sharing them and honouring such a beautiful, rough, and tough man. Brave until the end.

Steer 'em straight and drive 'em hard.

To use a John Wayne quote: 'Courage is having fear, but saddling up anyway.'



MURRAY WILLIAM SHACKLEFORD

I have known Murray since 1966 we met on an RAA call while I was working for Toop Motors. Today I will give a short resume of Murrays Local Council terms and Orroroo Bowling Club.

M W was first elected to the Orroroo Council in 1977 and continued until 1981. He was the inaugural Chairman of the Orroroo Community Cropping Committee, heavily involved in the volunteer fencing of the Crown land along Black Rock Plain and later the Walloway section. The concept was very successful especially in the early years in contributing a welcome revenue stream to participating clubs and organisations. Murray was extremely proud in bringing this concept to fruition.

In 2002 Murray was elected to the Orroroo Carrieton District Council and served until 2014 some sixteen years of community service.

MW was a long term member of the Orroroo Bowling Club from the late seventies.

He was a major sponsor in the early days, Later Murray served as a selector on a number of occasions and became Tournament Director in 2011 using his powers of persuasion to gather very good sponsor ship deals.

His playing prowess was very different, would never have a "roll up "before Pennant Matches, never waste a good bowl on practise was Murrays Motto.

Only few weeks ago during a talk about the usual weather conditions, the world's problems the Crows and of course how Fords were still better than Holden's, very enjoyable banter.

Murray mentioned the day at Crystal Brook when he donned a lace up Guernsey and played B grade I well remembered that day, I quipped to Murray about the lace up look, quick as a flash he smiled and said LOOKED GOOD FROM THE BACK.



The Advertiser (Adelaide), Friday 17 $^{\rm th}$ September 1915 THE LATE PRIVATE LW EYDEN

Private LW Eyden, the second son of Mrs C Eyden, of Brown-street, Mitcham, who has been killed at the front, was born at Wepowie in December 1882. After leaving his home he resided at Broken Hill, Nuriootpa, and Port Pirie, and about 12 years ago he left the State for Narrogin, Western Australia, where he engaged in agricultural pursuits. He returned to his home in February last, and after a short holiday he answered the call to the colors. He returned to Western Australia and joined the 6th Reinforcements, then in camp at Blackboy Hill. On June 25th he left Australia for the front, where he joined his battalion, the 16th. The news has just reached his widowed mother of his death. He possessed a bright, happy temperament, and has left many friends, both in this State and Western Australia. There are two sisters (Mrs C Chapman, Brighton, and Miss E Eyden, Mitcham), and three brothers (Messrs C Eyden, Narrogin. WA, A Eyden, Mitcham; and H Eyden, Brighton).

THE LATE PRIVATE CECIL FOULIS

News of the death of Private C Foulis, on August 20th, at Choubra Hospital, Egypt, of pneumonia, came as a shock to his relatives and friends, as he was of an exceptionally fine physique. The first news of his illness and death was received by his mother on September 4th. He was the youngest son of the late Mr George Foulis, grazier of Horrock's Pass near Wilmington, where he was born and resided until 1911, when he left to go to his brother at Oodnadatta. He left there in December, 1914, and joined the Light Horse and later he was transferred to the 4th Light Horse Field Ambulance, and he left for Egypt on June 23rd. His upright, manly character made for him a large circle of friends, by whom he was loved and respected, and great sympathy is felt for his family. He was in his 22nd year.

Quorn Mercury, Friday 28th June 1918 VIOLET DAY AT WEPOWIE

The members of the Wepowie School Committee, with parents and friends of the scholars, assembled at the school on Friday to commemorate Violet Day. The school hall was artistically decorated with garlands of violets and fern, and a lattice work of violets formed an effective background for the photos of the soldier heroes. After the reading of the roll of honour by the teacher (Miss Hill), a touching reference to the memory of the late Private Leslie Eyden, who was educated at the Wepowie School and died on a hospital ship in August, 1915, was made by Miss Chrystal.

A wreath of violets was placed above the photo of the deceased hero. Eulogistic references to the boys who had so nobly responded to the call of duty was made by Messrs C Halliday (Chairman of School Committee), T Gale, sen, and A Burley. The National Anthem, the hymns "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Lead, Kindly Light," were rendered by the children. Afternoon tea was provided by the ladies' committee.

Observer (Adelaide, SA : 1905 - 1931) Saturday 16 October 1909 - WEPOWIE ESTATE

ORROROO, October 8th. — News was received this afternoon that the Wepowie Estate has been sold to the Government at 24/ per acre. The land comprises nearly 7,300 acres, some of which is within a mile or two of Orroroo. Over 2,000 acres is splendid agricultural land, from which excellent crops have been reaped, and a large area hilly. It is generally thought that the Government has made a cheap purchase, and many people value the land at over 30/. If it is the Government's intention to subdivide the estate, there is little doubt that it will be eagerly snapped up, and there should be a good profit on the purchase.



WEPOWIE

A welcome home social was tendered to Private M Burns, Trooper P Burns and Corporal Conway, M M (a visitor), by the local residents, in the schoolroom, on Wednesday evening.

An apology was read from Sergeant J Duffy (an old scholar), who was invited but was unable to be present. There was a large attendance. The room was tastefully decorated by the Misses McCormack. A guard of honour was formed by the school children, the soldiers entering whilst "Home, Sweet Home," was sung. Pte. M Burns was absent from the district three and a half years, and saw service in Egypt and France. On behalf of the residents Miss Chrystall presented each of the guests with a pocket book. Appropriate speeches were delivered by the chairman (Mr Jas Orrock), Messrs. Gale, F F Orrock, J Halliday and Miss Chrystall. The soldiers suitably responded. A musical programme was contributed by Misses Hinton, Duffy, Irvine, and Orrock. Recitations by the school children. Mrs. Jas Orrock acted as accompanist. After singing the National Anthem and "For they are jolly good fellows," the soldiers and their relatives and friends were entertained at supper.

Lovers of the sport of kings, resident in the middle and upper north will recall George MacDonald, the owner and trainer of Possit, Vanardo, and other horses, of the useful type. Mr MacDonald died at Port Augusta about seven years ago, and his small string of horses were thus left without a trainer. Albert (his second youngest son) came back from the bush, to take charge.

A DROVER'S LIFE. The young trainer was educated at Orroroo, and at the age of 14, he began a drover's life in the employment of W ('Thackaringa Billy') Canny. Many interesting experiences were given during a chat in Mambray Lord's box at St Leonard's on Thursday. Albert has practically lived in the saddle during the past 12 years but although, he considered himself able to 'sit' most animals, he found he could not do so properly when the over seer of Mr AC MacDonald's Naryilco Station (just aver the Queensland border) threw him into the saddle aboard a 'rough up', customer, who sent him so high in the air that he imagined he was 'planing. Thackaringa Billy had previously sold George, sen, 'Vanardo, who won the Trials at half a dozen northern meetings before he sold him to Jim Cummings, who went on and took the Chinkford Trial at Martindale, and subsequently struck trouble at Jamestown with the Pilgrim gelding, Pinballie and Lullabar were in work when Albert's late father took ill, and he did well with both of them in the following summer. He trained and rode the horses attached to the Orroroo stable for many years, and will be remembered as the pilot of Ghardor (owned by Mr Tom Couzens), which had previously performed splendidly when trained by Peter Timmens. For MacDonald he won the Squatters' Cup at Port Augusta, the Mannahill Cup, the Quorn Handicap, the double at Orroroo, and the sprint race at Peterborough.

Baran Rose was a speedy mare which won a race at Port Adelaide, and eight others at country meetings.

The Other Brother

When Albert decided to ride at metropolitan fixtures it became necessary for him to relinquish training horses, and the young brother, George, took his place. The Lastnamed has now (in addition to Mam bray Lord and other in the city), eight horses at Orroroo.

He will remain at the northern home, but Albert intends to settle in Adelaide as a public trainer sometime during the winter. The boys have been the breadwinners for years, and are hard workers, like their father, who was favourably known in the outback shearing sheds before he took to training horses.

Mambray Lord

Mambray Lord is a brown gelding, six years old, and was bred by Mr W Dahlenberg, at Mambray Creek, near to Port Germein. Mr Dahlenberg also bred Mambray Star, another good stake winner in the north. Lord Alwyne (the sire of the third horse to finish in the Adelaide Cup) is standing at Orroroo, at a fee of £10 10/, so that northern owners with well-bred mares may be considered fortunate.

Mambray Lord's dam, Cypria, is own sister to Sanskrit, a Derby winner. She was by Aryan— Tarlock. Mr J Dally (a storekeeper at Port Germein) is having quite a good innings with Mambray Lord, who, among others, landed the chief races at the following meetings: - Port Pirie (twice), Laura (twice), Crystal Brook, Orroroo, Port Broughton, Georgetown and Booleroo Centre (twice). His condition reflects credit upon George MacDonald. When the Lord Alwyne gelding left Orroroo the general opinion was that he had absolutely no chance in the Adelaide Cup. Yet he was the first horse to wheel into the straight.
