PROJECT DELIVERS FOR ORROROO CARRIETON

The District Council of Orroroo Carrieton has delivered the \$1 million drought response and resilience project funded by the Australian Government under round two of the Drought Communities Programme.

Delivered amidst the challenges of pandemic restrictions and ongoing supply shortages the projects have boosted the local economy, created employment and contributed to the resilience of communities throughout the district through new and improved community infrastructure.

Mayor Kathie Bowman said the second round of the program followed a time-critical, yet most successful first round in 2019.

"Council was under pressure to deliver the first round, however had more time in round 2 to undertake broad consultation of the community to develop the project", she said.

"A truly rewarding part of this project was that it was achieved with the community behind it from the planning stage", Mayor Bowman said.

Outcomes include improving the district's water security through installation of additional large water tanks and bores to meet emergency services and business needs, increased storm-water capture and a new automated irrigation system at the Orroroo Recreation Ground.

New facilities were built for youth and outdoor recreation at the Lions Nature Park and Orroroo Recreation Ground. Working with small business and community groups the project delivered much-needed upgrades at existing facilities such as the RSL, swimming pool, bowling club and cemeteries.

In alignment with its Tourism Master Plan, Council also invested in local attractions, trails and picnic campgrounds, which are important in furthering the districts potential in the tourism industry. Visitors to the area now enjoy upgraded walking and driving trails along the Pekina Creek and Reservoir.

Message from the Mayor



Rob and I subscribe to the Advertiser and The Australian newspapers online. It is a ritual every morning, before anything else, for me to download the entire Advertiser and read it. I also read the home page articles and the commentary sections of The Australian. It's amazing how the same set of news items can evoke such different slants from both papers from headlines, editorials and certainly from Letters to the Editor. It's the same with people's attitude too I suppose, whether you're a person who sees the cup half full or half empty.

We're experiencing challenging times here in Australia at the moment and the media coverage of this pandemic can become overwhelming at times. I know since we watch the commentary on Sky News every night after sitting through Chris Kenny, Peta Credlin and Andrew Bolt we're looking for a break from Alan Jones and sometimes Paul Murray. It simply becomes too much of the same thing.

It also depends on their slant on things and the people they interview and the politicians viewpoints as well as to our take on the day's events if we wish to be influenced in that manner. I suppose that's why we watch Sky, being full of conservative commentators it tends to appeal to our conservative thinking.

It seems however, that some sections of the media and certain politicians are determined to appeal to the feelings of a glass half empty and "scaremongering" tactics. It doesn't help if you're feeling vulnerable to be told constantly how bad things are. You might start to believe it.

I was in Adelaide yesterday for an audience with Minister Basham and our local member Dan van Holst Pellekaan. I was relieved that we were able to dispense with our masks during that meeting but I was quite comfortable wearing one on the tram, in McDonalds and anywhere there was close community contact. Just to be on the safe side.

We are truly lucky here in our country environment. We go to work, we go to school, we play sport and we watch sport. In fact we do everything pretty much as "normal" (whatever that is!). We should all continue to lead our lives in that way. As the general public move towards that 70% to 80% vaccination target we need to have confidence that our country will once again become one and not the fragmented set of states it is at the moment. In the meantime, living in Orroroo is about as glass half full as you can get.

Ordinary Meeting: Council held its ordinary meeting on Wednesday 25th August 2021 in the Orroroo Council Chambers. Minutes are now available via www.orroroo.sa.gov.au. The next ordinary meeting is scheduled for 9am Wednesday 22nd September 2021. Council papers will be available to the public as normal via Council's website.

Confirmed Closure: Following public consultation between 15th July 2021 and 12th August 2021 Council has confirmed the closure of portion of Paratoo Road South (PP21/0016) and portion of West Terrace, Orroroo (PP21/0017).

Orroroo Heavy Vehicle Bypass: The construction of the Heavy Vehicle Bypass has now progressed to a section of Railway Tce. Seal works will soon commence on Weighbridge Road. Council would like to remind residents that the best access to and from the eastern-end of Orroroo is via Seventh Street and Paratoo South Road (from Railway Tce) during this time.

Save the Date: Official launch of the Black Rock Woolpress rotunda (fondly referred to as "the woolshed") Wednesday 27th October 2021 at 12pm.

After hours Duty Officer: To improve our service delivery Council has implemented an afterhours Duty Officer. Active construction sites: There are currently a number of active construction sites in public areas which restrict public access in Orroroo. Weighbridge Road, and the Second Street Median Strip (Eastern-end) are ongoing work sites, frequented by heavy machinery and operational staff. Please respect and obey relevant closure signs or speed reductions (when they apply), they are for your safety after all.

EARLY INTERVENTION OF NEW AND EMERGING WEEDS

Weeds can invade new areas, spreading across the landscape both naturally and assisted by human activity. Finding new weeds early and completely removing them is the best way to stop them from becoming widespread and prevent the need for long-term management.

Our Early Intervention Handbook guides land managers through the process of:

- detecting new weeds
- deciding if eradication is suitable
- carrying out an eradication response.

To support the handbook, an Early intervention resources document and four templates can be used to assist with detecting and responding to new weeds.

CFS FACT SHEET

Preparing your home for bushfires



- Keep gutters clean and free of debris.
 - Mow, rake and weed to remove fine fuels within 20 metres of your home.
 - Prune shrubs so that their tops are well away from the lower branches of trees.
 - Prune lower branches of shrubs and trees to separate the foliage from the ground fuels underneath.
 - Reduce loose bark, dead twigs, leaves or branches from your yard.
 - Move firewood and flammable items (such as paper recycling, boxes and crates) further away from your home.
- Other steps to prepare**
- Have a Bushfire Survival Plan, no matter where you live, and practise it throughout the year.
 - Prepare an Emergency Kit.
 - Stay informed during the Fire Danger Season by monitoring multiple sources of information (TV, radio, CFS Website, social media, Bushfire Information Hotline).
 - Learn about bushfire behaviour and how to survive by visiting the CFS website (www.cfs.sa.gov.au).

If you and your home are not fully prepared for a bushfire, or if you have any doubts about your ability to defend your home, you should plan to leave early.

Upper North Farming Systems

Media Release – Thursday 26th August 2021

Upper North Farming Systems Members Expo - Thursday September 9th 2021

“Productive and Profitable Soils and Systems”

Upper North Farming Systems will gather for their Annual Members Event on Thursday, September 9th 2021, at the Booleroo Centre Civic Centre. This year's event is focused on “Productive and Profitable Soils and Systems” celebrating the complexity of developing and maintaining a resilient farming operation built on healthy, functional soils in the Upper North of South Australia.

Aimed at providing up to date information relevant to all farmers and advisors, this event is unique in the region, focusing on productivity and profitability across all areas of livestock and cropping enterprises and improving how the farm business is run.

Keynote Speaker Dr Mark Farrell (CSIRO) is a biogeochemist with particular interest in the interactions between organic carbon and nitrogen in soils, and the importance of these on ecosystem function and agricultural productivity. His research spans fundamental work to identify and isolate important functional processes through to broad applied studies where outcomes are delivered to partners in industry and government. He has studied many different land uses and ecosystems within Australia and internationally, and he seeks to find commonalities and differences in processes and function between these. A long-standing interest of his has been the competition between plants and microorganisms for different nitrogen forms, particularly dissolved organic nitrogen (DON), and the hitherto unrecognised role this pool of reactive N may play in agricultural plant nutrition. He will be presenting on soil carbon dynamics and how to improve soil health and function through improved agronomic systems.

The session with Mark will be split, with a more formal presentation in the hall in the morning followed by a trial site visit at the end of the day with a soil pit inspection and discussion. The trial site, provided by Andrew Walter, has been established by UNFS and SARDI and will be a highlight of the day with farmers and advisors getting a hands on look at new pasture and rotation options, and soil improving crop mixes that may help to tackle the rising levels of root disease in the region, improve overall soil function and water holding capacity, and ultimately help the bottom line. Speakers at the trial site include Penny Roberts and Sarah Day, SARDI Clare, Beth Sleep, Elders Jamestown, Jess Koch, Breezy Hill Precision Ag and Michael Eyres, Field Systems (Australia) SA.

Soils won't be the only topic for the day. The systems we use and the way we implement management practices is key to long term profitability. David Cooper, CC Cooper & Co., is talking on their experience on establishing profitable and rewarding systems through diversification. CC Cooper and Co. is a Jamestown based family business now spanning 3 states and multiple properties. Opportunistic expansion, people management and a focus on genetics are just some of the ways the Cooper family has built their Merino and cropping operation into a productive and sustainable business over five generations.

How we tackle the tasks at hand and the behaviour within our farming enterprise is key to how we navigate the tough times and the good that farming brings. Thanks to funding from the Future Drought Fund and Northern and Yorke Landscape Board we can bring Steph Schmidt

and the ACT for AG program to the Upper North with the first session being held at the expo. There are then 4 free follow up sessions online available for 10 people from the region to hone their skills in adapting their behaviours and building their farming family resilience.

The early afternoon session will be jam packed with practical tips to improve your farming landscape and systems with presentations on Integrated Pest Management - planning for a pest resilient landscape with Michael Nash, Reducing Crown Rot with Marg Evans and our expo favourite the Farmer Panel which this year will feature the highlights from the Sheep Technology Group and their actions to upgrade their flock management.

Soils, agronomy, pastures, sheep and bringing it all together to have a healthy landscape, bottom line and farming families will all be the focus of the day. Productive and Profitable Soils and Systems are key to building a better farming enterprise in the Upper North.

Registrations open at 8.30am for a 9am start. The UNFS Members Expo will also incorporate the Annual General Meeting at 9.25am. Main presentations will wrap up at 5.00PM with a networking session to follow. New members are welcome to come and register on the day or through our website. Annual Memberships are from \$50 - \$125 (individual – business) which includes entry to the event, all catering on the day, regular newsletters, seasonal updates, spring crop walk entry, discounts for training events and an Annual Research Compendium. 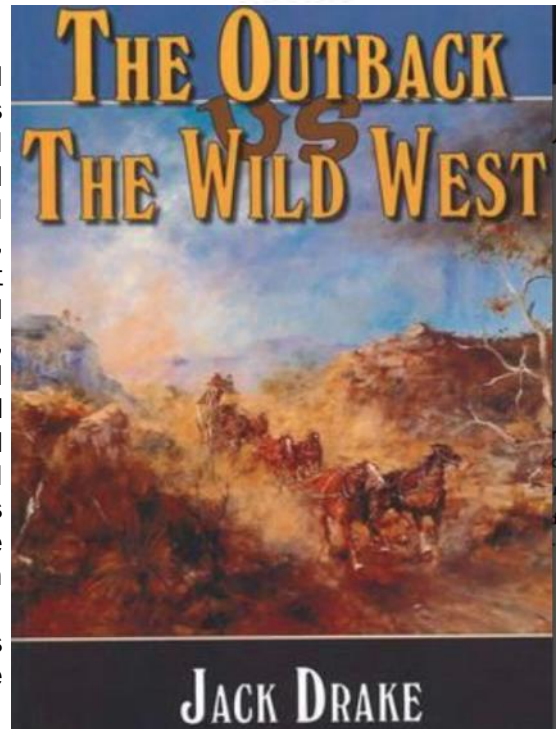

Looking Back

Looking back at a local connection with the Australian 'Wild West'.

Mick Kuerschner recently alerted John Mannion to a book he had loaned to someone and never got back. The book, *The Outback vs The Wild West*, was one of two put together by a Jack Drake and focuses on how the Australian Outback and the American Wild West were two of the last frontiers in the territorial conquest and expansions of the 19th century. These frontier territories were wild, lawless and extremely colourful. Although the American Wild West has been celebrated over and over in Hollywood films and countless books, including 'Larry and Stretch' paperback westerns, Australians have been much slower to embrace the heroes and heroines of the development of our Outback - famous pastoral explorers and drovers; poddy-dodgers and horse thieves; land grabbesheers; colourful females on the frontier; Cobb and Co and puffing billies; rough riders and rodeos. While South Australia is mentioned in the book, along with the Marrabel Rodeo, the legendary Curio and roughriders including Dick White, Billy Austin and Buddy Gravener, the former Pekina Station is not.

From the 1840s until the 1870s, Pekina and several of its adjoining stations or sheep runs were household names in the local, national and international sheep and wool industry...

We have been told by a sheep farmer just arrived in town that they are at Pekina [Station] 20,000 sheep awaiting to be drafted off to the new Northern territory as soon as the land can be taken up.

OBITUARY

MR. F. C. STAER, PETERBOROUGH.

Another of the pioneers of the North has passed away in the person of Mr Frederick C Staer, who underwent an operation at the North Adelaide Hospital on Monday morning, November 14, and never rallied. The deceased was born in Germany on 23rd April, 1854, and came with his family to Australia when about six years of age. The family, settled at Lobethal. While still in his teens the deceased came to the north and finally settled in Morchard, where he married Mary Ann, the eldest daughter of the late John Ryan, of Clare. His wife died about twenty-six years ago. There are two daughters from the marriage (Miss Ethel Staer, of Largs, and Mrs. WH Bennett, of Peterborough and seven grandchildren.

The deceased was in business at different times in Pekina, Dawson, Peterborough, Oodnadatta, and Apsley (Vic), and was one of the best known men in the North. He was of a jovial nature, very charitable and sympathetic, most energetic and active, enjoying wonderful health and strength right up to the Friday before his death. In 1891 he came to Peterborough and took a partnership in the butchering business of Staer and Hugo, and in 1888 he built the Federal Hotel here. He took a very active part in public and municipal matters, sat in the Council for seven years, doing his full share in pushing forward the claims of the town,

and considerably helped to bring about much of its progress and prosperity. No sporting club or fixture was complete without his assistance, both officially and financially. At Oodnadatta he was instrumental in bringing about many changes and improvements, principal amongst which was the laying on to the town of the water from the bore, which has proved such a boon, the water having previously to be carried by the blacks. Oodnadatta has been much beautified, and has every reason to remember his public spiritedness. He was a firm and constant friend, and this circle was very large, and the magnitude of the assistance rendered to those in misfortune is only known to those concerned. He was a staunch Australian, and his heart was always in the North. Some years ago he retired from business and lived first at Magill and later at Largs Bay, where he was also interested in public matters, although he would not accept any public positions. He was never idle and his energy and enthusiasm and joviality were always surprising to his many friends.

The body was brought to Peterborough on Tuesday, November 15, for interment with his wife in the local cemetery, when Rev. Father Ryan officiated at the church and graveside. The bearers, members of the local branch of the HACBS, were Messrs J Blunsden, MT Roche, J English, JP Keane, E Chambers, and J Casey.

Looking Back

The Mail (Adelaide), Saturday 16 October 1915
A PATHFINDER PASSED AWAY
THE LATE MR. STEPHEN KING
OLD TIMES IN THE INTERIOR
WITH McDOUALL STUART'S BAND

The death of Mr Stephen King has removed a well-known explorer and pioneer surveyor from our midst. Although a sufferer for many years from a malady resultant on fevers contracted in the tropics, he was in fairly good health until a few days ago, when he caught a chill, and after a short and painful illness died quite suddenly.

Mr King was the last surviving member in Australia of the memorable expedition across Australia led by that gallant and intrepid leader John McDouall Stuart in 1861-1863, the sole survivor being his cousin, and brother-in-law, Mr JW Billiatt, now living in Devonshire, England. Mr King was the scion of an old English county family, and the only son of Stephen King, of Braceby Hall, Holton-le-Clavs, and Kelby, Lincolnshire, who with his wife and family arrived at Holdfast Bay in the sailing ship Orleana in 1839. Mr Stephen King (Snr), will also be recalled as one of the first sheepmen who ever took up land north of Adelaide, and contemporary with Messrs Ross Reed, WP Murray, and others who applied for the Gawler special survey. The survey granted consisted of 20,000 acres, and on the part allotted to him on the North Para River Mr King established Kingsford Station. Here Stephen, the subject of this article, was born in the year 1841. His early education was gained under private tutors, including Messrs AK Varley, James Fawcett and Dr WM Dickenson, and subsequently he was trained under the late Canon Coombs and Dean Russell, and also at Mr JL Young's academy. While at the last-named school he joined the crowd that cheered Howitt the explorer and his party on their return from their explorations. Fired

with the spirit of adventure, he left his fathers station in 1861, and from October 1 of that year to February 1863 endured great hardships in the 5,000 miles journey of Stuart's transcontinental party. It was Mr King who made the sketches for Stuart, and who branded the trees which left records of the track northward. One of the trees was subsequently discovered by Mr GR McMinn. The strenuous life he led during the time did not quench his ardour for bush experience, and in 1863 he was in the employ of Messrs Fisher and Rochefort travelling stock from Pekina [Station] to Gunnawarra, near Swan Hill (Vic) - 680km. He next took up pastoral country on his own account, but the life did not suit his wandering spirit, also this was a time of drought and desolation, and even his fathers bid to sell up his properties — Kingsford, Outalpa, and Baldana— and take up a post under the Government.

In 1864 Mr Stephen King took charge of the stock in the SS South Australian [steam ship], bound for the Adam Bay settlement, in the Northern Territory, and remained there for several years in the employ of the Government as a surveyor. Exploration fever gripping him again he joined Litchfield's party, which traversed the head waters of the Adelaide River, and discovered the Reynolds and Finnis River and much good country. In this expedition he had charge of the horse party, and during the journey was seized with fever and ague, his life being almost despaired of and he was carried back in a litter for more than a week's march to the depot. An advance party secured the aid of Dr Ninnis, who, after a two days' ride, came to the relief of the patient and ordered his return to Adelaide. On his return to Adelaide King was employed by the Government Survey Department in various surveying projects around the colony...

Quorn Mercury, 4 August 1922

YATINA HALL.,

Saturday afternoon, July 29th will long be remembered as a red-letter day in the history of Yatina. Beautiful sunshine prevailed, and a crowd assembled to witness the ceremony of laying the foundation stone of Yatina hall. The hall is being built in memory of fallen soldiers of the district. The president of the hall committee (Mr L Travers) was the first speaker, and he claimed to be the proudest man in Yatina that day, when the hope of years was being fulfilled, and the hall building had begun. And he spoke of the various ups and downs of the committee; but work and concerted efforts the dream was to become reality. Mr Travers then called on Mrs JD Jeff [s] to perform the laying of the stone. When the stone was placed in position by the contractor, Mrs Jeff declared the stone well and truly laid, and in a few well chosen words thanked the people and committee for the honor they had given her by asking her to perform the ceremony. It was fitting that Mrs Jeff should have the honor, as one of her sons made the supreme sacrifice in the great war. Other speakers were Messrs JW Burton (secretary), E Ballantyne, and A Healy. The people stood in silence for a while in memory of the boys in whose memory the hall is built. The president asked the people to support the building fund, and gifts amounting to £20 were laid on the stone. Afternoon tea was served in Giles Hall, and the ladies of Yatina are to be complimented on the beautiful spread they set before the people. The public will hear more of this hall when the opening ceremony takes place, probably in October.

YATINA MEMORIAL HALL

A spectacle of unusual interest, and enthusiasm was witnessed at Yatina on Tuesday, 3rd inst. The centre of attraction of what proved to be a most entertaining and enjoyable function, was the opening of a recently erected soldiers' memorial hall. Although the district of Yatina has reason to be proud of the many stalwart soldiers who gave it representations Bottom of Form in the recent conflict of nations, its residents, realising that comparisons are odious, do not extend their claims further than they should praise a fitting monument to memorialise the deeds of their gallant dead.

With this object in view, that which has for some time past been the desire and -the ambition of the Yatina people is now an accomplished fact, and a memorial hall, copious in its dimensions and exquisite in its design, now stands as a land mark, on which any town might- pride itself. The opening of the hall was a matter of very keen interest in and around Yatina for many weeks prior to the event, nor was this enthusiasm of purely local import, as was amply evidenced by the concourse of people from far distant places who

assembled to witness the performance.

In the early afternoon, Mr M Redden, of Pekina, after having been duly introduced by Mr L Travers, and received with much applause, proceeded to perform the opening ceremony. In doing so he commented very graciously, on the activities of the committee of management, and congratulated the supporters of the movement on their successful achievement of such a creditable object.

During the remainder of the afternoon a football match was played between teams representative of Pekina and Mannanarie, respectively and simultaneously the whole of the town being en fete, the extensive capacity of the hall was adequately taxed by many merry-makers, who partook of the miscellaneous assortment of wares and fancy goods, to be obtained from the numerous prettily decorated and smartly attended stalls. The stall-holders were Mesdames Travers, Sheridan (2), Healy, Fyfe, McCallum, and Symons, while Mr Healy conducted the cool drinks and fruit stall.

In the evening, after partaking of a very hearty and daintily served repast in the annex to the new building, those present were treated to a most entertaining musical programme. The refreshments were served during, the afternoon and evening by Miss Reidy (in charge), Mesdames Symons, Earle, Travers, McKay, Tohl and others.

The concert programme was submitted by Mesdames Jones, Tanner, Misses Fyfe, McNamara, Williams, Howard, O'Donnell, Dunn, Symons, Messrs. Howard and McNamara.

The ugly man competition was won by Mr AT Symons, with Mr Ern Casey second. This was followed, in due-course by supper and dance, at which dancers, approximately three hundred in number, attended and gaily trod "the light fantastic toe" until the small hours of the following morning, Mr P Gleeson acting as M C

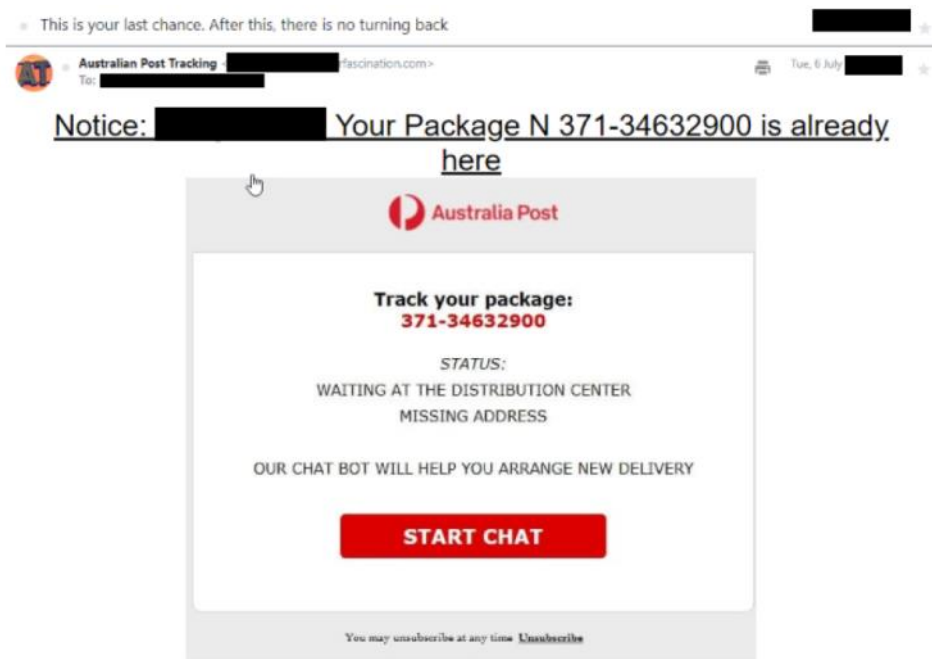
At the conclusion of the programme it was generally recognised that the entertainment had been most efficiently organised and most thoroughly appreciated, the dominating keynote throughout being one of perfect harmony and concord amongst all concerned. Apart from the monetary consideration of the celebration, which was financially successful, par excellence over £175 being raised, it was a gratifying treat to witness the reassembly in the town of many of its former residents.

The building, which reflects credit on the contractor (Mr JG Crowhurst, of Yongala) and cost £540, was opened free of debt. In view of the enormous success of the first entertainment in the new memorial hall, with its glacial floor and enchanting music, those within the district are justly entitled to look forward with expectancy to many a merry dance and pleasurable evening's entertainment. The football match was won by Mannanarie.

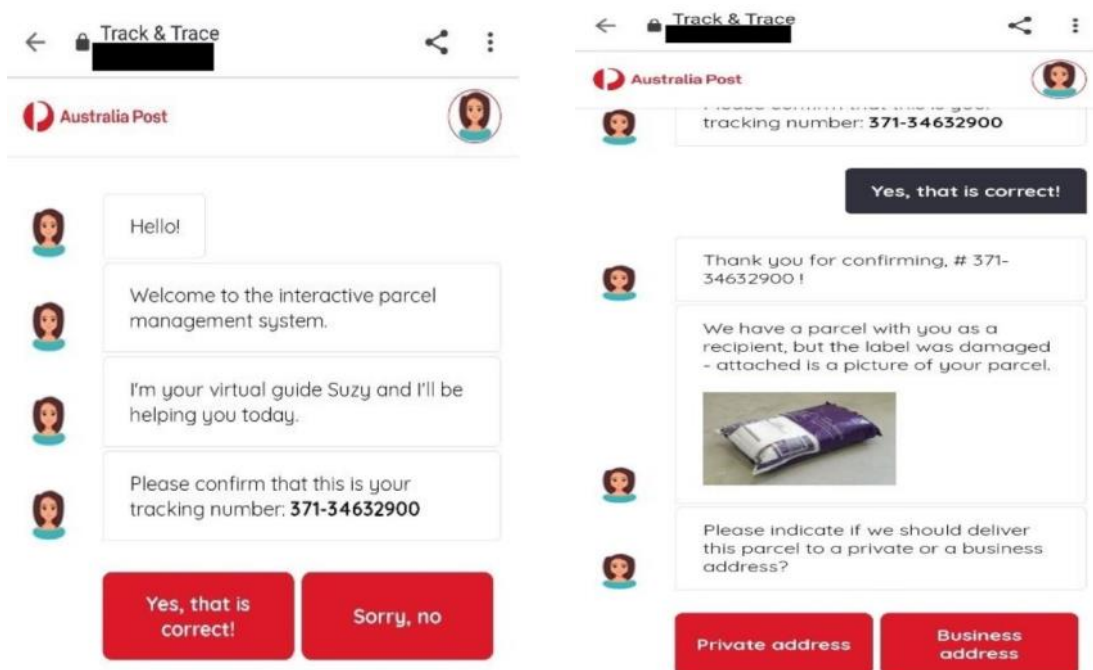

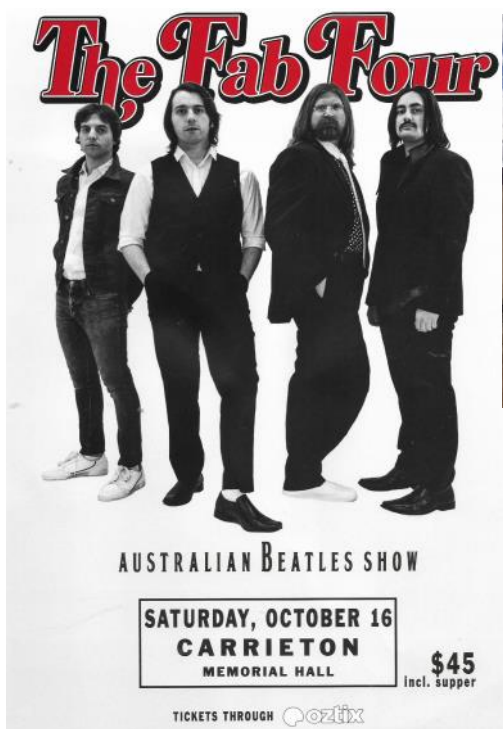
