

The Mid North Suicide Prevention Network Thanks Orroroo

The Mid North Suicide Prevention Network, was thrilled to receive a donation from the Orroroo Community from stubby holder donations at the Despite the Dust Community Muster. A huge thank you to everyone who contributed to the event and the donation!

The Mid North Suicide Prevention Network (MNSPN) was established in 2017 and aims to raise awareness, increase mental health literacy, and reduce the stigma related to mental illness and suicide. Statistics show that people living rural populations are 2 times more likely to die by suicide than those living in metropolitan areas, therefore, we see our work as incredibly important to our region. Within this mission statement, we aim to help the community through difficult times, create opportunities to enhance well-being and support local initiatives that make our region a supportive and engaging place to live.

The committee are not mental health professionals, although some of our committee members do have knowledge and expertise in the mental health area, we do not provide mental health services. MNSPN are individuals in our region who are passionate about; connecting with others, promoting the importance of talking about mental health, suicide and expanding services locally. Members are from Jamestown, Terowie, Hallett, Booborowie, Spalding, Caltowie and Clare. Anyone is welcome to join or come along to a meeting. Meetings Feb – Nov., first Tuesday of the month, 8pm.

We hold a wide range of events and support other local groups. Our 2018 launch event was an incredibly powerful night, with people sharing their lived experiences with suicide, former AFL footballer Wayne Schwass sharing his story. Since then, we have run several education events helping people to Facebook have difficult conversations about suicide, aware of the supports available and promoting how to maintain good mental health. We have run a Mental Health First Aid education session, hosted a Lifeline REACH training program, hosted Kate Gunn (Founder of the iFarmWell program), promotion at the Caltowie Chilled Out and Fired Up Music Festival. Each year, we also host an 'Out of the Shadows" walk, an event designed to support grief. Due to the pandemic we supported the Jamestown Journal with much needed funding and well-being articles. Most recently we attended the Orroroo 'Blue Day' in support of October Wellbeing Month.

Living in a rural community, men are sadly over represented as a greater risk, we have created a



Secret Men's Business group to bring men together in a relaxed and social way. Secret Men's Business have coordinated crop inspections, Steam Town visits and a BBQ Masterclass, collaborations with Bundaleer Motorcycle Club and APEX Club for example, Mary O'Brien and her "Are you bogged, mate" presentation.

Our current projects include: A quarterly "New Connections Event" aimed to bring people who are new to the community or who are hoping to connect with others. A Labyrinth arts/mindfulness project creating a beautiful place to walk, reflect and empathise. Parkrun free walk, jog, run, volunteer, or spectate weekly Saturday community event is due to start up Feb. next year and well-being drink coasters are in the planning phase.

As you can see, we have a lot happening, we sincerely extend a welcoming invitation to anyone from the Orroroo community to join the group or any of these projects.

In 2020, Robert Atkins, then a 31 year old man from the southern suburbs of Adelaide, is alleged to have been held captive for about a week before being forced to commit crimes for his captors.

obeyed the direction of his captors he would be let go. The last known sighting of Robert was captured on CCTV, where he is seen to be in the presence of another man and purchases items from a store. Both are seen leaving the store together.

Robert is believed to have been murdered within the area of Port Pirie and Booborowie and his body left near Orroroo. The vehicle believed used by the suspect was captured by a safety camera on its way back to Adelaide near Willaston.

That car was a 2010 black Jeep Cherokee registered number S556AJE.

The Task Force is made up of 42 personnel including. In February 2019, it is alleged that Trevor King, then a investigators and intelligence officers led by Detective 41 year old man from the southern suburbs was the Superintendent Des Bray who stated, 'Task Force victim of unlawful detention and serious assaults, Southern is one of the largest task forces of its type resulting from a drug debt. The drug debt was initially assembled by SAPOL using a handpicked team of \$1000. However, this was increased to \$10,000; and experienced detectives, intelligence officers and then \$50,000, due to the lack of a timely payment to the people he owed the money.



Service Planning for Mid North Health Services

Clinician engagement

On the evening 10th November 2021, 55 clinicians and partners gathered at the Peterborough Town Hall, to contribute to lively discussions about the future needs and opportunities for Mid North Health Services including Booleroo Centre, Jamestown, Orroroo & Peterborough considering hospitals, community health and mental health as part of the current service planning process. A range of clinicians attended the evening including Hospital and Health clinical staff, community health staff, local GP, Universities, the value of having transport, private aged care, the Mid North Health of other clinicians. Advisory Council, SAPOL and SA Ambulance Service.

A data gallery of current services and projected future data was provided for participants to view and discuss on arrival. Chief Executive Officer, Roger Kirchner opened the evening setting the scene with his vison

for the Health Services. Small table discussions were held in two rounds across four priority areas selected by the service planning steering group; general medical (including cancer care, palliative care, surgical services), mental health, aged care and out of hospital strategies.

The information gathered from the range of perspectives in the room, including strategic advice is being collated for consideration by the steering group. A number of participants commented positively about the value of having authentic conversations with a mix of other clinicians.

An online survey was provided to gather input from those who could not attend and from other Yorke and Northern Local Health Network staff and other stakeholders. The survey responses have been included in the clinician engagement report that will considered by the steering group. Targeted clinician and stakeholder engagement is occurring in November and December.

Furthermore, two months of community consultation has been completed with the local communities.

Information gathered via the workshop, survey, community and other engagement methods will directly inform the development of the future service plan for Mid North Health Services.





Damage at Orroroo. Mr James Wilkinson for Bagot, Shakes, and Lewis Ltd, brought to the Register office on Thursday, samples of immature fruit and other specimens damaged by grasshoppers in the garden of his son, Mr SR Wilkinson, at Orroroo. The destructive pest has completely eaten the green fruit of peaches and apricots and left the stone, and green pears, apples and almonds have been damaged severely. A dahlia bulb has been scoured right out. The grasshoppers have ruined practically the whole of Mr Wilkinson's fruit crop.


