The traditional community breakfast attracted more than 150 people to celebrate Australia Day on January 26th at the Orroroo Lions Park.

A beautiful sunny morning welcomed the crowd to the park, which was shaded by the many red gums - providing cool relief following a fortnight of extreme heat throughout the area.

With stomachs filled, it was time for master of ceremonies Dylan Strong to commence with the program.

In the official Australia Day address, Councillor Chairman Kathie Bowman reflected on resilience and the importance of recognition of community members.

“Today here in Orroroo, we celebrate all that is good about this place and its people, even after a tough year”,

“We celebrate what people, individuals and groups, have given this community over so very many years, and how fortunate we are to have benefited from their endeavours,” she said.

Guest speaker and Australia Day Ambassador Peter Goers joined the festivities and entertained the crowd by recollecting his own experiences in the area. Mr Goers also assisted Chairman Bowman in presenting the Australian Day awards to this year’s winners.

Mr Malcolm Byerlee, flanked by his family, accepted the award for Citizen of the Year. Kate Case was the recipient of the Young Citizen of the Year, while the Paint Orroroo Pink event was awarded the Community Event of the Year.

A special presentation to close the official proceedings included a Lighthorse display, by Mick Batchelor.

Orroroo Carrieton Council CEO Dylan Strong cited the success of the event, which attracted a large crowd from across the district.

“As a new-comer to this community I was most pleased with the attendance, and the support of volunteers to make it happen was fantastic”,

“I look forward to continuing our support for the breakfast, and building on the program to ensure we cater for all ages”, he said.

Malcolm Byerlee – Citizen of the Year

Malcolm Byerlee of Orroroo has been awarded the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton Citizen of the Year for 2019 for his service to Local Government and the wider community.



Encouraged by several people in the Carrieton area, Malcolm nominated and became a Councillor on 4th May 1987 for the District Council of Carrieton. He held this position including a time as Chairman and Deputy Chairman until amalgamation with Orroroo in 1997. Continuing with the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton as Chairman for one term and Deputy Chairman for several terms, Malcolm has only just retired as Councillor on 10th November 2018 – some 31 ½ years in total.

Whilst being on Council, Malcolm was involved with many extra Committees such as Central Flinders Soil Board, Upper North Animal & Plant Board, Northern Regional Development Board, Central North East Farm Assistance Program, Locust & Plague Grasshopper Reference Group, Northern & Yorke Natural Resource Management Board, Section 41 Committees of Council (Water, Works, etc), Orroroo Silo Committee, Orroroo Hospital Health Board, Northern Passenger Transport Committee, to name a few.

Malcolm has volunteered with many community groups over numerous years including the Carrieton Rodeo Club, Carrieton School Council, Orroroo Area School, Carrieton Centenary Committee, Carrieton Swimming Pool and Carrieton Recreation Grounds.

Malcolm's volunteering commenced with the Carrieton Rodeo Club as a 19 year old helping to build the original Carrieton Rodeo complex. Since then he has always been involved with replacing, rebuilding, repairing and volunteering for the Rodeo Club, also Treasurer for some years during the 1960's.

With his 4 children all attending school at Carrieton from 1969 onwards, Malcolm was a Member of School Council, holding several Office positions over the years. This continued on at the Orroroo Area School as well. Busy Bees, building, establishing the School Oval at Orroroo, including the watering system and greening of the Oval. He was School Council Chairman during this period which managed to establish Year 12 & Ag Studies.

In 1976 the Carrieton Centenary Committee was established to plan for the Centenary held in April 1978, Malcolm was Chairman of this Committee involving lots of meetings, research, planning and organisation for the three day event which was very successful.

Around the same time as this after transporting children in very hot weather, in overloaded cars for a number of years it was decided that a Public Pool was required and would be built at Carrieton. Malcolm was involved with the Committee that was formed to achieve this goal, holding several Office positions. The Change Rooms, Canteen building and fencing was all built by local volunteer labour. Other Carrieton building activities that Malcolm was involved with were Recreation Clubrooms, Memorial Hall, Council Depot/CFS Works Shed and many Community Ablution buildings.

With the new Tennis Courts at the Carrieton Recreation Grounds having failed, it was decided to relay them with cement. Malcolm along with others took on a major role in laying two new concrete courts and preparing for the following two courts, which were laid by contractors.

After being approached by the District Council of Carrieton in 1982 to sharefarm areas of the Stock Route for a Community fundraiser, Malcolm and his family offered to do the farming on a costs only basis not sharefarming. This led to areas being fenced and stocked for this purpose. This is still an ongoing and substantial money raising venture for the Community.

Malcolm has also taken on the role of Public Officer with the Orroroo Equine Club and is encouraging and helping to revitalise the Club, making it more family friendly and better use to the local youngsters and their horses. A little known fact is that Malcolm is allergic to horses and cows!!

Kate Case – Young Citizen of the Year

Kate Case has been awarded the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton Young Citizen of the Year for 2019 for her representation of the Orroroo community through various sports and involvement in school events.

Kate, 15 years old, is about to commence Year 11 at the Orroroo Area School and is a very talented sportswoman playing several sports including netball and football. Playing for Orroroo and representing Orroroo in the Northern Areas Netball Association (NANA), Kate has been successful, winning the Best and Fairest Award for her grade.

Kate's biggest sporting achievement to date has been in Women's AFL football, having been selected in the South Australian Under 15s Girls team after playing in the local Women's league where she won the Best & Fairest Award and Most Goals. This led to her being selected to represent Australia to play in an International Hybrid Rules competition being held in Europe in January 2019.

Kate has also achieved in athletics, representing Mid North Secondary Education Cluster (MNSEC) in Adelaide with a 2nd Place in Hurdles.

Her dedication to sport is huge, travelling to Adelaide each weekend for training for whichever discipline, doing her homework in the car on the way down and still achieving high grades.

Kate also excels in her schooling with a role on the Student Representative Council (SRC) and being an officer bearer with her sporting house. Her dedication was acknowledged in 2018 when she won the Australian Defence Force Long Tan Youth Leadership & Team Award at the Orroroo Area School. The Award recognises students who demonstrate leadership and teamwork within both the school and the broader community and who display strong values, such as doing one's best, respect for others and mateship.

In 2018 Kate undertook a Community Studies Project with the marking of unmarked graves at the Hammond Cemetery. The project has pushed Kate outside of her comfort zone, writing letters to Council, working with local historians to obtain information on the graves and seeking quotes for materials for the crosses that she has placed to mark the 56 graves.

Paint Orroroo Pink - Community Event of the Year

Paint Orroroo Pink has been awarded the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton Community Event of the Year for 2019.

The event, organised by the Orroroo Regional Tourism Group, was a huge success, raising \$8,050.60 for the Pink Ribbon Foundation. Paint Orroroo Pink held during October 2018 was a month long celebration of all things pink. Businesses, sporting clubs and residents all got on board, holding events, dressing up and decorating their properties. The main street of Orroroo was decorated with pink ribbon along with the entrances to Orroroo including the kangaroos and horses.

The event kicked off with the Pink Tennis Tournament hosted by the Orroroo Tennis Club followed by 'A Day of Elegance' including a fashion parade, Bra Lady popup shop and hand massages.

Pink Day was held on 26th October which included a cake stall, strawberry fete and a Pink Parade involving the Orroroo Area School students. Competitions for the best dressed individual, best dressed group, best decorated business and best decorated house/street were awarded.

The Pink Breakfast, hosted by the Orroroo Hotel, was also well received with a good number of attendees supporting the event.

Other businesses also got behind the event, with the sale of some items donated to the cause. The Orroroo Quilters Group donated 12 quilts to the McGrath Foundation which were displayed in the Town Hall during the month. Some quilts will be auctioned at the McGrath High Tea to raise money for the Breast Care Nurses Australia wide with the remainder gifted to volunteers or used as picnic rugs at the Pink Boxing Day Test Match.

'Glam the Bra' was another event that was held during the month with bras decorated and displayed in the Town Hall with members of the public voting to determine the winner, with all monies donated to the event. Raffles and colouring in competitions were also held.

The event gained wide community recognition with Southern Cross Television and the Flinders News attending, promoting the event and our community to the broader public.

To quote Chairman Kathie Bowman in her Editorial published in the November 2018 Goyder's Line Gazette:

'So many events, so much community pride and spirit on show, so much interaction, such a wonderful streetscape in Second Street and homes and businesses entering into the spirit of the whole celebration make being part of a small rural community such a satisfying feeling.'

Announced in December 2018, Dylan Strong has commenced his appointment as Council's new CEO this week.

Chairman Cr Kathie Bowman welcomes Dylan and his family to the community of Orroroo Carrieton.

"The new year brings a new chapter for Council."

"The CEO position is key to ensuring that Council delivers for the community. Dylan has the ingredients we were searching for in a CEO, and I am looking forward to continuing the achievements of Council under his leadership," she said.

Having grown up in country South Australia, Mr Strong said he and his family are most excited about getting involved in the community's daily life.

"Rachel and I have been overwhelmed by the warm welcome we have received from the community. What an inspiring place to raise our family," he said.

Experienced in government and private business, Mr Strong said he understands the importance of building and developing relationships at a regional and state level and he hoped to bring these experiences to his new role.

Mr Strong said Orroroo is a small town with a huge heart and the area has equally as huge potential. He will be seeking to generate economic prosperity and generate "vibrancy" within the community on multiple levels.

Drought Communities Funding Update



As reported in the Goyder's Line Gazette in late 2018 the Federal Government has allocated up to \$1 million to Councils in South Australia that are determined to be drought affected undertake projects and initiatives that will sustain employment and the economy within those council areas.

This funding opportunity is acknowledgement that drought inflicts hardship on communities which is felt beyond the farm gate. There are no guarantees that submissions will receive grant approval. However, this is an opportunity for our community to undertake some projects, which might not otherwise be achieved.

Given the short timeframe in which to access this funding, and indeed complete funded the projects, Council has continued the development of a number of funding proposals over the Christmas break.

Council is pleased to announce that it was successful in the application for a short term Drought Initiatives Facilitation Officer to assist in the development and delivery of drought related projects. Recruitment for this position has commenced.

Council has also progressed submissions for the following projects:

- Water efficiency and re-use project (focussing on stormwater harvesting and re-use for the oval, and water wise refurbishment of the amenities)
- Tourism road re-sheeting project (Re-sheeting of higher use and tourism related un-sealed roads including improvement to identifying signage and visitor infrastructure)
- Upgrade and repair of the Carrieton Community Store



Other initiatives are under development including emergency water tanks, solar energy and tourism infrastructure projects. These projects will be finalised and submitted during February. Like all other projects, if the submissions are successful they will need to be completed by the end of June 2019.



Looking back.....

Petersburg Times, Tuesday 5 April 1904 p.2

A Fatal Shot. — A correspondent writing from Pekina under date of 25th March is responsible for the following:—"A female pig the property of the village blacksmith, was found trespassing this morning on the property attached to the Pekina presbytery. The Bishop caught her in the act redhanded, recognised the lady as an old offender, whom he had frequently warned off the premises previously, seized a gun and with unerring aim shot the animal through the leg. All Pekina was astonished at the news, and the smith and the Bishop are not on speaking terms. The victim has become bacon, and His Lordship is fast recovering from the effects which the fatal shot had upon his nerves."



Northern Argus, Friday 16 November 1877

Black Rock Plain

We have had a police-trooper stationed here until a short time ago, when he was removed to Pekina, to the detriment of the residents in this part, as a trooper is badly required here, it being the most central place for having one stationed at, as the distance to Yatina from Jamestown is about 21 miles, and from Yatina to Orroroo about 16 miles.

Harp and Southern Cross (Adelaide), Friday 1 October 1875 p4

Topics

The Catholic Bishop. — His Lordship [C Reynolds], after conducting the Jubilee at Kadina, returned to town, and left again on Tuesday by the Royal Shepherd for Port Augusta.

On Sunday next he will lay the foundation stone of a new Catholic chapel at Melrose, and proceeding across the newly-opened agricultural areas, will on Tuesday lay the first stone of a chapel at Yarrowie, where an admirable site of ten acres in extent, just outside the Government township, has been secured through the exertions of the zealous priest in charge of the mission.

Yarrowie visited, the Bishop will proceed to what is commonly known as The Hoghead, now the Government township of Pekina, and on a two-acre block, beautifully situated in the township, will on Thursday lay the first stone of a chapel there. On Sunday the 10th his Lordship will perform a like ceremony at Yatina.

South Australian Chronicle and Weekly Mail, Saturday 9 February 1878 p7

"Reports reach us," states the Northern Argus of February 5, "that there is a scarcity of water in several of the agricultural Hundreds in the North, especially between Pekina and Coomooroo. Many of the farmers have to cart water from 12 to 15 miles, while others are even worse situated, and have been obliged to leave their holdings and return to the old settled districts with their families and stock."

The Corn Trade of Laura.—Ever since Christmas the town of Laura, in the Booyoollee Agricultural Area, has been exceedingly busy. The enormous quantities of grain which have been sent from here, and the still larger stacks which the wheatbuyers have accumulated, strike strangers with wonder. It is not an uncommon thing for more than a hundred teams to leave for Port Pirie in a single morning, and as many as seventy teams have arrived in one day from Pekina alone. There are now over 30,000 bags of wheat stacked at Laura, and the stacks are increasing. The main street of the place reminds some people of Port Pirie, so heavy is-the traffic. The dust consequently is distressing, and is the finest powder imaginable. There are no signs of preparation for metalling the main street yet, and what the residents and travellers will be able to do when they want to move- about our local correspondent says he cannot guess.

Last night I witnessed an incredible show of sportsmanship and passion, which made me fall in love with our great sport even more. Thank you to everyone who made this trip possible and to Bill Willoughby for lending me such a



Free Bait Injection Service

2018 Regional needling days for coordinated predator control



This is a **free service** provided by the Living Flinders program

During the service join us for a capacity building workshop on building strong neighbourly relationships

It is intended that all landholders accessing this service will commit to laying poison baits over the Autumn period. If baits are laid across the region at the same time, the success of effective control is greatly increased.

Each rack will be operating from **9am to 2pm**

Tuesday, 12 February	Peterborough region - Dawson Racetrack
Wednesday, 13 February	Cradock – Ruddocks Yards, Yednalue Road
Tuesday, 19 February	Quorn – Gun Club, Arden Vale Road
Wednesday, 20 February	Wilmington – Goeys Gills property, Orroroo Road

What's involved?

NRM Authorised Officers will be on site to inject meat baits. Drying racks will be set up at each of the locations and we ask you to **bring along your own meat** to be injected on the day. It is preferred that the meat is semi-dried (the meat needs to have a slight 'skin' so that it can retain the 1080). If you are unable to access meat but would like to be involved with the program, please contact the Rack Co-ordinator.

Depending on weather and drying conditions, baits will need to remain on the rack for a short period after needling to allow sufficient drying. Following paperwork, baits are bagged, labelled and ready to be taken home in a suitable closed container (provided by landholder.) Poison labels will be supplied by NRM staff and all relevant paperwork associated with poison baits will be completed on site. **Participants are asked to RSVP to the rack co-ordinator prior to the needling date to ensure enough poison is prepared.**

Dried meat bait – Frequently Asked Questions

What type of bait should I bring to the Needling Rack?

- **Red meat:** Any cuts of kangaroo, goat, beef, mutton
- **Chicken wings:** Get a good uptake by foxes
- **Kangaroo hearts:** Commercially available from Dews at Orroroo (8658 1063) or Crossroads Game eats at Port Augusta (8642 6066)

How big should they be?

- **Fox baits:** Intact meat that must have a minimum wet weight of 75g (size of a small clenched fist)
- **Wild dog baits:** Intact meat that must have a minimum wet weight of 150g (size of a large clenched fist)

Do they need to be dry?

- **Yes!** Semi-dried please. Baits need to have a skin prior to needling, as wet baits will 'bleed' poison

Baits will need to be pre-dried before bringing them to the racks. Depending on the weather, overnight or a few hours in sun and breeze after cutting to size is enough to drain excess blood and form a good 'skin' to hold poison.

Please do not bring frozen baits.

Checklist – What to bring to the Needling Day

- Property Lot Numbers
- Semi-dried meat, defrosted and cut to the correct size ready for needling
- Buckets with lids or old eskies to take home bagged meat

1080 Dried meat bait placement

Where is the best place to put out baits?

There are specifications outlining the legal requirements for baiting in rural areas. Along tracks and stock pads leading to water points and at track junctions are often good 'hot spots'. Keep a record of areas where you get a good uptake and re-use these spots.

Do I need to notify my neighbours?

Yes. All neighbours must be notified at least 72 hours prior to putting out poison baits on your property.

DON'T BAIT YOUR MATE

Domestic dogs are at great risk of poisoning and must be prevented from consuming bait. Thoroughly wash down utes, gloves and boots. Muzzle dogs while working near baited paddocks.
