ORROROO RECREATION GROUND SCORES FUNDING

Universal changerooms are on the way at the Orroroo Recreation Ground thanks to a grant of \$199,900 through the State's Government Grassroots Facilities Program.

The changerooms will complete an earlier staged build of a new canteen, officials room and spectator complex which is the biggest construction project undertaken at the Recreation Ground in nearly 10 years.

The Grassroots Football, Cricket and Netball Facility Program is aimed at increasing participation and improving gender equity in Australian Rules Football, Cricket and Netball to support healthier, happier and safer communities.

Minister for Recreation, Sport and Racing Corey Wingard said building what matters for sporting communities is part of the Marshall Government's plan to encourage South Australians to get more active, more often.

"These grants will assist sport and recreation organisations across the state to develop core infrastructure and community hubs that will directly impact participation through the rational development of well-designed and utilised facilities," Minister Wingard said.

The District Council of Orroroo Carrieton partnered with Orroroo Football, Netball, Cricket and Tennis sporting bodies in pursuit of the grant.

Mr Dylan Strong, CEO, said the project will help support the ongoing sustainability of existing community sporting clubs and open doors to new opportunities.

"Universal change rooms will significantly improve our ability to include everyone in sporting activities at the Rec Ground so they can enjoy the many social, health and lifestyle benefits sport and recreation provides."

"The complex is also a win for new carnivals or special events at the Recreation Ground, which will have flow-on positive impacts on the local economy".

"The project is a real credit to the drive and passion of our local clubs", said Mr Strong.

The total project is valued at \$399,000 and is funded in partnership between Council, the Australian Government's Drought Communities Programme and local sporting clubs. The development is due for completion by the end of June 2022.

Message from the Mayor

Over the past three nights Council has been consulting on our Annual Business Plan at Morchard, Carrieton and Orroroo.

Although there was not a large attendance at Morchard, it was a very interesting and I hope constructive gathering with many questions asked and statements made across a broad spectrum of Council's work program.


As normal, a larger number attended at Carrieton and again it proved to be, from my perspective, a very worthwhile night. Unfortunately, last night in Orroroo we had only one ratepayer come along to hear our plans for the next financial year.

A lot of staff time and energy goes into the preparation for these nights and they attend them as well to help set up and listen to the questions asked. Dylan, of course attended on all three occasions but so too did Ann, Adrian & Stuart, all of this in their own time and it is disappointing that attendance isn't greater especially in Orroroo where the majority of our ratepayers reside.

I encourage you, to take a copy of the Annual Business Plan from the Council Office, peruse it and bring any concerns & comments to the attention of our staff. All such concerns come to the Councillors to be discussed before the Plan is finally adopted.

The Plan is proposing a rate increase of 3% plus CPI of 1.2% making an overall increase of 4.2%. This is the first increase outside inflation for three years and

has been made necessary because of the need for Council to fund 30% of the flood damage work from last financial year and the next one.



On the positive side of the ledger, Council intends to finish the Heavy Vehicle Bypass in its entirety, complete stage 3 and 4 of the flood damage, renovate the main street amenities, landscape around the Woolpress Rotunda and establish a heritage trail through Second St (with external grant money) and renew our loader. As well we will begin stage 1 of undergrounding the powerlines in Second St between Fourth & Fifth streets which also entails some footpath enhancement.

This week also we received notification that we have a grant to build new changerooms at the Rec ground. These will be attached to the back of the new canteen complex already built. The majority of these projects will be done by contractors, so council staff will be busy doing all the things that our community expects of them. I think it will be a very fulfilling year. I hope you will enjoy watching it happen.







The Tarcowie Landcare Group is busy putting its plans into place for its annual major planting event on the June long weekend, and the group once again is inviting any interested community members to join them in their work to revegetate South Australia's beautiful mid-north.

June 2021 will be the group's first public planting event since 2019, with COVID-19 preventing public participation last year.

Around 250km north of Adelaide, Tarcowie is nestled between the Pekina and Narien Ranges and is one of the most beautiful areas in the state's mid-north.

Officially founded in 2005, the Tarcowie Landcare Group has actually been planting in the area for 19 years, with recent years prominently showing the fruits of their initial labours, most visibly for anyone driving on the Orroroo – Laura road (Price Maurice Road).

Group Chairperson Chris Grabczewski says the thriving vegetation planted by the group alongside this road is a strong visual indication of the group's success to date. "When you initially plant a seedling, it's only six inches high, and that will be almost invisible when you first drive past. But now, when you look at our early plantings some 15-16 years later, we regularly hear people saying to us 'gee, I'm impressed', with a number of them wanting us to work on their property."

The group has undertaken plantings every year since their initial inception. The group's primary objective is revegetation, and to achieve this successfully, the group tailor-makes a set of plants for each specific planting site. This is the best approach to recreating the pre-European vegetation communities that existed specifically in the Tarcowie area as it enables the best success rate, the greatest long term viability, and a sustainable planting. The group's intention for its planting sites is to establish environments that see the plantings drop seeds over time, enabling spontaneous regeneration on that location into the future. Choosing

the correct species for the correct location is the very best way to ensure ongoing success. Put simply, it's crucial to have the right material in the right place.

With students from the Orroroo Area School participating in a planting day on Friday the 11^{th} of June, the Tarcowie Landcare Group continue their planting activities across the weekend on the Saturday and Sunday (the 12^{th} and 13^{th} of June).

Grabczewski continues "We've been involving local schools in the plantings which we find to be really important, because they're the future land owners some of them are going to live in the area in the long term. So, by involving them they get a connection to the planting, and an introduction to the concept. They get a day away from school, and a day that's educational where they come to understand what we are planting, and why we are planting. We've produced a beautiful brochure about the group that goes into a showbag with other bits and pieces, so the planting function doesn't start and finish at the site.

When they get on the bus they've got some mementoes, our brochure and on occasions a plant to take home, the idea being that we get the kids to communicate with the parents when they get home, so that we get our message out to a wider audience"

The group's activities go further than simply beautification. The group's activities over the last two decades have seen the establishment of shelter belts that stop wind erosion and help to retain moisture in the soil, and which protect stock in inclement weather and also stop any locusts in their tracks. There have been other advantages from the biodiversity outcomes

of the group's activities – for example, there are more sleepy lizards that eat more hoppers during a hopper plague, and more birds of prey have been attracted to the habitat that the group has planted which has helped to control mice. The trees and plantings also have the effect of lowering the water table, which in turn improves ground salinity levels. Many of the outcomes are hard to measure and take a long time to establish themselves, however some

are starting to present themselves in full view.

Grabczewski says that all interested people are welcome to attend on the Saturday and Sunday of the long weekend. "We're like any group doing anything, we're always looking for new and younger members. We'd like our group to be sustainable and go on for many more years to come because the job of repairing the landscape is a massive one."

"While the main planting activity starts on the Friday with the school planting, the work for the weekend starts well before then, so if anyone wants to come along early, they are most welcome. The current membership is mostly Adelaide based, however some members have links to the local area. Anyone is welcome to join us, and we're especially keen to encourage families to join us".

Whilst not essential, the group would appreciate interested people contacting them ahead of the June long weekend via their Facebook page, particularly to assist with catering. "The Friday school activity is catered with a BBQ, and then on the Sunday, we are blessed with (group member) June Jenkins' home made pasties and pies!"

Whilst there are no commercial accommodation options in the Tarcowie township, the group is very happy to help people in this regard. "There's always room for caravans and tents, and we can provide access for electricity for example. There are multiple opportunities for camping." Alternatively, nearby towns of Booleroo Centre, Orroroo, Pekina, Laura and Jamestown provide accommodation options as well.

The group also undertake other activity weekends throughout the year, including monitoring and protecting rare and endangered flora, including collecting seed to be stored at the Seed Conservation Centre of South Australia, site preparation and maintenance, weed control, fencing, making guards and sourcing stakes, and removing pest growth to stop competition which then allows plantings to get more moisture and grow better.

Obituary Gabriel Maureen Williams, fourth daughter to Michael and Gabriel Ryan, twin with Mary. born at Orroroo Hospital on the 10th April 1927 a sibling to Zita, Uriel who was also known as Dool and Bernadette.

Gay lived in Gum Vale Pekina and attended St Josephs Convent School completing grade 7, followed by a one year commercial business course. On leaving school Gay helped out on the family farm and enjoyed playing tennis for Pekina.

Grandpa Ryan used to take the girls by horse and cart to the local dances. This is where she met her future husband Ronald Stanley Williams.

Gay and Ron married on the 15th November 1947 at Saint Catherines Church Pekina.

After marriage, Ron & Gay first lived with Granny Williams at Willila Station for several years. Gay and Ron then moved to Reids Farm which is two miles south of Carrieton, where they lived with Reg & Mary and nine children between them. Life was busy, Gay had to milk the cows and all of the usual duties of farm and motherhood.

In 1960 Gay and Ron moved into Carrieton into the big blue house opposite the pub.

Gay and Ron had seven children, Lawrence, Vincent, Bernadette, Rhonda who passed away at one day old, Jillian, Mark and John. On the 25th March 1968, Ron died suddenly at the age of 47, leaving Gay with her six children to raise.



Gay was always very family and community minded. She received an Australia Day Citizen Award in 1991, recognizing her hard work and commitment to the many groups and organisations she was involved in. Early in life Gay enjoyed tennis and later becoming the 1989 B grade Carrieton ladies golf champion, she played lawn bowls for Orroroo, and always loved a game of cards.

Gay was an avid Adelaide Crows Supporter until the end, with Tony Modra her pin up boy.

The day before she passed the Crows suffered a narrow loss and her faithful Crows Scarf was duly discarded out the door.

Gay is survived by her six children, 17 grandchildren, and 28 grandchildren.

A beautiful woman who was loved by everyone.

Gay lived at the Orroroo Community Home for 2 years, where she was well loved and cared for by all of the wonderful staff and volunteers, which we thank them dearly for.

We would also like to thank the Orroroo Hospital for their care during her stays there.

On behalf of all the grandkids, I think we would all have very fond memories of her great big house and the best cubby kids could ask for. Endless hours of indoor bowls down the passageway, huckle-buckle beanstalk in the lounge room, dressing up in whatever vintage clothes we would find in her wardrobes. Us kids used to argue over who would get to stay at Nanna's house, showing how much we all wanted to be around her. As sweet as she was, Nanna did have her non-negotiables. No hats at the table. Do not disturb her when the crows were on. Don't diss Tony Modra. Don't tell her to stop sending birthday cards – even as a 38 yr old, there was still \$20 in a card in the mail. And finally, purple paint fixes everything.

Due to her love for us all, she would turn a blind eye to some things. She always knew what was going on, but it didn't phase her, as long as it wasn't one of the non-negotiables.

Most of us had a turn at peeing in her chamber pot under her bed. It was OK, as long as you emptied it. I'm sure many drips were spilt, but no harm done.

We always ransacked her pantry to set up our café, making mud pies and cappuccinos. Detergent, flour and patty pans were in constant demand.

Nanna always had cockles, nutties and other sweets on her shelf, and when she didn't we improvised. We'd get the milk coffee and arrowroot biscuits – the leftovers – and wed lick them and dip them in the sugar bowl. Delicious.

In our late teens, early twenties, the ringers would all be home around rodeo time. The conversations around Nanna's table were definitely not suitable for church, but there was Nanna, smiling away, drinking her cup of tea. She just loved being around her grandkids.

She truly was a gorgeous lady with a heart of gold. Nothing ever phased her. There will be so many things that will happen in our lives that will remind us of our Nanna. Rest in peace.

They were able to enjoy the beauty of many of Canada's wildlife including geese and the bald eagle.

They were able to witness some unusual customs connected to the wedding, including the custom of rubbing the groom in tumeric. It was an outdoors wedding and they were very

blessed to have a beautiful day for the ceremony. Guests had come from many parts of the world along with a good number from South Australia, others had flown out from London as well.

Some of the Australian guests were able to wear some of these special gowns at the wedding. After the wedding it was time to get to see some of the beauty of Canada. One of their first visits was to Cameron Lake near Alberta. A popular snow resort in the winter months and is especially popular with Aussie visitors. They saw the Alberta grain

silos, the largest in Canada along with the McCains potato factory which processed the many potatoes grown in the area.

Much of the country is spray irrigated. One photo that John showed us was of a large engine that was fuelled by gas that came directly from a gas pipeline that ran past the pump. A lot of the grain grown by farmers is stored on farm in huge sheds where it is dried before sending off to market. This allows them to reap the grain at a much higher moisture level.

It was also quite common to see a number of oil pumps in the paddock. The oil is pumped into huge dams and then carted away by road tankers.

One of the interesting sites they came across on the streets of Vancouver was the only steam run clock in the world.

They were also able to take the ferry across the bay to visit the Buchart gardens that have been created in a disused quarry where you can see an amazing array of plants and flowers.

Looking Back

Looking back at the dangers of well-sinking in the 1890s ...

South Australian Register (Adelaide), Friday 18 November 1892 ACCIDENT AT ERSKINE. (By Telegraph.) Orroroo. November 17.

An inquest was held to-day by Mr J Moody on the body of James Craig, farmer, of Erskine, and also Councillor for that ward, who was killed yesterday. The enquiry was conducted at his late residence, and elicited information that the deceased in sinking the well had put in a blast at 7 o'clock in the morning, and on its failing to explode had gone down at about 2 o'clock in the afternoon to take it out. In boring the charge it suddenly exploded, and the unfortunate man was almost immediately covered with debris, and received such injuries to his head and face as resulted in his death a short time after being brought to the surface, and just after Dr. Leitch had arrived on the scene. The following verdict was returned:- "That the deceased met his death by an accident whilst well-sinking, no blame being attachable to anyone." Much sympathy is expressed for his widow and family of six young children. The funeral will take place to-morrow.

The Advertiser, Saturday 19 November 1892 FUNERAL OF MR CRAIG

Orroroo, November 18.

The remains of Councillor Craig were interred this afternoon at the Orroroo Cemetery. The Oddfellows walked in procession after the coffin, and the service of the order was read by Councillor MeGlashan, while the Rev Mr Martin conducted the burial. The funeral was large one, many friends and relatives being present.

William Francis Huppatz, aged 6 years, was drowned in the Pekina Creek while bathing this morning. Every means was used to restore the lad by Corporal Deane, who was soon communicated with, but without avail. Dr Strangman who was called, declared life extinct. M J Moody was communicated with, and after making all necessary enquiries deemed an inquest unnecessary. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved parents. Mr. Huppatz is the mail contractor between Orroroo and Johnsburgh.

Southern Cross (Adelaide), Friday 1 April 1898 COOMOOROO AREA, March 28.

Most farmers have started sowing around here, but the dry weather is proving rather detrimental. A heavy fall of rain now would do incalculable good, as it would start feed and render the ground in good working order. Some little wheat was sown between here and Hammond a few weeks ago, and came over ground owing to fall of rain; but the continuation of dry weather which has since followed will certainly wither it off. In cases of this sort the land will have to be resown, which will, of course, entail extra cost and loss. Past experience has shown that sowing too early means a great risk, and has also a tendency to make the land dirty, and render it unfit to produce a clean crop even in ordinary seasons.



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

Orroroo Community Church



Last month eleven of the grandchildren of Samuel and Annie Cozens got together for a family reunion and to relocate the headstone of Samuel Cozens who died in Adelaide as the result of an accident in March 1924, aged 63. He was buried in the Payneham cemetery and like so many cemeteries in the city the lease on his burial site had come to an end, so the family had agreed to let the lease lapse and bring the headstone back to Orroroo and place it on the grave of his wife Annie, who died 31 years later at the age of 81.

Everyone came away saying what a wonderful day it had been and hoped we could do it all again some time in the future.

It is not until we start to get older and the senior members of our family begin to die that we start to look more into our family tree and ask questions about those early days

It is important that we value our family ties and try to preserve as much history for future relatives to enjoy. All through the Bible we read the story of God's family and of His love and provision for them.
