

NEW HOME FOR HISTORIC WOOLPRESS

The restored Black Rock Station wool press, circa 1851, has been officially unveiled in its new home, the custom built Main Street "Woolshed", in Orroroo.

The woolpress was recovered from the ruins of the Black Rock Station wool shed in 2018, by a passionate group of

local volunteers.

Brothers Dean and Brian Keatley then began a painstaking process of restoration.

Early research suggests it may be the only one of its type still in existence.

NEW HOME FOR HISTORIC WOOLPRESS cont

Fully restored the woolpress was gifted to the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton in trust by the present day owners of Black Rock Station, to be made available for the enjoyment of the community and visitors alike.

Council applied for, and was successful, in gaining external funding for development of an impressive two story, stone building to house the wool press and display.

Thanks to the joint financial assistance of the Australian Government and the Foundation of Rural and Regional Renewal, the development of an impressive two story stone display facility is now complete.

Mr Dylan Strong, Council CEO, said the new Woolshed and the woolpress are the centrepiece of a much larger *Heritage Trail*.

"The future heritage trail will tell many of the stories, promote the culture and vibrancy, and celebrate the characters associated with our district's history.

The trail will meander the main street of Orroroo and through maps and digital information link to many other icons and attractions in the outlying attractions", he said.



Mayor Bowman said the development of the woolshed is intended to highlight the pioneering history of the district and its enduring agricultural industry.

"Council maintains a motto of strength from resilience, in recognition of the traits of passion, determination and community spirit displayed by the early pioneers and present day community.

CONGRATULATIONS KATHIE BOWMAN 25 YEARS OF SERVICE

Kathie Bowman, Mayor of the District Council of Orroroo Carrieton, is a determined and passionate leader in Orroroo district. Kathie commenced as a Councillor in 1995 with the then DC Orroroo. When the District Council of Orroroo and District Council of Carrieton amalgamated in 1997, she has continued to serve the community through to this present day.

During Kathie's 25 years of service as Councillor, she has also served as Chairman/Mayor of Council for 2 terms, 2003-2010 and then from 2014 to present day. She also served as Deputy Chairman from 2000 to 2003.



As a lifetime local, fulltime farmer, mother, and grandmother, Kathie understands what resilience means. During the past 18 months, Kathie has been an instrumental support for her community through the devastation and heartbreak caused by drought. Being predominantly a farming community, the Council area has been heavily impacted by the drought conditions affecting so much of regional Australia. Effecting not just farmers, but the whole community including hotels, grocers, butcher, clothing shops, and sporting clubs.

Through her position as Mayor, Kathie has advocated tirelessly to ensure rates the community pay are fair and equitable. To keep rate rises to a minimum wherever possible in order to avoid undue pressure on land and business owners. It has required her to push the envelope of business improvement within Council to ensure things are done in sustainable ways, including exploring partnership options with neighbouring councils, review of service standards and the implementation of a long term financial plan.

Other committees Kathie has also served on include the Main Street, Orroroo Water Quality, Community Facilities, Locust Plague Committee and the Federation of Councils (Peterborough and Orroroo). She also represents Council at a regional level on the Legatus Group, chairing the Audit & Risk Management Committee and sitting on the Management Board.

Kathie has led Council through many successful projects including the improvements to the main street of Orroroo through the Places for People funding and the rebuilding of the Orroroo Grandstand at the Orroroo Oval. The main street has been redeveloped to be an inviting stop-over point for tourists travelling through East-West or further north to Hawker and Wilpena Pound. She has also been a member on the Working Party for the installation of the Black Rock Woolpress, a unique woolpress that is the only one of its kind known in Australia (the Woolpress is now showcased in the main street of Orroroo enabling tourist to view the fully restored historic item).

Kathie has also been a fearless and committed leader with lobbying SA Water and ESCOSA to improve Orroroo's water supply. After 20 plus years of lobbying SA Water, the Murray pipeline became operational in March 2019. In May 2019, her foresight and conviction also resulted in the commissioning of stage one of the community waste water management system in the township of Orroroo.



Rural Aid hires new counsellor in Port Augusta



Australia's most trusted rural charity, Rural Aid, has made its biggest investment into improving regional mental health to date.

The charity is appointing ten new counsellors across the country this year, committing \$3.75 million over the next three years to help address the yawning gaps in regional mental healthcare.

Nine of Rural Aid's new counsellors are already in place, actively serving their regional community.

Rural Aid counsellors offer free, confidential support to farmers and their families. Rural Aid's Mental Health and Wellbeing Team prefer to visit farmers on their properties.

Rural Aid CEO John Warlters said "Rural Aid's commitment to placing counsellors in rural Australia will save lives."

"We know people who live regionally have poorer access to health professionals and are more likely to struggle with their mental health due to lack of appropriate and timely support. Farmers and rural teenagers have more than double the rate of suicide compared to urban populations*. Rural Aid is desperately trying to change that."

Rural Aid has placed counsellors in West Australian and South Australia for the first time.

Jeffrey Grace-Jones is the new Rural Aid Counsellor and Community Representative in Port Augusta. Jeffrey has worked as a counsellor all over regional Australia, but his heart and home lie in South Australia. Jeffrey is proud to play a role in helping farmers overcome their challenges.

"There is a need for counsellors in rural areas to reduce the stigma and myths around mental health and to enable those doing it tough to access assistance," Jeffrey said.

Jeffrey has faced bushfires and helped fight the demons that can follow them too. He was caught up in the Black Saturday fires in Victoria, evacuating twice to safety. Jeffrey has also helped Kangaroo Island farmers with their bushfire recovery.

Jeffrey believes it's helpful to treat mental wellbeing the same as any other medical condition.

"If you've got a tv remote with a flat battery, no matter how much you push all the buttons, nothing is going to happen. You need to recharge the batteries."

Mr Warlters said Rural Aid's counsellors were mental

wellbeing specialists who counsel, teach and refer clients to higher levels of care.

"We know that investing in early intervention achieves results. It leads to a reduction in the number of people who require acute treatment. This is achieved through the provision of mental wellbeing education, tools and pathways for assistance at the preventative end. Rural Aid counsellors are qualified to assist farmers

across the continuum of mental health, from prevention and early intervention, right through to treatment," Mr Warlters said.

"If we can get to people early, have them recognise symptoms and get some simple but effective strategies, we help them before things escalate to



the point they need hospitalisation. This will reduce pressure on the health system while prevention strategies will help rural people to live their best lives they can.

"Our counselling program has been highly successful; making a real difference to the farmers that Rural Aid supports. Our counsellors work with their community to create and implement vital mental health programs and strategies. Rural Aid counsellors build trusted relationships with their local communities. Our counsellors also attend field days, events and natural disaster sites."

FUNDING NOW AVAILABLE TO SUPPORT SMALL COMMUNITY PROJECTS IN GREY

The Federal Government is providing a further \$150,000 in funding for small-scale upgrades and new equipment for community groups in Grey.

Expressions of interest are now open for Round 7 of the Stronger Communities Programme, giving local governing bodies and community groups an opportunity to nominate projects for grants of up to \$20,000.

Federal Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey said the Stronger Communities grants had been very important program for regional communities and a regular winner for Grey.

"I am always amazed at how much bang for our buck we get by giving support for community-based organisations," he said. "They add volunteer labour, their own finances and get great value for money.

"This latest funding injection will support up to 20 projects across our communities, delivering an economic activity by providing work to local businesses and adds. Even if in a modest way to our recovery as we come out of the COVID-19 pandemic.

"Previous rounds have brought \$900,000 to Grey for projects such as turning rubbish bins into historical landmarks in Port Augusta, purchasing a marquee and security fencing for the Port Lincoln Tunarama, restoring the Edithburgh tidal pool, installing a disability access ramp for the Burra Community and Sports Club and ensuring a sustainable water supply to

the Beltana hall to name just a few.

"This type of investment brings people together by strengthening social connections, building community participation and delivering a brighter and more TO vibrant future for communities.

"I strongly encourage interested organisations to contact my office regarding projects important to them and our community. Grants from \$2,500 up to \$20,000 are available to cover up to 100 per cent of eligible project costs, or up to 50 per cent of eligible project costs for local governing bodies."

Mr Ramsey said it is important to note Expressions of Interest for applicants in Grey must be received by his office by Friday 3rd December.

Eligible sporting clubs and organisations can now apply for up to \$3,000 for funding of programs and equipment through Round 50 of the Active Club Program (ACP).

\$1,024,000 is available in the 2021-22 ACP to continue to help the sport sector rebuild following the COVID-19 pandemic and associated restrictions. Funds may be used to acquit various costs such as hand sanitiser, face masks and COVID Marshal vests.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for the ACP, applicants must be ALL of the following:

- a not-for-profit active recreation or sport club or community organisation whose purpose is the delivery of active recreation or sport programs and services in South Australia.
- incorporated under the Associations Incorporations Act 1985 (SA) or have some other comparable legal status.
- have a minimum total membership base of 20 members. Total membership can include associate, social and life membership.
- be operating for 12 months or longer.

For eligible applicants with 99 members or less, the maximum grant available will be \$1,500. For eligible applicants with 100 or more members the maximum grant available will be \$3,000.

The ACP aligns with the objectives of the <u>Game On</u> initiative, which aims to get South Australians more active more often and enjoying the many social, health and lifestyle benefits sport and recreation provide.

All program funds must be expended by successful applicants within 12 months of receiving funding.

Goyder's Line – Building drought resilience into transitional country

The Goyder's Line project seeks to increase the capacity of the region's most vulnerable farmers to adapt to changing climatic conditions - progressively drier conditions and more frequent drought – and provides funding opportunities in various drought mitigation projects.

As part of this project, we are offering grants up to \$1,000 per farm to assist mixed farming enterprises establish livestock containment areas.

We are also offering individualised **Drought Management Plans**, which deliver:

- A drought mitigation-focused vision for the future of your business;
- Detailed property mapping and diagrams;
- An action plan to use and adapt for future business decision making.

On completion of the plan, further funding is provided to implement on-ground works for your property, like fencing, watering points, soil improvements and revegetation for farm biodiversity or stock shelter.

These projects are open to properties in the vicinity of Goyder's Line and in increasing marginal country within the Northern and Yorke Landscape Board region.

Some recent successful days included a Containment Area Workshop in Jamestown, with more than 30 attendees, which involved an onsite visit to CC Cooper's containment area and a presentation by Nicola Barnes, Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board Grassland Ecologist.

The program also funded Clinical Psychologist Stephanie Schmidt to present at ACT for Ag, an Upper North Farming Systems Members Expo held in Booleroo Centre. There were 90 attendees including industry leaders, producers, staff and presenters.







Fox bait distribution and injection days

Landholders were invited to band together in the fight against foxes through a spring coordinated baiting program across the Southern Flinders district. Baiting in spring is critical as it targets female foxes before they leave the den. We held three bait injection days at Dawson, Wilmington and Almerta and the coordinated group manufactured baiting days visiting the townships of Crystal Brook, Napperby, Mambray Creek, Laura, Jamestown, Booleroo Centre, Melrose and Orroroo.



Roadside signage in the district

While travelling through the Southern Flinders district, you may have noticed new roadside signage. These signs are designed to remind landholders about optimal times to control pest plants and animals, and to contact us for advice. They are interchangeable to coincide with the seasons and to highlight any pressing pest issues.



Horehound Biological Control

Plume moth is a biological control agent for the declared weed Horehound (*Marrubium*, *vulgare*). The use of Plume moth provides landholders with an additional tool to improve

weed control. Plume moths are host specific, with the larvae feeding on the growing tips, weakening the plant and reducing the flowers and burrs. Landscape Officer Alexia Catford transferred approximately 40 Plume moth



caterpillars to Horehound plants at a site near Carrieton in the hope the site will be a future nursery for the Southern Flinders district. Photo credit: Dragos Moise

The students rotated through seven interactive stations that covered Indigenous culture, aquatic macroinvertebrates, Animals Anonymous, bees, plant seeds, reptiles and rocks and minerals. Landscape Board staff ran the aquatic macroinvertebrates station where children observed and identified 'water bugs'. Assessing the sensitivity of these bugs allowed the children to determine the health of the water at the springs.

African Rue

African Rue is a summer-growing, deep-rooted perennial shrub that grows to 0.5m high. Stems are stiff and branched with green, succulent leaves approximately 2-5cm long, which have a distinct bitter odour when crushed. Flowers are white with a yellow centre and form singularly on the end of slender stalks appearing in late spring to mid-autumn. The fruit is a round three chambered capsule containing 45-60 seeds. Infestations commonly occur along river banks, drainage lines, in disturbed areas and on flood plains.

African Rue poses a significant threat to grazing and agricultural areas and the biodiversity of the areas surrounding rivers. It is highly unpalatable to livestock due to its bitter taste and can cause poisoning in stock if eaten in large amounts.

The Northern and Yorke Landscape Board can provide advice about the most appropriate management method for pest plants on your property. African Rue is difficult to control once established and follow-up treatment is nearly always required to treat plants that re-shoot. Effective, long term control requires vigilance and an integration of a number of control measures.

South Australians urged to know their bushfire risk and act now

South Australians are being reminded that the time to prepare their families and properties is now, as the CFS launches its 'Be Bushfire Ready' advertising campaign for the 2021-22 fire season.

This year's campaign, launched today by Fire Chiefs and the Minister for Emergency Services Vincent Tarzia, takes both an emotive and tactical approach to help encourage South Australians to know their bushfire risk and take action.

The campaign also has an added focus on Bushfire Safer Places following recent research which showed that nearly half of those living in bushfire prone areas don't understand their meaning.

CFS Chief Officer Mark Jones said it's important that South Australians have a Bushfire Survival Plan, or if they don't have one, that they prepare it now.

"South Australians who work, travel or live in an area where bushfires can occur - including those on the urban-fringe - should familiarise themselves on where they can re-locate to if threatened by fire," Mr Jones said.

"Getting to know your closest Bushfire Safer Place - whether it be in the Adelaide Metropolitan area, outer suburbs, or rural settlements - can provide a place of relative safety if you leave early.

"The message we want to get out to the community is that they need to prepare now, have a conversation with your family and ensure if you're threatened by fire, you know where and when you'll go, and what you'll take.

"The CFS is ready and prepared to respond should any incidents occur, but we need the community to play their part. Our volunteers cannot be everywhere."

The Fire Danger Season will commence in Eastern Eyre Peninsula, Flinders, North East Pastoral, North West Pastoral, West Coast and Yorke Peninsula districts across the state tomorrow (1 November). The Mount Lofty Ranges, Adelaide Metropolitan and Kangaroo Island will be the last fire ban districts to commence on 1 December.

Minister for Emergency Services Vincent Tarzia said this year's campaign is re-enforcing important messaging to ensure the community are informed, educated, and prepared.

"This year's campaign features a combination of previous messaging including the powerful and emotional advertisement 'Fire, Fire, go away', which aims to get people thinking about what they're willing to lose, to ensure they plan accordingly," Minister Tarzia said.

"As South Australians, we unfortunately know the reallife impacts that bushfires can have on our communities and livelihoods.

"It's important to check weather forecasts, know your Fire Danger Ratings and what you can and can't do on days of Total Fire Ban."

SA Metropolitan Fire Service (MFS) Deputy Chief Officer Paul Fletcher said bushfire risk is not limited to remote parts of South Australia.

"All South Australians live with the risk of bushfire. The urban fringes of metropolitan Adelaide and regional towns and cities, and the Adelaide Hills are also key bushfire risk areas," Mr Fletcher said.

"And, even if people don't live in a bushfire prone area, it is inevitable that most of us will visit, work in, drive through or holiday in an area of bushfire risk during bushfire season. That's why the fire services are urging everyone to know where their Bushfire Safer Place is, well before a fire starts."

CFS declares Fire Danger Season dates for all districts

The SA Country Fire Service has determined the start dates for this year's Fire Danger Season for all South Australian districts, with six districts commencing on 1 November 2021.

The first districts to commence will be the Eastern Eyre Peninsula, Flinders, North East Pastoral, North West Pastoral, West Coast and Yorke Peninsula.

The Mount Lofty Ranges, Adelaide Metropolitan and Kangaroo Island are the last fire ban districts to commence on 1 December 2021.

CFS Deputy Chief Officer Rob Sandford said this year's dates reflect a more standard season, in comparison to what South Australia has experienced in the past few years.

"A milder start to the season than in previous years means we will see the commencement of the Fire Danger Season for many areas at a time that residents are traditionally more used to," Mr Sandford said.

"While parts of South Australia, had wetter than average winters, the vegetation around the state will start to cure, bringing fire potential. People need to prepare their families and homes now, ensuring their Bushfire Survival Plan is practiced and ready.

"With no need for any district to start early, as in previous years, there should be no surprises for residents in these districts who have been preparing their properties," he said.

The Fire Danger Season commencement means restrictions in districts become legally enforceable.

Acting Emergency Services Minister John Gardner encouraged South Australians to download the Alert SA App and have their Bushfire Survival Plan complete.

"The time to prepare yourselves, your properties and your families is now," Minister Gardner said.

"On high-risk days, the right conditions at the wrong time can cause a significant bushfire. Don't get caught out."


Preparing your home for bushfires

- Keep gutters clean and free of debris.
- Mow, rake and weed to remove fine fuels within 20 metres of your home.
- Prune shrubs so that their tops are well away from the lower branches of trees.
- Prune lower branches of shrubs and trees to separate the foliage from the ground fuels underneath.
- Reduce loose bark, dead twigs, leaves or branches from your yard.
- Move firewood and flammable items (such as paper recycling, boxes and crates) further away from your home.

Other steps to prepare

- Have a Bushfire Survival Plan, no matter where you live, and practise it throughout the year.
- Prepare an Emergency Kit.
- Stay informed during the Fire Danger Season by monitoring multiple sources of information (TV, radio, CFS Website, social media, Bushfire Information Hotline).
- Learn about bushfire behaviour and how to survive by visiting the CFS website (www.cfs.sa.gov.au).



Looking Back

Looking back at some Black Rock history. There seems to be a lot of interest in the old Black Rock Wool Press, so it seems fitting to acknowledge some early members of the O'Reilly family who lived in the area for many years

Chronicle, Saturday 5 November 1927 - p36 MRS O'REILLY

Mrs O'Reilly, widow of Mr M O'Reilly, who died at Black Rock on October 29, was the youngest daughter of Mr and Mrs Clarke, and was born in Baelie Borough, County Cavan, Ireland, 88 years ago. She came to Australia in the ship James Farney (Captain James Dailey), at the age of 13 years. Both her parents had died some time before she left Ireland, and she had one sister (Mrs John Dempsey) in Australia. On arrival in South Australia, Miss Clarke went to reside at the Cavan Arms near Adelaide which was built by her relatives, Mr and Mrs Conaghtes. Later she removed to Mintaro, where she met and married Mr Matthew O'Reilly, who died in July, 1912. There were seven sons and one daughter, all of whom are still living. In 1879 the couple removed to the north, and took up land at Minvalara, near Black Rock, then the hundred of Morgan, and Mrs O'Reilly remained there ever since, being well known and highly respected by all northerners.

The Times and Northern Advertiser, Friday 29 August 1924 - p3

DISTRICT NEWS. BLACK-ROCK

August 26th

Our district has been fortunate in having good rain, and wheat and grass are coming on well and shearing will be starting shortly. General regret was expressed here this evening, when news was received from Tumby Bay, of the death of Michael O'Reilly, in the Tumby Bay Hospital. Mr O'Reilly was an old and respected resident of this district, having lived near Peterborough for 26 years. He was well known here and highly respected. He was also farming on the West Coast for a number of years, hut owing to eye trouble, has been living in Tumby Bay for the last two vears.

Chronicle, 19 November 1936 - p60

Miss M O'Reilly

Miss Annie Mary O'Reilly, who died at Peterborough recently, was born at Minyalara, near Black Rock, in September, 1880. Her father, the late Mr Matthew O'Reilly, was one of the pioneers of the district. Miss O'Reilly lived the greater portion of her life at Minvalara, and nine years ago removed Peterborough, where she had lived ever since. She is survived by seven brothers Messrs Hugh and John (Peterborough), Patrick (Prospect), Matthey, Philip, James (Black Rock), and Thomas (Minvalara).

The Times and Northern Advertiser, 22 September 1944 - p1

Late Matthew O'Reilly

The sudden death of Matthew O'Reilly at his home at Black Rock, has removed another old pioneer from the North. Born at Mintaro 71 years ago, he came North with his parents, who were among the first settlers in the Black Rock District, He lived all his life there, except for a short while spent on the West Coast where he had taken up land. He took no part in public life, but was a well known identity in the Northern Stock Markets, particularly in Orroroo, where thousands of sheep passed through his hands. He leaves a widow, three sons and a daughter to mourn their sad loss, and to whom we extend our sympathy. Two of the sons are in the AIF Ray in New Guinea and Jim just returned. The funeral from St Anacletus' pro-Cathedral, was largely attended, and bore testimony to the great respect in which the deceased was held. Rev Fathers Kain and Molloy conducted the obsequies at the grave side.

A DIAMOND WEDDING

CARRIETON, September 30. Many of the older residents attended the diamond wedding celebrations of Mr and Mrs Patrick King Sen. Mr King was born in the county of Minogham, Ireland, in 1832. He emigrated to South Australia in 1849 by the ship Constance, and his first occupation was at the Royal Admiral Hotel, in Hindley street. Later he went Bullock Driving to the Burra mines, and when the gold digging rush was at its height he went to try his fortune in 1851, but was not successful. He was married to Miss Ann Marky two years afterwards, by the Rev Father Rvan at West terrace, and settled at Peachy Belt, but took up land at Rice's Creek, near Auburn, in 1860. Orroroo, September 15

On Thursday last, the new system of flooding was opened in the presence of a large crowd, and on Monday the scheme was set going in earnest, four blocks being given water. The scheme met with a hostile reception when explained to the Blockers' Association nearly two years ago by the Director of Irrigation (Mr EJ Field), and the engineer (Mr Horsfield). Delegates from the association visited Cobdogla, and secured information regarding the working of the flooding system versus sprinkler and the opposition gradually died down.

The new era of flooding has been ushered in under favorable conditions. The Pekina reservoir is badly silted up, and a continuance of the pipe and sprinkler method spelt ultimate disaster. Under the new system the silt will be scoured out, and travel down to the blocks, and become an excellent top-dressing and fertiliser. The reservoir has a capacity of 379 millions gallons, with no bywash to take the debris, but under the new system silt will no longer be the bugbear of the blockers. The nature of the country in the Pekina Creek traversed by the pipeline is very difficult, and the contractors (Messrs Atkins & Finlayson) have had a hard task in getting the old pipes out and the new ones in.

This month we had a very chopping informative meeting with Kylie block McNamee from Region 4 CFS in


Port Augusta. Kylie came to talk about household fires and gave us lots of helpful information and a few practical demonstrations on how to handle certain situations. She spoke about the importance of fire alarms in the house and the need to make sure that the batteries are changed on a regular basis, and that the censor is also cleaned on a regular basis as dust or spider webs or bugs can cause the alarm to go off or not work as required. If you find yourself in a fire situation it is important to check doors using the back of your hand to check the heat level because if there is electricity present it will cause your hand to grab hold of the door.

After checking how many people had fire blankets in their kitchens, Kylie showed us what they looked like and how to use them protecting your hands by holding the straps at the back of the blanket and slowly approaching the fire and placing the blanket over the flames. If a fire blanket is not available a towel or

be used to cut off the oxygen supply.

Important not throw water on an oil fire as this may cause bigger problems.

Kylie reminded us that the most common cause of house fires were started by candles and cigarettes. Wheat bags that are overheated can also cause trouble and should only be heated in a microwave with a cup of water to help keep the moisture levels up and should be changed every couple of years. Kylie finished her talk by demonstrating the use of a couple of fire extinguishers (above). Malcolm Byerlee gave a vote of thanks for a very informative talk (left).
