The complex (total project) is valued at \$399,000 and is funded in partnership between Council, the SA Government, the Australian Government's Drought Communities Programme and local sporting clubs. The development is due for completion by the end of June 2022.

A tailor, Mr Buxton served a three year apprenticeship in London, after which he worked for Hutton Bros, biggest shop in Newcastle-on-Tyne, and subsequently for 20 years was head salesman for W Jennings at Southend-on-Sea.

#### The Areas' Express (Booyoolee), Saturday 16 February 1878

ORROROO (from our own correspondent.)

This little town has suddenly awoke from its proverbially dull state. A great many business men are continually arriving to look at the place, and appear to be favourably impressed. I presume it is on account of the good harvest we have had in this district. Walloway and Blackrock have yielded an average of 12 bushels to the acre. The excellent yield has made a decided improvement in trade. Quite a number of business places are being erected. Messrs Levine and Judell, of Jamestown, are building a large store and premises for a bank, which when finished will be second to none in the North. #### An 'Old Contemptible'

In Great War I Mr Buxton was a company sergeant major in the Royal Ordnance Corps, and is one of the Old Contemptibles. He was mentioned thrice in dispatches. At one time, he said, 'I was running trains against all rules and regulations, which nobody would ever dream of doing normally. The French collaborated with me wonderfully; they would even go without their dinner because I told them the guicker the war would finish if they did what I told them, the beauty of it was that I was an Australian in the British Army, and they didn't know I was an Australian.

After two winters in the Front line I was sent to Le Havre in charge of 250 British troops, and on Sunday mornings we used to march them round for an hour of exercise. Hundreds of French people used to come and watch us parade, and the local press called me Le Cochon (the pig) because of the curt way I barked out my orders. 'They did not understand it, and mobbed me until the happy troops came up, and explained to them that it was all in the game of British soldiering.

Looking back to the early treatment of Orroroo commenced business; so you see we are about to be Aborigines – it appears that the correspondent was well supplied with stores. There are a few other trades wanted; a wheelwright, carpenter, baker, and another "It is a practice that should be stopped, as it is both hotel could not fail to pay. Accommodation at the present hotel is very limited. There is ample trade for two, and any pushing business man thoroughly acquainted with his work would do well. The aboriginals have paid us another visit, and as usual "made night hideous" with their yells. They were supplied with intoxicants, and the "fire-water" had the effect of transposing them into perfect demons. One fellow became so outrageously bad that he was taken into custody for threatening to stab a person at the hotel. It was found necessary to attach the "darbies" to his legs, as he repeatedly slipped them from his wrists. It is a practice that should be stopped, as it is both impolitic and dangerous. I wonder if the law on the question applies equally here with the South. The Orroroo Sale Yards had a narrow escape from being burned down last week. The weather is delightfully cool after the terrific heat we have experienced.









One hundred years ago...

August 26 1921

PROGRESSIVE ORROROO From "The Orroroo Enterprise." To one who has known the town, progress made has been truly great and wonderful. I have been urged to dig back in memory and give my recollection of residence is now. the old days. These lines may be of interest to firstly the few old pioneers like myself who are still hanging on; and secondly, the younger fraternity who have to carry their services there. From memory, I think these, were the business of improvement on. It was in 1876 that all of the business houses in Orroroo in those days, and the writer first started carting goods from the railhead at the Burra, and little did I think in those days that the wilderness known as Orroroo would become such, a prosperous and flourishing, town as it is today. In those keepers, who were supplied with beer from the Burra days there were very few buildings in the town Mr CH Burra Brewery. The trip used to take us anything, from Easther ran a little iron store where the post office was kept by him. This is now a large store run by Mr WC joy trip. Dowling. Then the Orroroo Hotel was built by Mr Chas Orroroo quietened down for a while until the line was Mitchell, but not to the extent that it is today. It was a lively spot and the ordinary man had to be very quiet if in search of a drink, as the bar was always pretty full, and money was plentiful.

Orroroo also boasted a little blacksmith shop which was started by Mr J Bugg, and on this spot Mr RT Parnell carries on today, turning out wagons and trollies. This factory, has, I think, turned out more vehicles than any other factory in the northern areas.

Where the doctor's residence is today is the spot where Mr Jemima's little iron store was also a butcher's shop kept by Mr George Hannaford, and Mr Robt Brice's carried on by the Bills Bros, and a very big trade they done in the building line.

Orroroo also had a saddler's shop - Mr O'Connor was the saddler. The local flour mill was started and built by Messrs Howie and Truslove, and some short time after. on the map! the Hon AR Addison bought Mr Howie's interest in the mill, and his son, Mr WC Addison, still carries on the business. Then came a building craze Messrs Levine and Judell built a general store and the Commercial Hotel.

About the same time Messrs Thos Carter and David Swift built a blacksmith's shop and implement factory, which is now carried on as a coach and implement factory by Forbes & Sons, and the works have turned out buggies and ploughs etc that have found their way all over the State. Soon after Mr Christopher Williams took over the Orroroo Hotel and ran it for some years. Mr William Cummings took over the Commercial Hotel a bit later. Messrs W & T Tremayne opened in the Mr business. and R Andrewartha commenced as a baker. Mr W Pascoe swelled the business activities by opening up a saddlery, and Mr H Walker followed the occupation of a bootmaker.

Still further additions followed - a general store run by Mr Ferguson, a green grocery store by Mr Hooper, and Source: Quorn Mercury, SA, Friday 26 August 1921, Mr Asher opened in the jewellery line. In those days the National Bank occupied the premises which Judell and Co have as a boot department to-day. > The chief pursuit of the man on the land in those days was wheat growing only, and all grain had to be carted either to Caltowie or Jamestown, and a lovely time it was on the roads with the farmers carting, especially if a good rain came on. It was quite a usual occurrence to find a farmer hard down in the bog not worrying, because he knew the teamsters were behind to pull him out of trouble. I am convinced that had the farmers in those days combined farming, grazing and dairying together, there would be 5 times the number of families on the land to-day. There is not the shadow of doubt but that our district for dairying and grazing is equal to anything in the State.

> The next big item in our progress was the arrival of the railway. The line was built from the south to Orroroo, and from Quorn to Orroroo, and when the two contractors (Messrs Kean & White and Miller Bros) met and joined up the line, there was something doing. The blockers were soon busy raising lucerne, dairying was soon in full swing; the butter and cream returns began to come back to the blocker, and Orroroo began to go ahead in earnest with buildings and improvements.

At this time labor was fairly cheap, and the Government constructed the present large dam. Mr Bradley, of the Department, had the management of the men, and a good fellow he was. The government were fortunate in this scheme. All of the pipes were cast iron, and only 5 pipes were broken between the factory and the work. Mr Beyer told me this was a record, as usually the breakages ran out at about 5 pipes in the 100. The pipes used on this scheme totalled 1,500 tons.

The auctioneers followed the boom and began holding 2 or 3 sales per month; this brought a lot of trade into the town. #### The Advertiser (Adelaide), Tuesday 8 December 1914

The death occurred at his residence, near Yatina, on December 3, of Mr Gustav JM Tohl. He was born in March, 1835, and was a descendant of a long line of seafaring men. After following the sea for several years he arrived at Port Adelaide in March, 1854.

He went to Mr Angas' station near Angaston, and was employed there, and later on by Mr W Gilbert, at Pewsey Vale. Afterwards he worked on a farm, and then at Black Springs tried dairy farming. He carted timber to the Burra mine end smelted copper to Port Adelaide. About 22 years ago he removed to Yatina, and there successfully carried on farming. He took much interest in local affairs and sat in the Yongala District Council for a number of years. He was an outspoken supporter of British Imperialism, and gave his best to the State of his adoption. He was a fine specimen of a pioneer, and stood well over 6 ft. high. He was twice married. The first family consisted of two sons and three daughters (Messrs W and T Tohl, of Booboorowie; Mrs W Hackett, of Norwood; Mrs JR Gray, of Burra; and Mrs E Ballantyne, of Yatina). A widow survives and one son by the second marriage, Mr GJ Tohl, of Yatina.


#### A Diamond in the Dust

#### **Local Identity Profile**

#### LOCAL STUDENT NOW TEACHER



After leaving school, Marlee studied Education at Flinders University and is now a high school teacher. She is currently teaching English, PE and HASS at the Orroroo Area School. She now completes these "Life Story" assignments with her students.

Flash back to 2010, Marlee reported in a local successful business woman.

My full name is Taryn Marie Ackland. I was named after Tyrone Powers' daughter, Tyrone was an actor in the 1950s. I was born in Orroroo on the 5th of October in 1961. I had two brothers, one that we lost in a car accident in 2002 and another that lives in Whyalla. My father came from Armidale in New South Wales and my mother was born in Orroroo. My parents met when my father's parents ran the cafe and my mother was already in Orroroo.

I went to Orroroo Area School and Peterborough High School for Year 12 and my friends included Lyn Hounsell (Black), Leanne Jones, Leanne Ayles (O'Dea), Bev Redden (Shackleford), Jill Toop, David Kurtzer, Robin Blackwell and Darren Hayes. We played a lot of sports together. When I was a kid I didn't travel much. We went to Lucky Bay and Adelaide. My cousins and Nan and Pop lived in Adelaide so we used to visit them a lot. When I left school I did a lot of trips overseas. My favourite trip was to Melbourne last year, with my two sons, Jordan and Kade. One of my favourite memories would have to be when I went in a little aeroplane and did aerobatics with a World War Two pilot.

When I was young I used to work in the Newsagency with my grandparents and in one of their other grocery shops with my parents. As a child I had to do chores like cleaning my room, ironing, feeding and walking the greyhounds and feeding the chooks. Some of the different towns where I have lived and worked include Alice

Springs, Melbourne, Sydney, and in the bush near Woomera and Orroroo. My parents always worked and my grandparents were the same. They instilled the ethic to do well with what you do and enjoy it. In Melbourne and Sydney I worked in the computing industry. Technology has changed so much since I was a kid. When I was young, computing was very basic. When I worked in Melbourne the first IBM PC came out. It had a 10Mb hard drive and everyone thought that was huge.

My family was very sporty. We played junior and senior tennis, table tennis, netball, football, golf, raced greyhounds and swam for the Orroroo Swimming Club. We liked playing sport because we met so many new people, saw friends and travelled to different towns. As a child I played sport, made mud pies for fun and just ran around with friends. There was always something to do, we were never bored. When I was at school I did music, and learnt the piano but that wasn't my favourite thing to do, or practice. My favourite was sport and art. I have won trophies for tennis, swimming, netball and I even won a tennis trophy in Sydney playing Chelsea Brown, who used to be on television.

I think that the Orroroo Football and Netball Club has done a fantastic job, because it is such a small town and with a small population, so it is great to see how well they are still going. For a small town we do very well with all our sporting clubs. We have a lot of talented, enthusiastic people here.

I was sixteen when I got my driving licence and it was very easy to get it. When I was taking my driver's test, the policeman who was testing me just said, 'turn right here and left here.' I looked over to him when I was driving and he was reading his mail. I didn't have to do a hill start because the hand brake wasn't working. My first car was navy blue, Toyota Celica.

At school we were allowed to wear blue long pants and before that a grey box pleat winter uniform. Our summer uniform was a dress made from blue check material. Punishments were the 'cuts,' getting smacked with a ruler on the back of your legs, writing lines and staying in after school. In school there were thirty two in my class. We had many good teachers but my favourite teacher in later years was Dianne Khan. When I was at school we won a B Grade netball premiership and Leanne O'Dea and I won the association best and fairest and runner up best and fairest.

My family has owned Dews Meats since September 1977 and I have worked in it from July1994. My father worked here in the factory when it wasn't Dews Meats and we moved down here near the factory in 1966. The factory closed,

and in 1977 when my father was involved with greyhounds, he decided to start it up again. I came back to Orroroo to settle down, get married, have children and to take over my parent's company because they wanted to retire. Jordan was born on the tenth of September 1997, and he is thirteen. My boys are very different as Jordan is quite placid and he is tall and thin. Kade was born on the twenty first of February 2000, and he is ten. He is stocky in build and much more out spoken and quite loud when he is annoyed.

We had lots of different greyhounds and I can remember having to try and name them because we had to submit heaps of names to the Greyhound Board and they would tell us if we could have them or not. The best greyhound that we had was called "Mabros" which I think in Greek means dark brown or black. He only ever won in the greyhound boxes that were dark brown or black. He could never win in the other boxes. We did have another dog that was called "GetchaGearOff' that couldn't win and the commentators used to always say stuff like, "always the bridesmaid never the bride."



I can remember walking the greyhounds. They used to chase everything that moved. One day the lawn was really icy and my brothers were being dragged along the lawn leaving big skid marks. I had many other pets and my favourite was my dog called "Intar" Growing up we always had budgies too.



hear local identity Ahmad Ramadan share with us some of his life journey. Ahmad was born in

Lebanon, one of four children, with each child born during a civil war in the country. His dad was working as an Operational Manager at the Beirut International airport. This meant that the children grew up not wanting for anything. The only thing they missed out on was time with their father as he was always working hard to provide for his family. He insisted that his children were to study and get a degree if they were to get on in life.

Ahmad grew up with a flare for business. At the age of eight or nine, he was making bags of popcorn and then going out and selling it to other kids in the street. He did attend a Christian school in Lebanon for some time before going on to study at the University. He opened his first shop at twenty one and not long after he had a second shop supplying internet connection that was supplied by cable.

Ahmad moved to Dubai where he had 150 people working for him. In 2005 he married his wife Jo-Anne with the idea of living in Dubai, but instead they finished up moving to Australia in 2006.

Ahmad found out his degrees were not accepted here in Australia and had to start again. One of his degrees was in Accounting, but after working for a firm for six weeks he decided that this was not the career he wanted.

In late 2008 a real estate agent told him about an IGA store on the market in Orroroo. In October 2009 they bought the business and moved to Orroroo on the 10th

Eighteen members ventured out to December 2009. During their first week in Orroroo there was a thunder storm that caused a power blackout, and Ahmad and Jo-Anne said to each other

> this is like being back in Lebanon.

> After renting number of years the family have built their own home and Orroroo has become very much part of their life. Ahmad has become involved in community activities including serving a term on the local Council.

> One of his desires was to become an Ambulance volunteer and after rearranging how the business operated he was able to make that dream come true.



Ahmad said this is one of the best decision he has made in his life, driven by witnessing one of his uncles suffering a massive heart attack and a feeling of helplessness of not knowing what to do.

Although Ahmad has travelled and seen many parts of the world he is convinced that there is no better country in which to live than here in Australia.
